- 1. This is an online and mail-bid sale. **Absentee bids will be accepted by mail, fax, email and phone until the day before the live online sale.** On the day of the live online sale, only bids placed via the live online platform will be accepted: **no phone, fax, email or mail bids can be entered on the day of the sale.**
- 2. All lots will be sold to the highest bidder at the time of the sale. All bids (whether placed online or by mail, fax, email or phone) will be treated as limits and lots will be purchased below these limits where competition permits.
- 3. Absentee bidders should be mindful that **bids submitted in irregular increments may be rounded to a lower bid** to comply with the online platform's established bidding increments.
- 4. Unless exempt by law, the buyer will be required to pay 7.5% sales tax on the total purchase price of all lots delivered in Ohio. Purchasers may also be liable for compensating use taxes in other states, which are solely the responsibility of the purchaser. 
Books without descriptions of condition may be assumed to be nice clean copies in the octavo range.

Sizes are not always noted for auction catalogues and periodicals. All serious defects are noted.

Introduction

The numismatic library formed by P. Scott Rubin is remarkable for a variety of reasons. For one, it is focused almost exclusively on American auction catalogues. These are not always catalogues of American coins, but the vast majority of the catalogues within were published in the United States. When foreign auction catalogues are included, it is because they include notable American coins. Of course, Scott's library includes books and periodicals as well, but his collecting focus is on catalogues.

While a library with such strictly defined parameters may seem to be very tightly focused, Scott has long considered *anything* that fell within these limitations to be fair game. Here, his guiding light was the bibliographical work of Martin Gengerke, whose *American Numismatic Auctions* provided the most comprehensive guide to collecting that one could wish for. Gengerke's compilation aims to include every single auction catalogue ever published in the United States that includes even a single numismatic lot. His latest edition lists over 15,000 of them. Scott's library, in its entirety, includes over 10,000 of that 15,000. While most of us would consider this to be an astonishing achievement, I imagine Scott regards the remaining 5000 with a wistful eye, even if most of them are poorly printed and unillustrated listings of commonplace coins by forgettable dealers.



Scott began collecting catalogues in the 1960s, long before Adams Volume I was published in 1982 or Gengerke issued the first iteration of his bibliography in 1983. Scott's sources were various, and included such early numismatic book dealers as Aaron Feldman, James Brown and Frank Katen. Many of his catalogues were sent directly to him by their publishers: Scott mentioned to me that he had recently come across a catalogue in his library that was addressed to him in his college dorm room. The most recent catalogues included in the present auction are from earlier in 2020.

As the years progressed, Scott's interests have focused more closely on provenance research: tracing the ownership histories of particular coins. His article "Auction Appearances and Pedigrees of the 1792 Silver Center Cent," published in the proceedings of the first *Coinage of the Americas Conference* in 1985, was one of the first detailed studies to bring the field of provenance research to a wide audience of American numismatists. In recent years, Scott has been a regular contributor to the annual *Guide Book of United States Coins*, where he maintains the listing of the "Top 250 U.S. Auction Prices," and the deep knowledge he has on the subject has been sought by a number of coin firms and auction houses.

Tracing the provenances of important coins was also an interest of Jack Collins, and the two collectors became good friends in the early 1980s, exchanging weekly telephone calls for well over a decade. If Martin Gengerke was a guiding light for Scott's catalogue collecting, Jack Collins provided encouragement and assistance for his research into coin pedigrees. When we were initially discussing the possible sale of his library, I suggested to Scott that we model the catalogue on Jack's 1987 "Catalogue of Catalogues," a publication I'd always admired. Scott readily agreed, and this is the result. It should be noted that the present catalogue does not include the entirety of Scott's library, and that additional offerings will be made in the near future in the form of a traditional mail-bid sale distributed in PDF form.

The Rare 1911 Adams Sale of Woodin's Patterns

Adams, Edgar H. CATALOGUE OF AUCTION SALE OF RARE PATTERN COINS. COMPRISING MANY PATTERN DUPLICATES, IN DIFFERENT METALS, AND OF VARIOUS DENOMINATIONS, BELONGING TO MR. WILLIAM H. WOODIN, OF NEW YORK CITY... New York City: Kennedy's Auction Rooms, February 10, 1911. 8vo, original printed card covers. 35, (1) pages; 367 lots. Both covers detached, but present. Very good or so.

Adams 6 in the "Miscellaneous" chapter of *United States Numismatic Literature, Volume II.* A major early sale of patterns. Adams notes in the foreword to the sale that "the government by its recent action in restoring to Mr. John Haseltine the lot of patterns taken from him last year has established a clear title to pattern pieces, collectors may acquire such coins without the misgivings and uncertainty that formerly attended such purchases. ... It is not unreasonable to predict that patterns will advance in value at least 100 per cent, within the ensuing year." A very scarce catalogue.

Rare Geoffrey Charlton Adams Mail-Bid Sale

Adams 4. The first four G.C. Adams catalogues were issued as mailbid sales, self-covered in either tri-fold format or in this diminutive size. Whatever their circulation may have been, their retention rate was clearly abysmal given how infrequently they are encountered today. This is the first copy of this catalogue that we have offered since Kolbe Sale 53 in 1992. Ex John W. Adams Library (Kolbe & Fanning Sale 150, lot 2).

Near Complete Geoffrey Charlton Adams Sales

Adams, Geoffrey Charlton. PUBLIC AUCTION SALE CATALOGUES. New York, 1903–1906. Twenty-five catalogues, being Nos. 5–30 of the series except for Sale 15, and comprising all but one of his public auction sales. Sales 16–30 are uniformly hand-priced in ink and bound in one volume (worn contemporary red half calf with mottled sides; all original printed paper covers bound in); the rest are in their original printed red paper covers. The copy of Sale 28 is one of 100 printed that were priced and feature a hand-drawn india ink illustration on the front cover, signed by the consignor (see comments). Sale 14 is also hand-priced in ink. Covers of the unbound copies frequently worn, as usual (see comments). Generally very good.

A nearly complete run of Geoffrey Charlton Adams sales except for the first four mail-bid auctions, all of which are very rare, and Sale 15. As attested to by the 25 catalogues present, Adams conducted an active business. The cataloguer himself is a bit of a mystery. John W. Adams has noted that "although claiming to have been a numismatist since 1879, he does not surface in the hobby until 1903. Three years after he surfaces—in October of 1906, to be exact—he earns the rare honor of being expelled from the American Numismatic Association." He seems to have disappeared shortly thereafter. His catalogues are difficult to collect, partly because of the highly acidic paper he used in printing their covers. They are infrequently encountered priced, which most of these are. The special edition of Sale 28 is rather interesting. Adams (G.C., that is) states at the close of the catalogue: "A De Luxe Edition of the above, priced in red ink and limited to 100 numbered and signed copies will be

issued after the Sale. They will have a genuine Chinese coin attached and on the cover of each and every one will be an original Chinese India-ink drawing by Wun Hi Gin together with his signature. Price, 60 cents cash with orders, which will be filled as they are received." This cataloguer recalls seeing three of these, and all three did in fact have different illustrations on the front cover (only one of them retained the coin tied through a small hole in the corner). That Adams produced 100 of them, however, seems unlikely. Even less likely is his claim to have produced "Twenty copies bound beautifully in red cloth and containing after each lot its Chinese symbol, done in red ink, price \$5.00 each," much less "Five copies, bound in Japan vellum, hand tooled, gold edges, portraits of owner and cataloguers, price \$25 each." GCA goes on to make the extraordinary statement that "There are left just two copies of the de Luxe 'History of the Dollar' Sale which took place July, 1905. They are priced in red ink, contain portraits of owner and cataloguers, all press notices and names of purchasers. Bound in blue and gold Japanese vellum, gold edges. Price, \$50 each." If such delicacies exist, Kolbe & Fanning would very much like to know of them.


Four catalogues, all of which are listed by Gengerke as the cataloguer's only coin sale. The 1893 Henkels sale was catalogued by Dr. Edward Maris, author of *Varieties of the Copper Issues of the United States Mint in the Year 1794* and *A Historic Sketch of the Coins of New Jersey*. Most are rather scarce. Moriarty served as the auctioneer of the final sale, and may well have not been the cataloguer.

Extremely Rare Geoffrey Charlton Adams Plates

4 Adams, Geoffrey Charlton. PLATES ISSUED TO ACCOMPANY THE CATALOGUE FOR THE NOVEMBER 1906 DIXIE LAND COLLECTION SALE. New York, 1906 [sale originally scheduled for November 13–14 but postponed to November 14–15, 1906]. Two fine photographic plates [24 by 18 cm] depicting American coins and tokens. Margins a little worn, with some chipping not affecting images. Very good or better.

Exceptionally rare plate produced to accompany Geoffrey Charlton Adams's final sale, the "Dixie Land Collection." While a printed announcement of the sale mentioning a plated version of the catalogue had been known for many years, an actual example of the plated catalogue had never been offered publicly or even reported to the numismatic community until a copy was discovered in 2012 and offered in our 2013 New York Book Auction, where it sold for \$4500 hammer. The plates are high-quality photographic plates, and are well-executed. The first depicts a variety of U.S. and colonial coins, including 1796 and 1797 half dollars, an 1879 Flowing Hair Stella, a Pine Tree shilling, a Rosa Americana twopence, a Chalmers shilling, rare Seated Liberty dollars and a Confederate cent. The second plate mostly depicts US. half cents and large cents, including key dates (1796 half cent with pole, two 1793 chain cents) and well-preserved early dates; a few early U.S. silver coins (1804 dime, etc.) are also included. While the printed sale announcement mentioned earlier stated that 100 plated copies would be printed, the fact that the sale's existence went unrecorded for a century suggests a rather more limited print run. As exciting as it was to discover an unrecorded 20th-century plated sale, the fact that the plates are of high quality and depict some very nice U.S. and colonial coins made it especially memorable. The present plates are untrimmed and seem never to have been bound in with a catalogue. Our consignor believes he purchased these from Aaron Feldman and that they derived from the Estate of David Proskey.

Complete ANR Catalogues

A complete set of the catalogues issued by this Wolfeboro, New Hampshire firm. In 2003, Bowers & Merena Galleries and Q. David Bowers parted ways, with the latter stepping aside for a year while many of his longtime employees set to work under the ANR banner. Bowers was able to join the new firm the following year, and the ANR series provides a most interesting stepping-stone between the Bowers & Merena and Stack's Bowers Galleries periods.

Condition ranges from good to fine, with the worst being Part III, which is Thomas Warner's hand-priced copy. A notable early, wide-ranging collection. Anthon was one of the finest American numismatists of his day, and elected to take on the task of cataloguing his collection for sale himself. Unfortunately, while the sale was divided into five parts, Anthon died after the third had been sold, leaving it to other hands (Gaston Feuardent and George Cogan) to compile Parts IV and V. Adams 17, 19, 20, 22 and 23 in the Bangs series.



Adams 15 under Bangs: "Copperheads struck for Idell. Excellent cards. AU 1793 1¢ cap. Fine catalogs with comments by Attinelli himself." A most interesting catalogue, clearly establishing Attinelli's wide-ranging numismatic expertise. The sections covering coin literature and coin catalogues, the latter "probably the largest ever offered," are especially instructive, and include specific mention of the deluxe issue of his 1876 *Numisgraphics*: "Ten copies of the above were printed (at \$10.00 per copy) on fine large paper, either of the 4 copies remaining unsold can be had by addressing the author." Infrequently offered priced.

Adams 1 for the Bangs series. One of the earliest significant U.S. numismatic auction sales, the Peter Flandin collection was the first entirely numismatic auction to be held in New York City, and is the earliest catalogue included in John W. Adams's United States Numismatic Literature. The cataloguer of the sale is unknown and is a matter of some dispute, with Gengerke and Adams having attributed it to Augustus B. Sage in the past, but Q. David Bowers making a good case against this (as Sage would have been too young to have catalogued it) and suggesting Charles I. Bushnell as a possibility. Flandin (whose actual first name was Pierre, according to Pete Smith) was a collector as early as 1822. His collection consisted mostly of ancient and European coins, but did contain some early American coins and Washington material, as well as federal coins including a proof 1850 dollar. Total proceeds for the sale were \$733.52. A scarce catalogue, especially priced and named. Attinelli 10. Ex George B. Mason, later in the library of F.A. Paddock, both of whom have signed the front cover.

A scarce and interesting early sale catalogue, with 135 lots of coins and medals (uncharacteristically, Attinelli records only 92 lots), and featuring 61 lots of important works on ancient and foreign coins and medals

(also priced and named). As Attinelli observes, the sale "consists principally of books," many of considerable importance, including a "remarkably fine copy, large paper, original binding," of Anton Koberger's celebrated Nuremberg Chronicle. Attinelli 12.

As an antiquarian, his collection of books, coins, casts, etc., bespeak his industry, thought, and care." Adams B+: "Strong English, French. 1839 \$1. Higley 1¢. 'He is in Glory,' other Washington. RR catalogs. Nice European." Of the addenda, Attinelli notes: "The first addenda belonged to a number of parties; the second, as stated, to Dr. Francis S. Edwards, which contained some rare and fine pieces." According to the introductory text in the sale catalogue, Dr. Chilton was a man of "refined taste and keen perceptive qualities [which] will be the best guarantee of the character of the collection now offered to the public. Numismatics must have been one of his favorite studies, as he commenced collecting American specimens when little more than twelve years of age, and until within a few weeks of his last illness attended all the prominent sales, purchasing with his usual good taste and an unabated ardor." The sale featured ancient coins and was especially strong in English, French and other European coins and medals but, as the front cover states, also "Embrac[ed] Many Rare American pieces." One of the earliest American auction catalogues to contain an illustration of a coin featured in the sale. Among the numismatic worthies who attended were Schieffelin, Gay, James, Livingston, Jewett, Sampson, Appleton, Bee, Anthon, Richards, Edwards, Cogan, Strobridge, Emmett, Brevoort, Pitkin, Parker, Kent, Oram, Illsey, Charles, Bailey, Crosby, Woodward, et al.

Of the second, he notes, "Mr. Oliver was among the earliest coin-collectors in this city, for a long time Secretary of the 'American Numismatic and Archaeological Society' of New York; consequently too well and favorably known among collectors, to require further notice here" (page 50). Adams 12: "Fine English, medieval to modern, many medals. RR Canadian: side view. Decent ancients." Oliver was among the founders of the American Numismatic Society. Born in Montreal, his affinity for Canadian numismatics is thus explained, though he resided most of his life in New York City.



Later, Attinelli mocks Leveridge's introduction to the September 1873 catalogue, writing "Oh, dear! of 'Coins which a few months ago had small value,' it is to be feared that this sale gave them a smaller one." Icy stuff. The final catalogue is Adams 13 in the Bangs series, and was the work on George Farrier: "1823 25¢. 1870 pattern set. Political medals. Ancients including Egypt." Gengerke lists the catalogue under Farrier, the only catalogue he attributes to him.

The first catalogue has always been mysterious. Attinelli wrote (page 67), "This small sized catalogue was issued with a title page, which ignored the auctioneers and days of sale..." Frossard noted that Igo apparently built up quite a list of creditors before living up to his cognomen and splitting town. The final catalogue is very scarce.

The 1877 sale consists of coins from the Ferguson Haines holdings; the catalogue is unusual for having been printed in Maine (Haines's home state). the March 1879 sale is the only one attributed to C.E. Fraser, Jr. The March 1, 1880 sale is of the nonnumismatic library of Rev. Finotti, the catalogue to which does include one lot of coins. Finally, the 1882 is of material belonging to J. Colvin Randall is was written by him.

Feuardent, whose involvement in the dispersal of Professor Anthon's collection led to this, his only other numismatic auction, as he relates in the catalogue: "The fair prices, obtained for antique coins at the sale of part fourth of the Anthon Cabinet, have induced a European collector, relinquishing the pursuit, to send his collection to New York for the disposal of the same at public sale." The 1889 sale was catalogued by H.G. Sampson and Charles J. Snyder, and is also listed as Sale 22 under Adams's enumeration of Sampson catalogues. Both of these catalogues are surprisingly hard to find. Second catalogue is ex Charles Horning Library (Davis sale of September 12, 2015, lot 131).

Thereafter the sales become more routine though a very wide variety of material was offered. Sale 15 featured choice large cents, which are illustrated on one of the four halftone plates.





David Bowers in 2003, plus a substantially complete run of mail-bid sales and other offerings from subsidiary firms. Any listing of significant sales conducted by the firm would be unmanageably lengthy, though some of the truly legendary collections handled by them over the years—Garrett, Bland, Eliasberg, Norweb, Bass—demand recognition. A core series of auction catalogues.



Most notable, however, for being signed by two descendants of Ephraim Brasher who attended the auction to witness the offering of the Garrett Brasher doubloon: Ephraim Brasher's great-great-grandson Milton Brasher and Milton's daughter Deborah (Brasher's great-great-granddaughter).

F.C.C. Boyd only conducted three auctions of his own (though he managed Lyman Low's final sale, which took place shortly after Low's death, and likely had a hand in others). The first was a mail-bid sale, and is very scarce: this is the first copy we have offered since Kolbe Sale 110. The second catalogue here present is quite rare: the copy we offered in Sale 155 was the first we had offered in many years. Not in the Champa or Bass Libraries—and even lacking from the Ford Library. The sale was no blockbuster, but included solid runs of Bust half dollars, early large cents, and a notable collection of Bolen medals.

The first complete set of these catalogues we have offered since the Bass sales. Bullowa (1912–1953) was a very well-regarded numismatist who began his professional numismatic career with the New Netherlands Coin Company before branching out on his own after acquiring the inventory of Ira Reed in 1946. His early death was considered a great loss to the hobby. His business was continued by his wife Catherine, who established a remarkably long-lasting business that continued for decades after.

Five Joseph Burleigh Sales

Very scarce. Little appears to be known about Burleigh. He is not listed in Mercer's *Numismatic Directory for 1881*, nor is his name found among the officers of the Numismatic and Archaeological Society of Baltimore. Apparently, the competition from the auction sales conducted in Baltimore at the same time by Dr. George Massamore proved to be too strong. This does not reflect particularly well on Burleigh, however, since John Adams notes in his work on 19th-century American coin auctioneers that "Of all the catalogers chronicled in these pages, Massamore is the most easily forgotten." Indeed, Burleigh's cataloguing seems uninspired at best and the text is riddled with typographical errors. All of Burleigh's sales appear to be scarce if not rare.



This catalogue is stated to be his seventh, though only six have been traced. The last copy of this that we offered (in our Sale 127) was less well-preserved and sold for an impressive \$1600 hammer.

Extremely rare and one of the most delightful bits of Numismatica Americana ever issued. It appears to have been distributed at W. Elliot Woodward's March 20-25, 1865 Sixth Semi-Annual Sale, as a mischievous addenda. Under a later sale, Attinelli jocularly observes that "Mr. 'Gointoem Strong, ... offered an extremely curious, rare, and unique collection at public sale, but, at the last moment, withdrew it entirely." The full story is found on page 91 of Attinelli: "This catalogue was the production of Mr. Charles Chaplin of Charlestown District, Boston, Mass., a prominent numismatist, one of the most active members of the Boston Numismatic Society, and at the same time one of the more modest and retiring. Those who have not the good fortune to possess a copy of the catalogue, are referred to Vol. IV, p. 7 of the 'American Journal of Numismatics,' where it has been deservedly honored with a less perishable form for its wit and lively sense of the ludicrous. On page 8 of the same volume may be found a 'pome' from the same pen, but which was furnished to that journal by another gentleman, whose full initials are 'S.S.C.' ¶By some it was thought (erroneously, however) that the squib was written with 'malice prepense' to satirize the descriptive coin catalogues of other parties. The following explanation will elucidate the history of its origin and 'raison d'être.'-Mr. Chaplin's vocation is that of a printer; one day while his workmen were at dinner, he availed himself of a few leisure moments, numismatist-like, to look over some old coins, the refuse of a recent purchase, which were in his desk, it was such a 'very poor' lot that it so strongly excited his sense of the ridiculous, that he was impelled to at once take up a 'composing stick' and catalogue the collection from sight, and without 'copy,' with the result shown in the catalogue. Lot '16' records an incident, which, those accustomed to attending auction sales have undoubtedly seen similar instances occur. 'An old Half dime' of a numismatic value of about ten or fifteen cents was put up for bids, none were offered, after some delay, the auctioneer said in a jocose way, 'Who will give five dollars for this nice coin?' 'I will!' said an innocent by-stander, and instanter the coin was knocked down to him." As Attinelli suggests, Chaplin's descriptions are often hilarious. A few examples follow. Lot 1 was an "English Penny, very plain. The inscription, like England's honor, is nearly obliterated." Lot 7 was described as "Two Kopecks, in fair condition. Obverse, a double-bearded eagle, holding a ten-pin ball in one claw and a toasting-fork in the other." And lot 12: "Another Russian Coin. Precisely the same as No. 7, except that it is much worse."

This fixed price catalogue appears to be the first publication of the Chapman brothers, the firm having been founded but three months earlier. In the September 12th, 1878 preface, the brothers boast that the catalogue contains "no less than fifty tetradrachms, among them a magnificent Perseus." The rear cover features a detailed lithographic illustration of "Chapman's Patent Cabinet for Coins and Medals." Unless the brothers'

wood crafting skills surpassed their numismatic expertise, the appellation is surely hyperbole since the cabinet was "Patented April 23, 1872," when Samuel was not yet 15 years of age and his brother 12.

Burrage of Boston who subsequently bequeathed it to the Harvard Mineralogical Museum, where many of the outstanding specimens in the Dohrmann collection can be seen today. Much additional information concerning this landmark sale is to be found in Lawrence H. Conklin's "Anatomy of a Mineral Sale: The Dohrmann Collection," appearing in the January-February 1992 issue of The Mineralogical Record. Conklin speculates "that Dohrmann may have been a mining engineer," since "Only by actually visiting a great many mines in those states could he have acquired such a large number of gold, silver and silver-containing specimens."







In the preface, the brothers express the hope that "this our first effort at cataloguing stamps will meet with the same degree of satisfaction to Philatelists that our catalogues of coins do the Numismatists." Whether satisfaction was less than robust or, more likely, their thriving numismatic business left them little or no spare time, the brothers thereafter rarely featured stamps in their sales. The copy in the Adams sale was bound with several other catalogues in one volume; we last offered an unbound copy of this sale in Kolbe Sale 99 (2006), where it was estimated at \$150 and brought \$1600.

John J. Ford, Jr., in the August, 1950 issue of The Numismatist, provides background: "Shortly before the turn of the century, the Chapmans ran into some trouble with the Federal Government concerning the extremely high quality of their photographic plates. After quite a little political intervention, Henry Chapman became the father of legislation permitting authorized dealers to fully illustrate their wares. S.H. Chapman had a great interest in photography and personally composed and photographed the plates for many of the large sale catalogs." In the interim, however, government regulations restricting the visual reproduction of coins prevailed and the controversy unfortunately, resulted in the firm issuing no illustrated catalogues for nearly a decade until the 1904 Mills sale. According to Jack Collins, the M.A. Brown sale photographic glass negatives were seized by the government, but not before two sets of proof prints had been made. One set was cut in half by the Chapmans to fit into their bidbook of the sale. The other set was acquired privately by Collins, and was subsequently sold privately. The sale itself is important for a very fine collection of choice large cents, eighty-four obverses and reverses of which are depicted on the four plates. This post-sale edition, with the printed prices realized list bound in at the end, is rarely encountered.







During the 1970s and 1980s, I collected half cents by die varieties and met many of the half cent collectors and dealers active at the time. One of my closest collecting friends was Thomas Katman. He came up with the idea of reprinting the 1924 Chapman sale of the Alvord collection. He asked if he could use my unplated copy of the catalogue for the text and he would have copies of the plates made. He also asked if I would like to partner with him to accomplish this: my part would be providing the unplated copy and half the cost of production. He had help from some students at the high school where he was teaching. He first produced a single copy, on different stock than the production run would be printed on, to see how it looked. After he showed me this prototype copy, I asked if I could keep it for my library since it was unique. He, being a half cent collector only and not keeping a library for any other reason than providing information on half cents, allowed me to keep it. He also produced ten photographic copies of the plates that were oversized, which we marketed separately.

The reprint proved useful, as it allowed many more collectors to have reference copies of the rare plates than would have otherwise been the case.

While Chapman's assertion is perhaps exaggerated (witness the researches of Joel Orosz, which have revealed a number of early American coin collectors such as Eliot, du Simitière, Muhlenberg, and Gilmor), the point remains that the collection's origins are very early. The W.B. Guy sale is both scarce and important, being rated A– by Adams: "Carolina 1/2¢. Excellent variety collections: Mass., Conn., Vt., N.J., Fugios, cents (especially 1794), 1/2¢."

The Landmark George H. Earle Sale







The collection contains a total of 67 of the 70 published Cogan sales, as well as a complete set of George Cogan catalogues and a number of catalogues issued by others. Condition varies throughout, but generally very good to near fine. \$6000

One of the finest sets extant, consisting of the Stack Family collection, which includes 60 of the 70 Cogan sales, augmented by a further seven catalogues gathered by the present consignor, bring the total to 67 of the 70 sales constituting a complete run of Cogans. The exceptional collection of Cogan catalogues based on the Fuld set and substantially augmented by a previous owner managed to include 63 of the 70 catalogues issued and brought \$7000 hammer when we sold it as part of our 2015 New York Book Auction. The present set lacks only Sales 2 and 3 (printed a few years



after the sales) and Sale 9, the de Haven collection, which was catalogued by Cogan but sold privately en bloc to William Lilliendahl. The first four Cogan auctions were conducted by manuscript at Cogan's store: catalogues were only printed later. The first catalogue was printed in 1863 by Cogan himself; Sales 2–4 were printed by E.J. Attinelli, presumably after Sale 1 had been printed. Attinelli's printings of Sales 2–4 were very small: only 25 copies of each were produced. Today, they are exceptionally rare. What is remarkable is that the Stack's set includes a copy of Sale 4: the W.C. Tripler catalogue. We know of only three extant copies of the Tripler catalogue: the one here present, an example sold in Kolbe Sale 44 (ex the John W. Adams Library), and one in the ANS Library. It is of interest to note that the Tripler sale may indeed be considered Cogan's first actual auction: the catalogue notes that the collection was "sold at public sale by William C. Cook, Auctioneer," the first time such wording is used on a Cogan catalogue and the first time the name of an auctioneer is given.

In addition to the Tripler sale, the present lot includes the following notable catalogues: an Interleaved Large Paper Catalogue of Cogan's May 21-22, 1860 sale [outer margins trimmed a bit closely]; an Interleaved Large Paper copy of his October 18-19, 1860 sale; an Interleaved Large Paper Catalogue of his March 25-26, 1862 sale, issued apparently before the sale and without printed prices realized, being a different printing from that of the priced interleaved large paper edition and unrecorded as such in Attinelli; special priced editions of Sales 6 and 11 in regular format; two different printings of the April 27-29, 1865 Bangs sale of the J.N.T. Levick collection, postponed to May 29-31, 1865 due to the assassination of President Lincoln; and plated copies of the June 23-24, 1869 Mackenzie Collection with five original plates (three of them cropped at outer edge); the May 25-27, 1870 John Allan Silver Cabinet; and the October 25-29, 1875 Colonel Cohen Collection (one plate a trifle cropped). A remarkable assemblage. Adams page 17: "Edward Cogan, our first coin dealer, has been called the father of U.S. coin collecting... The Cogan series of seventy auction catalogs ... is important if only because it embodies the deliberate thought of one of our hobby's great pioneers... Taking the Cogan series as a whole, it is strongest in early silver, large cents, half cents and colonials in that approximate order. Also well represented are patterns, of which there are several first appearances, and the coinage of the author's native England." A rare opportunity. 

The first plate depicts Washingtonia; the second illustrates rare American silver coins, including a choice 1794 dollar, and English rarities; the third depicts silver Revolutionary peace medals; the fourth illustrates choice ancient Greek and Roman gold coins (16 Roman and 1 Greek); and the final plate depicts the obverses of Mackenzie's choice early large cents and a 1793 half cent. Scarce. The plates in the Mackenzie and Allan catalogues are superior to many of those in Cogan's later sales. Jim Neiswinter has suggested that, based on stylistic similarities between the Mackenzie sale plates and the 1869 Levick plate, George Rockwood was likely the photographer for this sale. Rated A overall by Adams: "Many early proof sets. 1792 Disme, copper. Landmark large cents. First plated catalog in U.S." Attinelli page 52: "The sale of this celebrated collection, noted for the superior quality of the pieces offered therein, for which the aggregate amount, paid for a number of the lots, forms a good criterion; being an average of nearly six dollars a lot, extremely few lots consisting of more than one piece; gold forming the least part of the value. The set of U.S. Cents being the finest ever offered in any one collection." Davis 257. Fanning, Ancient Coins in Early American Auctions, 22.



Newcomb, little seems to be known.

In fact, as recently demonstrated by Ted Banning, the owner was James Ferrier, Jr., a son of Mayor Ferrier. The photographic plate shows a Breton 673 Montreal Bank Token Half Penny token, as well as nine ancient Greek and Roman coins and a few modern world coins. Rated B overall by Adams (A for British, B for ancients). Attinelli 58. Fanning, *Ancient Coins in Early American Auctions*, 23.

The high rating may point to the participation of David Proskey in the sale—participation that is mentioned in a different annotated copy. This catalogue is unusually important because it records the purchase of a number of pieces by T. Harrison Garrett, including the unique 1855 50¢ in aluminum which for one reason or another remained at Princeton when Robert Garrett traded his father's coin collection (then on loan to that institution) to his brother John Work Garrett in exchange for artwork belonging to the family. Our consignor published an article about this in the July 1984 issue of *The Numismatist*.



These were numbered by Collins's friend Walter Breen. We imagine the retention rate has not been very good.

Also present are over twenty fixed price lists and issues of the *Numismatic Review*.

An essentially complete set of Coin Galleries auctions. In July of 1953, Stack's moved from 46th Street to 123 West 57th Street, "the new hub of retail business in midtown New York City." Three summers later, Coin Galleries moved from nearby 41 West 57th Street to second story offices above the parent firm. From early on and over the next half century, Coin Galleries attracted a first-rate staff, including the likes of Vladimir and Eliza Elvira Clain-Stefanelli, James Risk, John Burnham, Jan Eric Blamberg, and so many others. In later years, a team of extremely talented full-time cataloguers, along with Stack's staff, produced an ever-growing body of auction sales. Many important specialized collections and individual pieces, especially esoteric ones, have graced the pages of these catalogues.

well-known for his medals, though these were considerable in number and included such masterworks as the Mint Cabinet medal and the first Medal of Honor. This catalogue includes several lots of hubs (including for Snowden, Washington and Grant), three dies (including Grant and Lincoln), and 43 lots of medals. While not well-catalogued, it is highly interesting and little known.

A virtually complete set of this important series of detailed and well-written catalogues, particularly rich in classic American numismatic titles. The first 17 numbered catalogues were fixed price lists, with auctions taking over with Sale 18. We believe this is a complete set of the auction catalogues issued under Davis's own name. He stopped numbering his catalogues after Sale 28, and resumed with Sale 50. While four catalogues appear to be unaccounted for, the four Champa Library sales issued under the Bowers & Merena banner make the count correct. The first ten fixed price lists not here present are very scarce.

The Notorious M.N. Daycius Circular

Mounted and matted to 11 by 14 inches with black mat board. Horizontal fold, once stapled together. Addressed by hand and stamped (postmarked March 21, 1992 at North Texas MPC 750. Near fine.

The greatest prank ever pulled on the American numismatic literature hobby. This simple mailer, cheaply and inexpertly produced, was sent from Texas in late March 1992 to a number of leading lights in the hobby, advertising an auction of numismatic books and catalogs ("a few going back to the 1820's"). Hints were dropped in the flyer to allow the knowledgeable recipient to deduce that what was being offered was the library of legendary Fort Worth coin dealer B. Max Mehl. "Many 100's of lots, recently discovered," promised the flyer. "From A long deceased dealer. Old coin books. Many old catalogs in beautiful leathers, though a number marked up with prices and various names. Nice photos in a number." The date on which the sale was to take place, in addition to the unusual appellation of the seller (M.N. Daycius = mendacious) led some to rightfully conclude that this was an April Fool's joke being played on the numismatic fraternity. Others were convinced that this was the find of a lifetime. The perpetrator has neither been revealed nor 'fessed up, though suspicions tend to focus on one individual whom discretion declines to name. The various clues and multiple levels of meaning in the flyer's text are revealing both of the composer's knowledge of his victims and his sense of humor.

Very good. An exceedingly difficult series of catalogues to collect-indeed, their existence is little known to most collectors today. George Fuld is, of course, well-remembered as among the foremost experts on U.S. exonumia, and it comes as no surprise to find that this is the focus of the auction catalogues issued by him and his wife Doris, with various forays into other areas of Fuld's interest including colonial coins. The first three sales of the series were run as advertisements in the TAMS Journal for 1972: the photocopy of the third sale included herein is photocopied at a reduced size and may have been directly distributed by the Fulds. The stand-alone series of catalogues begins with Sale 4 and ends with Sale 13, making the present set complete.

Substantial Set of Sheridan Downey Sales

Materials generally fine, some of the sales with price lists.

Of considerable importance to collectors of Bust half dollars. Sale 9, featuring the Al Overton Reference Collection of United States Bust Half Dollars, is especially important and fairly scarce. Described in the catalogue as "the most exciting sale of Bust Half Dollars in the history of numismatics," the sale never took place, as the collection was sold shortly before the mail-bid sale was to be held. Accounting for the present scarcity of this catalogue, Downey has noted that, because of the deal, "I stopped the press run of the catalogue at 400 copies."



The second is Attinelli 48. The third is the only numismatic sale conducted by the firm. The last 95 lots consist of sale catalogues, 1860–1875, all of which sold for 5 cents each. Very scarce.

It is only in recent years that Elder's catalogues have begun to be adequately appreciated. With so many sales to his credit, Elder handled an enormous number of coins throughout the nearly four decades he held auction sales. This significant lot includes a number of notable sales, including Gschwend (1908), Wilson (1908), Mougey (1910), Gilbert (1910), Woodin (1911), Appleton (1913), Miller (1917), Hewitt & Bartlett (1918), McCoy (1988), Wright & Pherson (1918), Poillon (1919), Davis (1920), Miller (1920), Clare (1920), Skilton (1925) and many others.

The sale featured Levick's notable collection of Jackson tokens ("probably the finest ... ever offered"), some of which are depicted on the plates. Also included were rare Bechtler and other pioneer gold coins, along with many rare United States coins in various series. Beyond Jackson tokens, the plates depict rare United States silver coins, patterns, choice cents and half cents, pioneer and United States gold coins, a few ancient and European rarities, etc. Davis 347. Adams 21. A very well-preserved example of this notable catalogue, with an exceptional provenance. The Wilson sale is important in several areas, most especially for U.S. large cents. At the head of that section, Elder terms it "the finest collection ever sold at auction" and notes that "Most of these choice pieces were purchased by Mr. Wilson at the Frothingham sale in May, 1883. Several are from the Parmelee collection." Two paragraphs in the preface are devoted to the private gold collection, "one of the best that has ever been offered." Eight of the plates illustrate large cents; three plates depict United States gold coins; there are four plates of silver dollars, two of halves and one each of quarters and dimes; two plates depict pattern silver dollars and ten early half dimes; three plates illustrate ancient, medieval and modern foreign coins; and four plates depict pioneer gold rarities. Elder boasts in his introduction that the plated edition contains more plates than any other previous numismatic sale, which appears to be the case. Adams 21 (rated A+ overall, and A in large cents, proofs, early and late silver, and private gold). Davis 350. Ex Albert Fairchild Holden (1866-1913), father of Emery May Holden Norweb (1896-1984), and signed by him on the front cover. His initials throughout indicate the extent of his collection at the time of the sale, in which he participated. Ex Bowers & Merena's November

1988 sale of the Norweb Collection (Part III, lot 3583); purchased by our consignor through John Bergman, in whose original packing it remains safely stored.

Adams 222. The quarto edition, with modern reproductions of the full complement of 22 photographic plates. The reprint plates were not mass-produced: they are of private make on Kodak paper. Four of the plates depict ancient Greek and Roman coins; nine illustrate English and European coins; one depicts American colonial coins; and the remaining eight plates illustrate American pioneer gold coins. A well-known neurologist, Lawrence wrote a number of books on the topic. His coin collection was remarkably varied but is best known for its outstanding collection of California and other pioneer gold coins. Elder explains the reason for this predilection in his introduction: "The late Dr. George Alfred Lawrence was born at Lawrence, California, a settlement named for his ancestors, on June 6th, 1869. As California was the principal seat of the coinage of private gold issued between 1849 and 1855, it was natural that the Doctor should specialize in the American

Private Gold Coinages." Original plated copies of the Lawrence catalogue are very scarce and rather expensive. The plates are among the best produced for any of Elder's catalogues. Adams A+: "Biography of Lawrence. Superb ancients. Outstanding medieval: Anglo-Saxon, coins of the Crusades. Definitive Maltese. Siege pieces. Baltimore shilling, 6 pence. Perhaps best territorial gold ever: 1850, 1851 Baldwin \$10; Gem Humbert 1851 \$50 (3); Kellogg's own 1855 \$50; Mass. & Cal. \$5; Schultz \$5; superb fractionals; Cal. gold notes." The company was founded by Michael Kolman as Federal Coin Exchange and is generally regarded as a second-tier firm, though they conducted three ANA sales (1954, 1957 and 1964), all of them present in this lot. As discussed by Gengerke, the firm split in 1961, with the auction business continued by Kolman as Federal Brand Enterprises and a retail operation run by Ed Kolman as Federal Coin Exchange. The latter was continued after Ed Kolman's retirement, and that iteration of the business conducted at least one auction that is not considered part of the present series.


A fine collection of these interesting catalogues, and among the most extensive sets we have ever offered (the John W. Adams set had 42). Fisher was a second-tier dealer and was based in Cleveland, Ohio, which was not precisely the center of the collecting universe in the 1930s and 1940s. That said, he was clearly a numismatist of some talent and offered material that may surprise readers not expecting to find much of interest. Indian Peace Medals appear to have been a recurring favorite with Fisher, and he handled some splendid examples, including an oval Washington medal in his March 1936 sale that fetched \$380 according to a letter from Fisher to Moritz Wormser seen elsewhere. Four of Fisher's sales are included in the "Miscellaneous" chapter of John W. Adams's *United States Numismatic Literature, Volume II*, all of which are here present.

Although the American Numismatic Association considered the August 21 auction conducted by Charles Molnar (also present in this sale) to be the main auction, Fisher's sale was a welcome addition, held at the convention hotel on the final day. Fisher notes in the catalogue that "This sale will be held in connection with the A.N.A. Convention on Thursday, August 23rd, at 1:30 P.M. at the Carter Hotel, Cleveland, Ohio." Further, the October, 1934 Convention issue of The Numismatist reported that "Those who were not used to metropolitan auction sales had grand opportunities, for the Cleveland convention had not only one auction but an abundance of them, the official one on Monday night, attended by a large audience, and Charlie Fisher's sale on Thursday afternoon at the conclusion of the convention. The prices were fair and quite satisfactory to the buyers." Fisher's sale featured several runs of large cents, including a "Very Fine" 1799 ex Dr. French, and "A Superb Lot" of half dollars, comprising lots 819-852, "consigned by one of the most fastidious collectors, who is a real crank on Condition." Very scarce. Purchased from the New Netherlands Coin Company in 1964, according to a penciled note on the first page.

To this best of our knowledge, this is the only copy we have ever handled of this rare sale. Even an unused copy would be special, but for this to be Henry Chapman's heavily annotated working copy is a real treat. Henry had held his 1911 Charles Morris sale at the Freeman company's rooms, though he generally preferred Davis & Harvey for his Philadelphia sales. This is the first auction listed by Gengerke under the Freeman name, though his incomplete information suggests he had not seen a copy. The ANS Library doesn't have a copy, nor is it on the Newman Numismatic Portal. A most interesting discovery.

Nowadays a little-known series of sales, though a number, particularly in later years, featured truly significant offerings of American coins. Comprehensive runs are rarely offered, and complete sets are rare indeed.

At this time, Frossard was conducting all of his sales in association with the firm of George Leavitt & Company in New York, with whom he appears to have had other business arrangements. A handful of Frossard's non-numismatic sales would appear to have been written by him for Leavitt as works for hire. Frossard held his March 24-25, 1885 auction sale at Leavitt's auction rooms and the May 1885 issue of *Numisma* informed subscribers that correspondence should be sent to him care of that firm.

The uninterrupted continuation of the business implies that the son had been involved for some time. Frossard Senior's death happened to coincide with an effort by the ANA to update its membership roster, removing from the ranks members who had not kept their dues current and offering members the opportunity to obtain a lower membership number in cases where one was available. In an unusual tribute, Frossard's membership number (14) was retired in memory of the recently deceased officer and charter member.



Fuller, to the extent that his auction cataloguing is recollected at all, is remembered today for his May 2, 1935 catalogue of the gold coins unearthed by Theodore Jones and Henry Grob-the so-called "Baltimore Hoard." As is well known, over \$11,000 in face value of United States gold coins from \$1 to \$20, dated 1834-1856 and apparently buried about the time of the Civil War, were unearthed by Jones and Grob in the cellar of a building in Baltimore in 1934. While Fuller's catalogue did little to add to the excitement of the hoard's disposition, it remains popular today because it has a good story. The present catalogue resembles the 1935 hoard sale, but is in fact a completely different offering. How the Orphans Court of Baltimore found itself responsible for selling a judge's coin collection is unknown to us, but the job fell once again to Our Man Fuller. One would like to think that his cataloguing skills had improved in the year since the Baltimore Hoard sale. One really would. Alas, all we can say is that Fuller's 1936 catalogue makes his 1935 one seem common.



A substantial set of the scarce catalogues of Chicago coin dealer Ben Green. While Green may be considered a second-tier dealer, he was an active promotor of the hobby and was truly knowledgeable in several specialized fields including encased postage and fractional currency. Green's two ANA sales (numbers 32 and 63 in his series) follow below, but he held a number of other significant sales including the November 30, 1906 sale featuring Hiram Deats's superb collection of encased postage stamps (based on the collection formed by Ed Frossard) and the September 11, 1908 sale with over 100 lots of California fractional gold coins collected by E.W. Hoague. Green also sold the highly significant collection of Canadian coins, tokens and medals formed by Charles Morris, which took pride of place in no fewer than *ten* auctions toward the end of his career. The early catalogues, published in a very small [9 by 15.5 cm] format, are generally very scarce, though the later "regulation size" catalogues are themselves far from common.

A priced copy of the Guttag brothers' only venture into numismatic auctions. The sale was fairly strong, with good patterns, large cents, U.S. gold, and private and territorial gold. Harder to find than most of the Guttags' publications.

A Complete Set of Harzfeld Sales

228 Harzfeld, S.K. AUCTION SALES OF COINS AND MEDALS. New York: Bangs, 1877–1881. A complete set of sixteen catalogues. 8vo, original printed paper covers (Sales 2 and 5 lack both; Sale 13 lacks rear). Sales 2, 5, 7 and 12 are hand-priced, with Sale 14 being partly priced. Sale 2 is removed from a previous binding. Generally very good, with a couple of exceptions. **\$300** An interesting, if short-lived, series of sales. Harzfeld was only active in the U.S. for three and a half years before poor health led him to retire to his native Germany, where he died in 1883. According to Adams, "Harzfeld's descriptions of European as well as ancient pieces are authoritative."

Nearly Complete Set Haseltine Catalogues

Also present is the separately printed addendum to Sale 65. Sales 8, 15, 23, 28, 31, 38, 43, 55, 57 and 70 are hand-priced. Sales 55 and 73 have printed prices realized list. Varying formats, with first being quarto and the rest octavo, generally in original printed paper covers. Sale 55 (the Type Table) is bound in later cloth; a handful are lacking covers and/or have been removed from previous bindings. Condition ranges from good to fine, with most being very good or better.

A substantially complete set of 76 Haseltine auction catalogues, including some scarce ones. John W. Adams has written that "Over the years, the Haseltine catalogs have attracted little attention, even from advanced students. Such neglect is difficult to understand, the more so given that the man was the leading authority of his day in at least four branches of U.S. numismatics: colonial paper, Confederate paper, varieties of early silver and mint patterns. The ... sales are rich in all of these branches." John W. Haseltine was among the foremost professional numismatists of the Philadelphia scene for the half century spanning the 1870s through the 1920s. He catalogued 90 auction sales, including the Mickley collection of large cents, the Sylvester S. Crosby collection of colonial coins and the Harold P. Newlin collection of half dimes. One of his sales, the Catalogue of John W. Haseltine's Type Table of United States Dollars, Half Dollars and Quarters (which is included here), quickly became a reference work on the subject. Enumerating the Haseltine series

has always been complicated by the fact that he did not begin numbering his catalogues until more than halfway through the series. John W. Adams managed to bring order to the chaos with his 1982 United States Numismatic Literature, Volume I, revising his listing slightly in 2001, when he published his Additions & Corrections. The series could, however, be revisited. Mason's sale dated February 16-17, 1871 is frequently considered a possible Haseltine entry, and is at times referred to as Adams 3A; at the same time, Adams 10 remains unassigned. Juggling the numbers slightly from 3 to 10 to accommodate the February 1871 sale can make use of the place being held by the unassigned 10. Alternately, Haseltine's 1873 fixed price list (Catalogue of United States and Foreign Coins, Medals, &c. for Sale by John W. Haseltine, cover dated "1873 and 1874") could be used as Adams 10 on the justification that Adams 4 is his similar fixed price list for 1872 & 1873 (though a similar 1876 emission would then be left out). The only complete set of Haseltine catalogues we have offered was that assembled by John W. Adams and sold in our Sale 150. The Fuld Library set was missing ten or so sales. Champa appears to have lacked two (Nos. 63 and the 1885-dated Sale 87, the latter of which had not been discovered when his library was sold—Sale 63 is present here). The Haseltine series remains underappreciated and awaits fuller attention than it has been given.

The Chubbuck Sale, with Plates

Very scarce with plates. Adams A: "Washington Funeral Medal in gold. NE shilling. 1823 and 1827 25¢." Adams page 48: "The only real rarity of the (Haseltine) series is a plated Chubbuck, of which fifty copies were made." Haseltine and Attinelli, for whatever reasons, are uncharacteristically silent about this important collection and the collector who formed it. The first plate depicts rare American silver coins; the second comprises illustrations of coins of the Far East; the third features large cents 1793-1832; the fourth depicts European and Latin American medals and two ancient coins; and the fifth illustrates three large European medals and a silver Libertas Americana medal. It is the only sale in the entire Haseltine series issued with plates, though two were prepared for the 1883 Harold P. Newlin sale that subsequently were employed in the Newlin monograph on half dimes, published later in the same year. It is regrettable that Haseltine did not issue plates for his famous 1881 "Type Table" sale though one can understand the economic logic of not doing so. All the more tragic is the lack of plates in Haseltine's other truly great auction sale: the 1883 Sylvester S. Crosby collection of American colonial coins.



Includes the firm's "Bullet" sales conducted through 2005. The set does not include the firm's non-numismatic catalogues except in a few cases where some numismatic content justifies their inclusion. Over 200 of the sales present feature the prices realized lists. Various formats, all in the original printed or pictorial covers. Generally fine. \$2500

By far the most complete set of Heritage catalogues we have ever offered. Heritage was founded by Steve Ivy in Dallas in 1976. In 1982, he was joined by Jim Halperin, who had been in the coin business since 1971 as New England Rare Coin Galleries. The company began focusing its attention on auction sales and quickly became a major player in the American numismatic scene. In 1996, the firm launched their website, and were among the first numismatic businesses to focus considerable attention on building an online presence. This strategy, which at the time may have seemed like a gamble on untested technology, paid off handsomely as Heritage became one of the largest coin dealers in the world and radically expanded their customer base through their online auctions. They now conduct regular auctions in a number of areas besides coins, though the present lot is almost entirely devoted to numismatic sales. This lot, combined with the Stack's and Bowers sales in the Rubin Library, would go a long way toward providing a history of commercial numismatics in the United States in the modern era. A rare opportunity.

Attinelli (page 43) cites Dr. T. Larkin Turner as the owner of the collection. In a 1994 Penny-Wise article entitled "Patron Saint," John Adams wrote: "if asked to name the first variety collector or the first variety collection sold at auction, most cent enthusiasts would draw a blank... The answer to one question and perhaps both is Dr. T. Larkin Turner. He sold his entire collection at auction on February 14 and 15, 1866. The cents alone occupied most of the second day, with over 600 pieces described in a staggering 395 lots. For sheer numbers, excepting only the disposition of hoards, the Turner collection was not matched until well into the twentieth century... Larkin's collection contained 10 1793s (four chains, 6 wreaths), 34 1794s, six 1799s (including one described 'not entirely uncirculated' that fetched a lavish \$16.00), 29 1800's and so forth... If EAC would like to have a patron saint, Dr. T. Larkin Turner is a reasonable candidate for the office. Why has it taken Dr. Turner so long to file his claim? The auctioneer, Samuel Hatch, was on the obscure side and probably slow to spend his own money on excessive printing. In 20 years, we have encountered only three copies of the Turner catalog and two are in institutions." Only a few others have appeared for sale in the interim. We last sold a copy of this catalogue in Sale 100, where a copy owned by John W. Adams sold for \$550 hammer (which may sound rather high until one learns that Adams had paid Bob Vail a princely \$1000 to acquire it).



The Adams Set of Hesslein Catalogues: The Finest We've Ever Offered

Hesslein, William. NUMISMATIC AUCTION SALES. Boston, 1909–1931. A remarkable collection of forty-nine different Hesslein auction catalogues. Includes the following: Adams Nos. 1–3, 16, 17, and 101–144. Varying formats, original printed paper covers, with all from No. 101 being octavo and earlier sales being in smaller format. Sales 101–139 are bound in four volumes (with a duplicate 104) in contemporary matching blue cloth, gilt, with most printed paper covers bound in to all but first volume; final volume in red and blue cloth. Sales 17 and 140–144 in original printed paper covers. Sales 1–3 and 16 are 16mo, original printed card or paper covers. Sale 17 hand-priced in red ink. Generally very good to fine.

A nearly complete collection of these very scarce catalogues, with the bound catalogues being from the library of H.A. Brand, according to a penciled note in the final volume. Only one early catalogue listed by Adams as definitely existing is not included in the present group (No. 15). Sales 16 and 17 were noted by Adams at the time of publication as "Not seen." Hesslein's sales were long neglected, but numismatists have begun to recognize that they are worth examining. The December 2, 1926 sale, for instance, features the first public offering of an 1870-S silver dollar, a coin that had the letters FHI engraved upon it. The coin sold to F.C.C. Boyd. When it was offered in the 1945 Boyd (World's Greatest Collection) sale, the FHI had been removed. A nearly complete run like this is a rare opportunity. Hesslein himself was an enigma. Adams criticized his obviously inflated numbering: "In January 1923, Hesslein moved into public auctions in a serious way. The tenth sale in this run (February 6-7, 1925) is denominated 'One Hundredth and Tenth' by the author. Were there really eighty-three auction sales conducted between No. 17 (1916) and No. 101 (1923)? Did Mr. H. later decide to count both auctions and fixed price lists for purposes of self-aggrandizement? However many missing catalogs will some day be found, we are inclined to believe that Mr. H. fibbed a little and lied a lot." Del Bland's impressive collection of 43 Hesslein catalogues brought \$2700 hammer in our Sale 129 (lot 433); this group is worthy of aggressive pursuit. Ex John W. Adams Library (Kolbe & Fanning Sale 150, lot 240).

Included in this set is a copy of Kabealo's 58th sale (he stopped numbering his sales shortly thereafter), dated January 25, 1947, and belonging to Ted Naftzger, with his extensive invoice showing the purchase of a number of lots from the consignment of large cents belonging to Dr. A.A. Booth that appeared in the sale.

ing coins. It should be noted that most of the missing sale numbers in the above listing are described as "doubtful" by Adams, though it must be acknowledged that at least one of them (Sale 108) has been seen by us. Sales 190, 191, 224, 230, 279 and 280, described as "not seen" by Adams, are here present. A rare opportunity.



The Frank Katen Catalogues

Generally fine or nearly so. A complete run of the auction catalogues, including the rare Sale 28. That catalogue consists of only four mimeographed pages, and is rarely met with. Numismatists in general and numismatic bibliophiles in particular are in Frank Joseph Katen's debt. In the second half of his numismatic career not only did he, assisted by his wife Laurese, almost singlehandedly supply an entire generation with rare and out of print publications necessary for serious numismatic research, he also pointed the way to the cadre of numismatic booksellers who sprang up in the 1970s and 1980s as the field expanded. In later years, Katen was sometimes unfairly criticized because of his generally sparse descriptions and other perceived deficiencies. Those around in the 1960s and early 1970s know that selling numismatic literature was scarcely a profitable endeavor. Kudos are due Frank Katen; he was the only dealer during this period to develop a viable business plan for selling rare and out of print literature covering the entire numismatic spectrum and he doggedly pursued it—quite viably it can be said—until the end of his career. John Adams, in United States Numismatic Literature, Volume II, aptly summarizes his accomplishments: "Katen's catalogues, activities, and publications are each impressive. However, what is of greater significance is the impact of his activities as a whole. Numismatic literature, long the backbone of our hobby, was sliding into obscurity due to increasing focus on coin prices, grading and other 'investment' attributes. In a period when the spirit of numismatics was being overwhelmed by commercialism, Frank Katen gathered up the love of literature, nurtured it and has lived to see it return to full flower. In these pages, we chronicle the contributions of other dealers who have left a larger footprint. However, only of Katen can it be said that he kept the flame alive."

Rare 1923 F.C.C. Boyd Catalogue

A rare catalogue, and quite possibly the only extant copy annotated by a sale attendee. While the fact that this material belonged to F.C.C. Boyd is exciting, it must be acknowledged that the coins involved are less so. Indeed, many of the antiques sold for higher prices than the coins, most of which were lower-price ancient and U.S. coins.

Knight has become one of the foremost dealers in paper money, though coins formed part of his business in the earlier years. Some of his early catalogues are very modest—duplicated pages stapled in the corner—a far cry from the full-color offset printed and perfect bound catalogues of later years. The early catalogues are rarely seen.

Regardless, this is a scarce early ANA sale.

A very interesting series of collector-oriented sales featuring many unusual and important world coins and medals. Significant runs are rarely offered and comprise an important storehouse of numismatic information. Lepczyk died on June 11, 1985. The firm continued as Downie-Lepczyk Auctions. Note that Lepczyk's first four numbered sales were in the form of advertisements in *Coin World*.

Cochran of Antrim, N.H., and sold with his collection of Dollars to Mason & Co., March 1889." It was withdrawn as being an alteration.

are fixed price lists and are paginated as though they comprised one work. They are notable for the emphasis they placed on numismatic books, and the selection Low had in stock was impressive (as was his familiarity with foreign publications and his willingness to locate copies for clients). Coins are the focus of this first installment, however. The Low series is complicated by the fact that some of these early fixed price catalogues were included by him in his numbered series of early auction sale catalogues (including No. 1, which is cited by both Adams and Gengerke). The first portion of the description of item 34, not printed by error in the catalogue, is present here in Low's inimitable handwriting. Rare. Though listed by Adams, he had not seen a copy when *United States Numismatic Literature, Volume I* was published in 1982. Ex Harry W. Bass, Jr. Library, being a duplicate deaccessed from the ANS Library.

The last of the catalogues present in this lot is the aborted sale of the fabled collection of Dr. Henry R. Linderman. The chicanery of Mint Officials becomes transparent in its text: restrikes, rare patterns and other Mint-produced concoctions abound. The collection was impounded by the United States Government and the sale did not take place. Several months later, the collection was sold under the auspices of Scott Stamp & Coin Company, minus a number of pieces confiscated by Treasury agents as being in violation of the 1873 coinage law that Linderman himself had helped to draft. When the collection was ultimately sold on February 28, 1888, Low was an employee of the Scott firm. This change of venue is attributable to Low's having ceased independent operations in the interim, entering the employ of J.W. Scott for nine years before resuming his own business. The hiatus may be attributable to financial difficulties precipitated by the unrecovered costs of producing this original Linderman catalogue.





Adams 1–34, complete, plus 17A. A remarkable collection of catalogues issued by one of the more outspoken dealers of the era. Mason's sale catalogues are challenging to collect, and priced copies are even tougher. Eleven of the auction catalogues here present are hand-priced, and they

include most of the scarcer sales held in Boston toward the end of Mason's career. Ebenezer Locke Mason was born in 1826 and became interested in the coin business as early as 1856. After the war, he resumed his numismatic pursuits, publishing the first issue of Mason's Coin and Stamp Collectors' Magazine in April 1867. Mason also began cataloguing auction sales, producing 17 in the period from 1868 to 1872. The financial disaster known as the "Panic of 1873" put him out of business for several years. He conducted two auction sales in 1880, but did not resume regularly scheduled sales until 1886 in Boston. In addition to auction catalogues, he published several periodicals throughout the course of his career, most of which are rare today. Mason's career was uneven, and his publications would occasionally disappear, only to reappear under a different name a few years later. This is real loss to the hobby, as his magazines are both informative and thoroughly entertaining, often rivaling Frossard's Numisma for biting sarcasm and quick wit. Attinelli 50-63. Baltimore coin dealer George Massamore (1845–1898) remains a mysterious contributor to U.S. numismatic history. He joined the Confederate Army at the age of 16 and remained in it for the duration of the conflict, serving under Lieutenant General Richard Ewell, who commanded Stonewall Jackson's 2nd Corps. Massamore's later expertise in Confederate currency and abiding interest in the numismatic byproducts of the conflict suggest that his war memories remained with him. He entered the public numismatic sphere by cataloguing Baltimore's first coin sale, held December 1, 1880, and consisting of duplicates from his own collection. His catalogues are decidedly scarce: this is the best group of them we have been able to offer since the present cataloguer sold his own set of 36 of the 46 Massamore catalogues in one of his early fixed price lists.

A complete set of notable auction sales conducted by Maurice Gould and Manuel and Joseph Lipson. Some are rarely offered. The Mayflower cata-

logues comprise one of the most notable series of American auction sale catalogues not included in Adams. In the first catalogue, Gould writes: "With this sale we hope to revive a famous New England numismatic institution, namely the Parker House Coin Sales. At one time Boston was the undisputed leader in the numismatic field, and Parker House sales were held right up until recent years by Hesslein, and the venerable H.M. Grant of Providence, R.I." From early on, these notable catalogues often featured important United States large cents and sometimes key American colonial coins and U.S. and pioneer gold, along with a wide variety of other mostly American material. Key sales include 1957 New England Numismatic Association (key colonials); Emerson Gaylord (a fine collection of choice U.S. gold coins formed over the first two decades of the twentieth century); C.H. Stearns (a major oldtime collection of colonials and over 400 lots of large cents, many in choice condition); two Bradbury Thurlow/American Antiquarian Society sales; Donald Belcher; Southern Collection; Andrew Y. Hodgdon; etc.

A bizarre and confusing story awaits the researcher in these pages. Attinelli (pages 41 & 42) tells the simple version of the story, in which the catalogue was printed by Sheldon, but then was pulled and sold instead by McGilvray: "the collection was withdrawn and sold in Boston... The name of the auctioneers, date of sale, etc., being printed on a slip and pasted over the name of Mr. Sheldon, etc." Present here are both versions of this scarce catalogue, comprised in large part of the collection of S. H. Chadbourne. However, a second copy of the Sheldon catalogue is also present, which is laid out in a different manner than the first. This lot, in essence, contains three copies of the same catalogue, none of which entirely matches the others.

Max Mehl was an impossibility. He had at least three strikes against him: 1) he was an immigrant Jew in a then-gentile hobby; 2) he was located in Fort Worth, Texas, at a time when 95 percent of the business was done on the East Coast; and 3) Lilliputian in stature and colorless in terms of personality, he adopted a business plan that relied on creativity and promotion. Quite obviously, Mehl did not realize that he was licked before he started. He just knew that it was a lot more fun to sell coins than to sell shoes. From there, he took it one step at a time." Mehl solved his problems with a massive advertising program, the likes of which had never been seen before in the numismatic community. His

advertising in numismatic publications was fairly routine for a major dealer of the time though his direct mailings to coin collectors were extensive. Mehl's massive advertising campaign in the most popular national publications, however, was unparalleled. He became the most famous American coin dealer ever and did more to popularize coin collecting among the masses than any other person, before or since. Of his numismatic publications, Mehl's ubiquitous Rare Coin Encyclopedia provided a steady source of income, his Numismatic Monthly deservedly brought respectability, and his series of auction sale catalogues spanning fifty years allowed him to handle far more than his share of the great American coin collections of the day. The method employed—mail auction—gave him greater control over the results than that exercised by his more traditional counterparts in the East. The coins in some of Mehl's more important sales may have been owned or controlled by him and rarities on occasion apparently changed hands in less than conventional transactions. B. Max was not a numismatic scholar and, as John Adams notes, "The lack of attention paid to numismatic issues was a serious flaw in all of Mehl's aucAUCTION SALE

tion catalogues. However, as unreliable as Mehl's descriptions have proved to be, the plain fact is that, for over half a century he attracted a major share of the best collections that came to market. Beginning with Charles Cowell in 1911 and including a role call of such greats as H. O. Granberg, William Dunham and William Atwater, his consignors represent an important slice of numismatic history. Exactly one quarter of the B. Max Mehl auctions draw a rating of A- or better... Thus, it is the importance of the consignments that makes the Mehl series a desired collectible. The strength of the material is enhanced by the charisma of the Mehl name, the two combining to create strong prices whenever these catalogues come on the market." It is no easy matter to complete a set of Mehl catalogues, especially if one also desires the prices realized lists. The early sales are of modest appearance and the print runs were small, under 500 according to Adams. Their covers were printed on acidic paper that degraded over time, thinning the ranks of survivors considerably. In later years, the print runs were huge for the period and the ready availability of the last twenty or so sales conveys a false impression of the scarcity of the intervening issues. The opportunity to obtain a set of Mehl auction catalogues en bloc occurs infrequently. We sold a set in our Sale 151 for \$4250 hammer that had been our first complete offering since our 2005 Craig Smith sale.

Bob Vail subsequently added 10 additional illustrations, on stamp hinges, and in 1999 had the catalogue bound. Sheldon numbers have been noted in pencil by Morley for many of the 1794 varieties. A uniquely augmented example of this landmark large cent catalogue, with an impressive, well-recorded pedigree.

Max Mehl Company, of Costa Mesa and Beverly Hills, California, published a handful of fixed price lists, the 61st and 62nd editions of the Star Rare Coin Encyclopedia—and this, a sale held in conjunction with a Kansas City show sponsored by the Heart of America Numismatic Association. Whatever one may say about the contents or the cataloguing—and there is little to say of either—the catalogue itself is rare. This may well be the only copy we have handled, and it when it was purchased by our consignor in a Charles Davis sale, Davis said it was the first he had seen as well. Ex November 4, 2000 Charles Davis sale, lot 253.

Complete sets are tough to assemble, and include a couple of mail-bid sales that are infrequently seen. Tougher yet are the prices realized lists, which Merkin charged for; this set includes most of them.

Three sets of "dummies" (bound sets of blank pages with a printed cover prepared by the printer to show the client what the final product will look like) prepared for the famous catalogue of this important August 14, 1964 sale. Two copies are trimmed, with illustrated front covers loosely laid on; third copy is untrimmed, with the full original color cover also untrimmed. Very good or better. \$100 Interesting pre-publication materials prepared for this famous catalogue. The color photo on the front cover of the Helfenstein sale was the first to be used on a U.S. numismatic auction catalogue, and is a classic. The untrimmed example here present shows a bit more of the photo than is seen on the published copies. Ex Lester Merkin Library (Kolbe Sale 18), lot 298.

The Merwin-Clayton firm was formed by Andrew Merwin and George Clayton, both of whom had been previously affiliated with Bangs, and Major Emory Turner. Very few of their 600-some sales included numismatic content: Gengerke lists only sixteen, of which thirteen are here present. The best group we recall ever offering.

Scarce Michael Brothers Sales

Sale 3 hand-priced in ink. Sales 5, 20 and 21 illustrated with halftone plates. The margins of the bound volume are closely trimmed, some cropped, including most of the plates. Very good, with defects noted.

Virtually complete, lacking only Sales 4, 6 and 7 for completion (we are unconvinced that the final unnumbered September 1919 sale listed by Gengerke exists: please feel free to prove us wrong). Notable sales include Sale 9, offering the stock of the recently deceased Ben Green, which is especially important for green's encased postage stamps. Adams B+: "Green's encased postage, one of the largest collections ever auctioned." In his introduction, Michael recounts the origin of the collection: "In 1905 Mr. Green sold at public auction the fine collection of encased postage stamps of Hiram Deats of Flemington, N.Y. (sic) This sale aroused his interest in encased postage stamps and the collection which he started at this time grew until, at the time of his death, it was one of the finest in the country. The catalogue featured 156 lots of encased postage stamps, including 133 different varieties. The bound volume was bound by B.A. Martin, best known to numismatists as the special-edition binder for both Stack's and Abe Kosoff in the 1940s. While the cropping is unfortunate, these sales are rarely encountered. Ex Kolbe Sale 40, lot 220; ex William A. Burd Library; ex Kolbe & Fanning Sale 147, lot 408.

Warner's numismatic involvement was considerable during the 1860s (he wrote of his early days in the December 1910 issue of *The Numismatist*). Attinelli 44, 46, 47 and 54.

While the days leading up to an A.N.A. convention are now packed with important coin auctions, this was a notable innovation at the time. Adams summarizes the Molnar sale in two words: "Meager content." This may account in part for its true scarcity today. Ex Phil Ralls Library (Kolbe & Fanning Sale 134), lot 15.

No. 21 of the *Quarterly* doubles as an auction sale, Morey's first. Genger-ke lists 180 or so Morey sales and additional ones undoubtedly remain to be discovered. Yet copies rarely appear on the market. It is probable that relatively few were initially issued and generally weak content cannot have helped, but, there are some surprises. The final catalogue here present is unlisted in Gengerke.

Lacking only the last of Morgan's catalogues for completion, and with six of them priced, this is a solid group of these scarce sales held in Pittsburgh, still pretty far west from the center of the numismatic world at the time. Three of these were A.C. Gies's copies, and are signed by him.

The NASCA sales feature the work of a number of prominent numismatists, most notably Douglas Ball, Herbert Melnick, Carl Carlson, John Munson, Martin Gengerke, C. Douglas Smith, and others. The first 53 sales were issued under the NASCA banner. Sale 54–56 were published as NASCA-Karp Auctions, while beginning with Sale 57 NASCA was listed as a Division of R.M. Smythe & Co. Important auctions included the Wayte Raymond collection, sold in a series of four sales. Continued under Smythe.

Adams Volume II, page 194: "In November, 1950, Charles Wormser hired John Ford, and perhaps the most important chapter of numismatic cataloguing was begun. Sometimes abrasive but always insightful, Ford ranks in a class with Sylvester Crosby, Lyman Low, David Proskey, and Wayte Raymond as one of the great numismatists this country has produced. His cataloguing features meticulous accuracy and conservative grading; his descriptions are full and informative, covering a range of material that spans the gamut of our hobby. Others have rivaled Ford's penchant for detail, but none have better explored the by-ways of history and tradition for which numismatics are such a natural entry. As if one world-class numismatist were not enough, New Netherlands hired Walter Breen in 1952. Blessed with a restlessly inquiring mind and a prodigious memory, Breen added new dimensions to the firm's research. His findings on die states, diagnostic features and the then condition census add another rich layer to the utility that New Netherlands' catalogues will always possess... Sale 1 through 25 are either scarce or, in a few cases, rare... The New Netherlands catalogues represent something special in Ameri-



can numismatics. They demonstrate with eloquence that the business of dealing in coins can also embrace the functions of educating the collector and preserving the traditions of the hobby. In so doing, the members of the firm have set an example which, though rarely observed, will nonetheless act as a beacon to the profession in years to come." This group includes two of the rare mail-bid sales: September 26, 1967 with PRL (Adams 59a) and August 5, 1969 (Adams 60a, giving the date as the 15th).

This copy belonged to Lester Merkin, whom one assumes did the original pricing and naming, usually recording known buyers by their initials. A modern key to the buyers, compiled by this cataloguer, is included to assist users. An important reference. Adams A: "Naftzger's remarkable large cents (his duplicates if you will): MS 1793 wreath (4), Crosby 12-K and 14-L: almost all other dates in MS and near complete in Sheldon varieties. A landmark offering." Ex Kolbe Sale 18, lot 304.

The New York Coin & Stamp Company was a partnership formed by two experienced numismatists, David Proskey and Harlan Page Smith, in 1888, and which lasted until the latter's death in 1902, after which Proskey continued solo for several years.

Despite the discovery of five copies in the Bass library (four of which were damp-stained), the plated Woodside sale remains a true rarity, with perhaps only a dozen or so examples of the 100 copies supposedly issued appearing to have survived. Woodside's collection of United States pattern coins is one of the finest ever formed. The plates in the present example are exceptionally well-preserved, in marked contrast to most other surviving copies. Frossard's 110th sale features three plates devoted to A.H. Saltmarsh's impressive and wide-ranging collection, with the plates featuring everything from bell thalers and a Syracusan decadrachm to a Willow Tree shilling and an alleged 1804 over 3 dollar. Very scarce with plates, this copy may be the freshest we have seen. Davis 416. Jasper L. As prominent as he was, Overton's auction catalogues are infrequently offered. This is the best group we've had in years. Gengerke's listing of these catalogues is uncertain, with no Sale 1, 2 or 13 being listed and only one unnumbered catalogue given between Sales 14 and 18 (a *Numismatic Scrapbook* "auction" is listed before Sale 3). A tough series.

Pacific Coast Sales

Conducted primarily by Ron and Dennis Gillio, Pacific Coast Auction Galleries offered world coins (especially Asian ones) in addition to the usual American faire. They were among the first companies to auction third-party encapsulated coins, doing so as early as 1986 (the year PCGS began operations). Gengerke lists 25 sales by the firm, though the firm's own numbering counts at least 29. Nos. 25 and 26, unlisted by Gengerke, are here present and dated March 1, 1990 and May 30–31, 1990, respectively.

Ira Reed was a Glenside, Pennsylvania coin dealer who issued a number of auction catalogues and other publications, including the 1941 ANA sale. He died in October of 1954. The fact that this sale apparently had been completely forgotten is really quite remarkable. Indeed, it is a month earlier than the earliest Pennypacker sale included by Gengerke.

The scarce catalogue of this controversial sale. Leonard Holland's remarkably fine collection of large cents was assembled in the late 1940s and 1950s, mostly from Holland's good friend Thomas Elder. Holland pledged the collection as collateral for a construction project loan in the late 1950s. He encountered unforeseen difficulties and the bank foreclosed the loan, choosing an obscure country auctioneer to liquidate the collection. Distribution of the catalogue was limited and the coins generally sold for low prices. Some of the important collectors of the day did not learn of the sale in time; several who did attend funneled their bids through a single agent. After the sale, it is reported that the coins were again auctioned within the group in a hotel room. Sometimes, the differences were dramatic, with coins subsequently bringing double or triple the original hammer price.

Adams 1–53. The Morgenthau series brought together two talented numismatists whose particular skills sets complemented the other's nicely. As a team, they were able to develop a refined clientele and attend to their requirements, whether buying or selling. The combination of people skills and numismatic capabilities was clearly successful, and the partnership lasted until Macallister's death in 1945. Unlike the catalogues of the United States Coin Company, which are decidedly scarce and often genuinely rare, the Morgenthau catalogues are fairly

available—though complete runs are infrequently encountered. Notable sales include: the 1933 "Great American" sale offering material from the Virgil Brand collection; several auctions with important offerings from the Waldo Newcomer collection; two sales devoted to ancient coins from the Russell Burrage collection (depicted on 16 halftone plates); the William Festus Morgan large cent sale; the two-part auction of Howard R. Newcomb's large cent collection; and several sales offering exceptional coins anonymously. The first catalogue here present was Henry Chapman's bidbook, marked up by him before the sale and sent (with an accompanying letter, still present) to his daughter, who represented him at the sale and who priced this copy.



An amusing exchange of notes on the addenda comments on the cheap paper used to print it. One commentator writes, "This addenda was priced in pencil because the paper would not hold ink." The second replies, "Do not agree with the above / think it holds the ink to much" (sic). Q. 



Near Complete Hans Schulman Sales

Calicó, but held with the annual Schulman/Kreisberg sale. Varying softcover formats or self-covered, as issued. Fifty with original prices realized lists; plate supplements present in 9 of the 12 sales that call for one (Gengerke calls for a plate supplement to 21a, but this is incorrect as the catalogue itself has 24 plates); printed supplement to Sale 94 present. Generally very good to fine. Born in 1913 into a numismatic dynasty, Hans Maurice Frederick was schooled in the Netherlands, later studied at the Sorbonne, and rather involuntarily emigrated to the United States before the war, barely a step ahead of the Nazis. Fluent in five languages, he formed what was at the start simply an American offshoot of the family business, but which soon became—with the death of his father in a concentration camp—a major numismatic enterprise in New York. Here be became allied, early on, with the principals of Numismatic Gallery and, even more propitiously, the Stack family. A shared fluency and the ability to conduct business in several languages made him the favored agent of King Farouk, not only to his benefit but to that of the American coin trade in general. Schulman was a founding member of both the Professional Numismatic Guild and the International Association of Professional Numismatists. The New York Schulman auction sale catalogues cover the numismatic spectrum. Odd and curious monies, countermarked / counterstamped coins, numismatic literature, shipwreck coins, mainstream ancient Greek, Roman, and Byzantine coins, Latin American rarities, and the full range of medieval and modern foreign coins and medals, all were within his purview. The truly notable Schulman sales present here include: King Farouk



(1950); Menjou / Ferguson (1957); George Lee (1958); Gibbs British and colonial counterstamps (1960); all of the joint Schulman/Kreisberg offerings (1957–1967) including the Golden Sales (1962–1963); Virgil Brand 1 & 2 (1964); Arlow / Salway Konstantine Rouble (1965); his two numismatic book sales (1966 & 1968); the Medina collection of Proclamation Coins and Spanish-American Rarities (1968); "Treasures of Two Oceans" (1969); the Mabbott sales; the Howard Gibbs sales; and the Spanish Galleon Treasure sale (1972). Of the six missing sales, it should be noted that Adams 36 is unknown and probably doesn't exist, and Nos. 41 and 43–45 are the rarely encountered "broadside" sides, being minor offerings quickly catalogued on a single large sheet of paper.

7, 12, 13, 14, 19, 27, 30, 31 and 42 are hand-priced; Sale 19 also includes a printed prices realized list. Sale 19 has one chromolithographic plate; Sale 39 has two halftone plates. Sales 3, 4, 7, 10, 13, 30 and 45 are removed from previous bindings. Sales 41 and 43 lack covers; Sale 45 lacks the rear cover. Sale 35 has one lot clipped. Also included is a copy of the firm's 1882 *Premium List*. All 8vo, in original printed paper covers except where noted. Generally very good.

An impressive group. The Scott sales can be a little confusing to collectors because Scott & Company had their own numbering system, which is different than that used by Adams. This is because the majority of their sales were non-numismatic. For this reason, they are often considered of little importance by modern collectors, but while Scott's personal interests may not have centered on coins, he hired well: Adams 1–17 and 19–26 were catalogued by David Proskey, while Lyman Low catalogued Adams 28–41. These two men—among the finest American numismatists of their generation—elevate the Scott catalogues considerably. Adams 27, the P.H. Hill collection, does not include the Scott name on the catalogue, which is presented only as being sold at Ortgies & Co., New York. This lot includes a copy of the April 13, 1895 Gerald Hart sale with two halftone plates, a superb sale of Canadian medals and tokens catalogued by Lyman Low. The Scott Company went through

changes in ownership and organization over the years, with Scott selling his business in 1884, but then reentering the field five years later (and prompting a lawsuit over the ownership of his business name). Nine years passed between Adams 47 and 48, with the late sales being very rarely offered.

An important sale, with commentary, particularly in the large cent section of the William Carr collection. George L. Tilden's collection of fractional currency was deemed "almost without exception in the best possible condition ... and the majority of specimens are in duplicate." The third sale is also quite rare.

Following the Smith & Sampson partnership, he conducted 21 auctions under his own name before establishing the New York Coin & Stamp Company with David U. Proskey in 1888. He would continue in business with Proskey until his death. Adams writes of Smith (1839–1902) that he "was a man with genuine numismatic talent. In addition, a close reading of his catalogs reveals a man with a rare sense of humor."

A difficult to find sale, particularly scarce priced, and often encountered chipped and worn due to the oversized format (many copies, unlike this one, have been trimmed). Of enormous importance for colonial and state coinages, most especially the New Jersey coppers. Best known today for his seminal work on the New Jersey pieces, Maris also is credited with the first serious works on the die varieties of 1794 U.S. large cents. The sale appears to have generated some controversy. Maris issued a circular on May 15, 1886, announcing that his collection was to be sold at the auction house of Stan. V. Henkels of Philadelphia. Maris writes in this circular that "The most important of the Colonials will comprise my entire collection of the coins of New Jersey. This will include specimens, or copies of all known New Jerseys, of undoubted genuineness, together with some counterfeits of that period. Also, those which were

struck over the Connecticut, Vermont, Nova Constellatio, English, Irish and French coppers; one in brass; one in a mixed metal; one with a small piece of silver in the plow handle; and many other pieces showing fracture of the dies." In an unusual move, Maris catalogued his collection himself. This apparently irritated some coin dealers, who resented this intrusion onto their turf. Adams 19 (rated A overall and for colonials and patterns in particular). Clain-Stefanelli 12188. Davis 944.

The Smythe catalogues trace back to the NASCA series involving Douglas Ball and associates. The firm was acquired by Jules Karp who in turn sold it to R.M. Smythe, who issued around 200 numbered catalogues before the business was purchased by Spink. Among the many notable collections of paper money handled by the firm, the Herb and Martha Schingoethe collection of obsolete currency was perhaps the most important (the present lot includes the first 12 of those sales). The earlier catalogues bearing both the NASCA and Smythe names are listed in this catalogue under NASCA. The present lot begins when the NASCA name was dropped.

Important, with this catalogue including O'Hagan's American coins. At a time when Montagu's 1630 Briot Pattern Broad brought £17.10, a Syracusan dekadrachm from the Ashburnham collection sold for £23, and Montagu's aureus of Marc Anthony realized £34, London saleroom habitués must truly have been shocked to see an American coin get knocked down for £435! Lots 760–785 in this installment of the O'Hagan sale featured a "Washington Cent, 1793, struck in gold," 1849 and 1851 octagonal Humbert gold slugs and, most notably, an 1849 Cincinnati Mining and Trading Co. \$10, finely illustrated on one of the plates and one of "only two specimens being known, according to Mr. C.H. Shinkle's list." Rather amusingly, the main heading describes the denomination as "Two-Dollars," though the coin's reverse legend is correctly cited as TEN DOLLARS. Manville & Robertson 212–214.

The famous sale catalogue of the legendary coin collection formed by King Farouk. The details surrounding the sale are fascinating and often bizarre, and were recounted in part by Abe Kosoff in a series of *Coin World* articles. Dominated by Kosoff, Hans Schulman and a handful of other East Coast coin dealers, only a few collectors attended the sale, John J. Pittman notably among them. Catalogued by the London firm of Baldwin's, great rarities from the Woodin, Earle, Colonel Green and other great American collections were often placed in group lots, e.g., a 1913 Liberty Head nickel and pattern United States gold coins. The onerous financial requirements imposed by the Egyptian Government combined with reported dealer collusion appears to have stifled widespread competition and many bargains were to be had by those brave enough to venture to Cairo. 

A comprehensive run of approximately 910 catalogues, consisting of all Stack's catalogues separately issued by the original firm and by Stack's Bowers Galleries until mid-2020: the set is complete through at least May 2003, and is missing only a few catalogues issued since then (see comments). The set does not include the 1952 Stack's Galleries sale, which is not counted as part of the set by Adams or Gengerke, nor the Apostrophe sales (to which Stack's contributed only a section). A remarkably high percentage of the sales present feature the original prices realized lists, with earlier sales being more likely to lack these and sales since the 1960s mostly including them. Various formats, all in the original printed or pictorial covers. Generally fine. The most comprehensive set of Stack's catalogues we've ever offered. Considerably more complete and extending much further in time than the set from the Coin Galleries library that sold in our Sale 116 for \$21,000 hammer; also more extensive than the Del Bland set last sold in our Sale 138 (having been added to by the subsequent owner) or the Phil Carrigan set we sold just recently in Sale 153. In United States Numismatic Literature, Volume II (1990), John W. Adams wrote that: "the Stack's enterprise has evolved into perhaps the most successful coin dealership in the country. There have been others who have had more


employees or who have received more publicity. However, only Stack's has maintained itself in the front rank of the hobby over a period of time that now encompasses three generations of family leadership... Stack's catalogues are fast becoming a popular collectible and understandably so ... they are a faithful mirror of the highly successful firm which issued them. As such, they stand as a quasi-official record of contemporary American numismatics and trends therein." Determining the completion of a set of the more recent catalogues is difficult, as little work has been done on them from a bibliographical perspective. Using Gengerke, Moulton, and our own information, this set appears to be complete until the May 14, 2003 sale of the Rudolf collection. It appears to be missing only two additional catalogues in the main series: the March 15-16, 2005 sale of the Morrison & Licht collections and the November 7, 2008 Haverford sale. (The October 1, 1999 Globus catalogue listed in Gengerke is an error for the December 1-2, 1999 sale.) The Stack's Bowers Galleries sales comprise over 200 catalogues issued within a little over nine years: this set is nearly complete. The significance of the Stack's sales as a numismatic resource is difficult to overstate. Anyone engaging in serious research in the field of American numismatics, ranging from colonials to United States large cents, from proof gold to rare paper currency, will find the collected Stack's catalogues to be an indispensable storehouse of numismatic information. Increasingly, the firm's catalogues have become essential also to collectors of world coins and paper money, with particular emphasis on Asian material. They constitute the longest, most important series of auction sale catalogues ever issued.








Stack's Galleries was a subsidiary of the main firm and was intended to handle antiquities and related material. This seems to be the only one of its catalogues to include coins. The last five pages of text comprise 66 lots of coins (lots 382-447 inclusive), about equally divided among Greek and Roman coins, and the last three plates (XIV-XVI) depict both sides of 19 Greek and 11 Roman coins. The remainder of the catalogue and illustrations are devoted to describing and depicting an outstanding collection of ancient glass. Reprinted on the title verso is a letter from Arthur Upham Pope of the Asia Institute (where the collection was on loan), which describes the collection as "probably the best systematically collected glass that has ever been made." One of only several examples we have ever handled, and one of the finest in terms of condition.

The complete 24-volume set of this encyclopedic series of *Numismatic American History* auction sale catalogues, documenting the fabled collection assembled by John Jay Ford, Jr. The production values exhibited by the catalogues themselves are exceeded only by the depth of numismatic scholarship contained therein. They will long remain indispensable to scholars, collectors, and dealers interested in the truly fascinating world of American numismatics that lies beyond dates and mintmarks. Voted No. 6 on the Numismatic Bibliomania Society's "One Hundred Greatest Items of United States Numismatic Literature." Also included is the 2-volume set of the catalogues of Ford's numismatic library, sold by George F. Kolbe in 2004 and 2005.

One of the most complete sets of these fixed price lists we have ever offered. Rather modestly produced at first, the scarce early fixed price lists were an important commercial vehicle for Stack's and are of considerable interest. No. 9 offers 271 "U.S. Large Cents from 1793 to 1857 with Important Die Varieties"; No. 14 features 831 "U.S. Large Cents from 1793 to 1857 with Important Die Varieties from the A.C. Gies Collection." The latter was catalogued by teenaged numismatic tyro John J. Ford, Jr. and exhibits a penchant for detail that would later propel him to the front ranks of commercial American numismatics. Remy Bourne lists two versions of No. 36, but his method of citing pagination leaves the distinction unclear. He does not list a No. 39 or a No. 52, which are numbers we've yet to encounter either. While 67A was issued, there does not appear to have been an unlettered 67. The Stack's firm cooled on the fixed price medium during the 1970s and 1980s, but then issued a wonderful series of very impressive quarto-sized catalogues in the 1990s. A series that is well worth collecting.

The photographs are included as good-quality halftones in this new edition, making them available to a wide audience for the first time. The Brobston reprint is similar in that it reproduces photographs that were originally issued in such limited quantities (three sets, in this case) as to be virtually non-collectible.

Despite the limitations he faced due to his distance from the larger cities, Steigerwalt handled some very impressive coins over his career—a fact that has only become widely appreciated in recent years. His catalogues are always scarce and often rare. This run includes Adams 65, which was not included in the remarkably complete set in the Champa Library.

The copy of Adams 72C here present is dated in pencil, "Rec'd Sep 20, 1900." Similarly, the copies of Adams 72O and 72R are dated "May 1900" in pencil, though this may not be contemporary. The copy of Adams 72Q is ink-stamped "JUN 23 1900," and the copies of both Adams 62F and 63 bear H.E. Deats's ink stamp reporting that they were received on September 1, 1903.

While relatively brief in number (twentynine), these are unsurpassed in quality of content; twelve—more than 40%—receive a rating of A or better and only the non-numismatic sales fall below a rating of B." 

Adams 14, though, as he freely admits, it does not qualify under the key criterion. Adams A+: "NE 1¢, 3¢, 6¢ 12¢ and stiver. Brasher doubloon. 1818 through (!) 1860 \$5. RRR patterns such as 1861 \$20." Originally catalogued for dispersal at auction, this superb collection of colonials, patterns and United States gold and copper coins was purchased en bloc by Parmelee and the sale never took place. Though 150 copies were reportedly printed to record the collection for posterity, copies are very rare today. The catalogue has come to sale on a number of occasions in recent years, but while this may imply a ready supply of copies, there are probably only a dozen or so copies known. The catalogue, with its fine photographs remaining of considerable importance, is of continuing value today. Plate one depicts rare colonials, including a Brasher doubloon; the second plate illustrates choice large cents and half cents, including a 1795 Jefferson Head cent, a few rare gold coins, and rare United States silver coins featuring an "1804 dollar"; the third plate depicts choice early cents and half cents; plate four illustrates gem proofs; and the final plate depicts rare patterns.



The first important American coin auction. Dr. Lewis Roper (c. 1806-1850) was a Philadelphia dentist and early American numismatist. He was well-known to the Mint establishment, testifying to the avidity of his collecting. Roper headed west during the Gold Rush, and died at sea while returning home in 1850. His collection reflected the varied tastes of the time. In the American series, the sale featured Comitia Americana and War of 1812 medals, a few Franklin medals, four Gobrecht dollars, a 1792 Washington Head half dollar, colonial coins, presidential medals, etc. A Stony Point medal in gold sold for \$38 to Fales (the catalogue doesn't mention the actual recipient of the medal, though Charles Bushnell had the foresight to record in his copy that it was de Fleury). Also featured were collections of French medals and coins, English coins, German and other European series, long runs of ancient Greek and Roman coins, etc. Buyers included Joseph J. Mickley, Richard Wister Davids, Charles I. Bushnell, Henry Muhlenberg, Ammi Brown, Jeremiah Colburn, James H. Taylor, Henry Cook, and Jacob Giles Morris. Attinelli wrote in Numisgraphics (page 8) that, "This is, it is believed, the first coin sale in this country, in which sufficient interest was manifested by numismatists to take note of the prices paid for coins, and who were the purchasers." This copy belonged to Richard Wistar Davis, who initialed it on the first page.



Davids was perhaps the most prominent numismatist to fall in battle during the Civil War. Best known for having edited the *Catalogue of the Coins and Medals, Ancient and Modern, New York State Library,* which was published in 1853, Davids enlisted as a 1st Lieutenant with the 118th Pennsylvania Volunteers (Infantry) on August 23, 1862, and was promoted to Captain on January 12, 1863. He was killed in battle on July 2, 1863, the second day of the Battle of Gettysburg, the turning point of the war. He was 37, meaning that he was probably 25 at the time of the Roper sale. This is one of the great landmarks in American numismatic literature, and is rare, with perhaps a dozen or so copies known. This copy is from the first state, which lacks the Thomas firm's full "Philada." address at the base of the last page (*vide* P. Scott Rubin's "Variants of the 1851 Roper Auction Sale Catalogue," in the Fall 1998 issue of *The Asylum*).

Founded by Bernard Rome, the Teletrade sales attempted to automate the buying and selling of certified coins through the use of VHS preview tapes, cheaply printed catalogues, and the use of 800 numbers to place bids. Cataloguing is terse, and multiple sales would be combined into one catalogue, so that the entire 838 catalogues comprising this lot fit into two banker's boxes with room to spare. While the importance of this series is difficult to understate, it must be acknowledged that this may be the most complete set of these anywhere.

The First Photographic Representation of an 1804 Dollar

The Exceptionally Rare 1884 Adolph Weyl Sale


An exceptionally rare auction catalogue featuring an important collection of coins and medals of America, most notable for its photographically printed illustration depicting what is now known as the Dexter specimen of the 1804 dollar. Not in the library of the American Numismatic Society and, apparently, it had not been seen by Newman or Bressett when their classic work The Fantastic 1804 Dollar was published in 1962. The Lichtdruck illustration, produced through a proprietary collotype process, has been the source of much confusion through the years. The conjecture that the illustration was that of an electrotype of the Idler 1804 dollar is certainly mistaken. The 1804 dollar depicted is clearly Type 1 without any signs of wear, consistent with the Dexter specimen, although the portion of the edge depicted [DOLLAR ** O] appears to be relatively distinct except for the second L and the R. Lichtdruck illustrations, while of excellent quality, are photographically printed from plaster casts and, though the quality of detail is excellent, toning or proof surfaces are not apparent. This might account for the differences perceived by Ed Frossard when comparing it with the same coin sold in 1885 by the Chapmans, these "differences" apparently being the basis for the Idler electrotype theory. Nearly all European auction catalogues of the 19th century that include illustrations of coins provided those illustrations through collotypes or similar techniques based on plaster casts; American catalogues of the time period used a variety of photographic printing techniques based usually upon photographs of the coins themselves. A lack of familiarity with collotype-illustrated catalogues led some American numismatists to suspect that Weyl didn't even possess the coin in the question. (As an aside, we mention that the image of the coin's edge lettering seems not to have been produced with the Lichtdruck technique, but with a more directly photographic technique, which may have been more appropriate for this type of image—possibly the first of its kind.)

That such a rare American coin would appear in a German auction is not as unlikely as it might initially appear to be. During this time period, the Weyl firm made a specialty of offering important collections of überseeischer Münzen, often featuring extensive selections of North, Central and South American coins, tokens and medals. The famous 1879 Fonrobert sale, for example, featured over 6,000 lots of North American coins, tokens and medals and several thousand Central and South American lots. In addition, while the 1804 dollar stands out, the American coins in the sale clearly formed a meaningful collection. The assertion the Chapman brothers might have "laundered" this coin also needs reassessment. It is true that the Chapman brothers regularly traveled to Europe to attend major coin auctions and Samuel Hudson is known to have participated in archaeological excavations there. Indeed, John W. Adams has speculated that S.H.'s "summer-long 'research' trips to the continent" may have been a factor in the breakup of the broth-



ers' partnership. Thus, it would appear to be quite possible that the collection was viewed by the Chapmans sometime during the summer of 1884 (nearly a year elapsed between the June 9-14, 1884 sale of the Warner collection and their next sale, the May 14-15, 1885 sale featuring the "Weyl" dollar, in which sale a number of other Weyl acquisitions were also offered). If the coin was indeed "planted," the Chapmans may still be prime suspects but it is also possible that another American dealer or source near the Mint placed it since a number of other coins in the sale appear to be consistent with the Mint's early sub-rosa collector marketing programs. Weyl termed the 1804 dollar in the sale "tadellos, noch nicht im Verkehr gewesen" (flawless, uncirculated), going on to comment on the similarity of the coin to the Cohen specimen and the quality of the edge lettering "Genau mit der Abbildung der im Jahre 1875 zu New-York versteigerten No. 535 der Collection Cohen übereinstimmend; Randschrift jedoch auf vorgliegendem Exemplar nur schwach ausgeprägt." No reference is made to the choice Sanford 1804 dollar sold the year before Cohen's, perhaps a ploy to accentuate the superiority of the Weyl coin over the Cohen dollar. This is one of only two examples of this catalogue that we have offered at auction (though we have sold one other copy privately). This copy derived from the library of the Antiquarian and Numismatic Society of Montreal (probably having been part of the library of Robert Wallace McLachlan, which was transferred to the Chateau de Ramezay in 1922) was sold in the 14th Kolbe/Spink sale in 1995 (lot 370). In our Sale 143 (2016), we sold a copy that had previously been part of the library of Kenyon Painter. That copy realized \$4000 hammer. Interestingly, all three copies we have handled have been removed from previous bindings. A fabled rarity, of considerable historical and numismatic importance.



Succinctly written and modest in appearance, this and Woodward's following few sales hardly hinted at the authoritative cataloguing and handsomely produced volumes that were to come. Adams's dictum bears repeating: "Strobridge knew more about coins. Cogan was more strongly established. The Chapmans had better photography. And yet the Woodward auction catalogs, taken as a whole, stand above all others." This is the first individual copy we have offered in twenty years. Attinelli 18–19. Noting the rarity of thick paper and plated Woodward catalogues in his *United States Numismatic Literature, Volume I*, John W. Adams wrote: "Also rare are sales A, 2 & 3. However, by far the rarest are sales 1 and 92. A.P. Wylie, the owner of a famous hoard of Woodward catalogs, used to advertise a standing offer to exchange a gold dollar for either number 1 or 92—and this was back in the days when a gold dollar had real value and auction catalogs were used for insulating the attic!" While our perception of the rarity of Sale 92 has changed somewhat over the years, Sale 1 remains among the rarest of Woodward catalogues. Davis reported no copies having been publicly sold between 1980 and 1991; Moulton's 2005 census listed two copies (this copy was not included). A rare opportunity. 





An incomplete copy of this rare and very important, if mostly non-numismatic, Woodward sale. Among the most important sales of American books to take place in the 19th century, with total sales of over \$10,000. Woodward's library was composed almost entirely of American imprints, and is outstanding in local history and in Massachusetts works in general, with impressive offerings of Mather Family imprints and other early publications (his copy of Cotton Mather's Wonders of the Invisible World brought \$290, an extraordinary price for the time). A handful of numismatic titles can be found throughout. One wonders why Woodward chose not to list this catalogue among his emissions. It is clear from the preface that the library belonged to him and that he catalogued it. In addition, a goodly number of antiquarian and current numismatic books are featured in the sale, including as he notes, "works relating to the paper money of the period of the Revolution." The omission becomes all the more perplexing when one considers the minimal numismatic content of some of his later numbered sales. In consequence of Woodward's silence, this sale catalogue is little known in numismatic circles. It is safe to assume that most of the copies extant are to be found in the libraries of collectors of books on America. It has been noted that the title page of this catalogue indicates nothing in the way of it being an auction catalogue. 

Charles Davis recorded two offerings of this catalogue between 1980 and 1991 (as opposed to only one offering of Sale 92), but Karl Moulton's 2005 census listed only two copies of Sale 91 but five copies of Sale 92. I traced eleven separate copies of Sale 92 in a census published in the Spring 2003 issue of *The Asylum*, including copies in institutional libraries. I missed at least one, but one listed copy was destroyed in a recent wildfire, so that number probably remains reasonably accurate. This catalogue is very likely less common.

I described this copy in my 2003 census as residing in a New Jersey library, and noted that it had been "purchased along with a long run of Woodward catalogues from Ed Hipps in the early 1970s or possibly earlier."
