



The separately printed 1618 edition of the second part of the earliest substantial work to organize the documentation for the early fasti of Rome, using coins and monuments as the source material. Christian Dekesel (Hubert Goltzius: The Father of Ancient Numismatics, 1988) notes that Goltzius "was granted an official Roman citizenship on May 7th 1567" for this work on Roman feasts. Hubert Goltz (1526-1583) published his first book, Icones imperatorum, in 1557 at the age of 21. He subsequently traveled through Germany, France and Italy, examining collections of antiquities to advance his research. Upon his return to Bruges in 1560, he sought to publish the great wealth of material he had accumulated. Accordingly, he set up a printing press in his home and supervised the execution of the numerous prints that were to accompany his works, often engraving the plates himself. Dekesel writes that "The influence of Hubertus Goltzius upon numismatics is mostly underestimated. One forgets very easily that he was the first author who wrote and published a comprehensive view upon the coinage of the Ancients and that he was also the first to do that on the basis of a real contact with some of the great coin cabinets of the civilized Renaissance world." Ferdinando Bassoli notes that "the writers and illustrators of the following two centuries would not have been able to do without him" (Antiquarian Books on Coins and Medals, 16), and Ernest Babelon agreed, saying that "Hubert Goltz contributed more than any of his contemporaries to the spread of interest in numismatics. 





A scarce volume. Onofrio Panvinio (1529–1568), was a polymath, scholar, and Augustinian monk who served as librarian to Cardinal Alessandro Farnese, a great collector of Roman sculpture. Published by the Italian antiquarian Jacob de Strada (1505–1588), this first edition of Panvinio's *Fasti et triumphi* was plagued by production errors, forcing Strada "to find a new publisher to print a corrected, but unillustrated, edition the next year" (*Numismatics in the Age of Grolier*, page 41). John Cunnally (*Images of the Illustrious*, pages 31–32), places the blame for the errors on Strada himself, and states that it was



actually Panvinio who sought out another printer for a corrected edition. Cunnally cites letters by Antonio Agustín to Panvinio in which the problem is discussed in some detail. According to Ferdinando Bassoli, this, Panvinio's numismatic magnum opus, is "illustrated with Strada's engravings, set this time in a more serious historical context" (Antiquarian Books on Coins and Medals, page 17). Strada's handsome, visually appealing illustrations, originally appearing in 1553, are similar in appearance to those found in Fulvio and Huttich, the first two illustrated numismatic books. Dekesel, in his 1991 study of Twelve Highlights from the Numismatic Book Collection in the Herzog August Bibliothek (Augusteer) in Wolfenbuttel (BRD), criticizes the number of pagination errors, but concludes that it remains of some importance, particularly as a production of de Strada utilizing his previous Epitome thesauri. 
A very important copy of this landmark work. Based on Woodin's extensive holdings, the Adams-Woodin compilation was a quantum leap over what little had previously been published on patterns. For half a century, it remained the standard reference on these fascinating pieces. This copy has been heavily annotated by Abe Kosoff, who was intimately involved with the development of the Judd pattern book that took the AW volume's place as the standard work on the subject. The annotations are mostly in blue and red pencil, with blue indicating those pieces in the Newcomer-Boyd collections, and the red indicating those derived from the Woodin-Newcomer-Green-Boyd pedigree chain. Other known examples are recorded, usually in regular pencil, along with prices. Entries are crossed out where erroneous, and additional information added where necessary. On the front flyleaf are notes on the diagnostic fea-



tures of 1804 dollars, while the verso of the rear flyleaf includes a listing of the pieces dated 1883 and 1884 struck at the Philadelphia Mint for the Kingdom of Hawaii. This copy has been in the same hands since 1983, when it was purchased at Jack Collins's first numismatic literature sale; Kosoff's second annotated copy, also included in that sale, was sold to Armand Champa. Copper, only one specimen known"; "struck outside of mint" written after Nos. 27 & 28, which have been lined through; "Both out. Not struck at mint" written after Nos. 29 & 30; following 1848 Quarter Eagle, 1848: "Have classified my spec. under Territorial coins of California"; "193A. Eagle, slightly dif. Die, platinum"; and 827, "struck on five-cent planchet." Present as well are 5 typewritten sheets formatted in typical Adams style, with 16 photographs of coins cut to size and mounted preceding the descriptions, listing thirty-one 1838 & 1839 half dollar pieces, a few with notes such as "Does not exist" or "I have never seen..." Also present are added typescript pages listing Nos. 451-454, 454A, 455-457, & 457A-F, and pages reordering Nos. 480-85, and 508-527. There are also three pages of typescript listing twenty-five 1867 nickels, thirteen of which are accompanied by photographs, and another page listing Nos. 684-698A, with photographs of No. 687. Wayte Raymond's handwritten listing of minor patterns, annotated in pencil, on over a dozen sheets is accompanied by a typewritten September 25, 1946 letter from Lenox R. Lohr, signed, on Museum



of Science and Industry, Chicago stationery (Lohr is listed as President), to Wayte Raymond, reading in part: "I am returning herewith your check list of pattern nickels with pencil notations as suggested by comparison with my own collection... Some of the very distinctive patterns were apparently omitted from your list. I have listed them on the attached sheet [also present here] ... If you come into possession of any patterns, trials, or die strikes, I wish you would send them on to me for inspection." Ex John J. Citing from the preface: "The regular edition of *Comitia Americana and Related Medals* has been shaped for the scholar and the collector... The special edition at hand is intended to serve a different purpose. Here, the authors' objective is to place the reader in a closer relationship with the historical events that are described. The two centuries that lie between the American Revolution and the present day are neatly bridged by the inclusion of a leaf from a book published in 1878. Joseph Florimond Loubat's *Medal*-

lic History of the United States is the spiritual ancestor of the present volume. Elegantly printed on sumptuous paper, Loubat's magnum opus sets a standard of scholarly excellence that has not been matched and to which, immodestly, we aspire. Sage in the past, but Q. David Bowers making a good case against this (as Sage would have been too young to have catalogued it) and suggesting Charles I. Bushnell as a possibility. Flandin (whose actual first name was Pierre, according to Pete Smith) was a collector as early as 1822. His collection consisted mostly of ancient and European coins, but did contain some early American coins and Washington material, as well as federal coins including a proof 1850 dollar. Total proceeds for the sale were \$733.52. A scarce catalogue, especially priced and named. Flandin appears to have bought back a number of lots. While household names like Bushnell and Chilton are recorded after a number of lots, none of the dealers who burst upon the scene in the following decade appear to have attended the sale, and most of the other participants (Gsell, Carlisle, Burtis, Borg, Reiley, Creighton, Boardman, et al.) appear to have been of an earlier generation, and are little known today. One of the earliest issues of this interesting publication that we have handled. Very rare: the Ford library, notable for his collection of counterfeit detectors and bank note reporters, had no Bicknell publications. Dillistin pages 125-128: "In 1830, when there were approximately 330 banks operating in this country, Robert T. Bicknell, a lottery broker in Philadelphia, began the publication of a bank note reporter and counterfeit detector. He was the pioneer in this field in Philadelphia and was preceded only by Mahlon Day and S.J. Sylvester in New York." Bicknell died in 1839, only 33 years of age. The publication was continued for years thereafter, however, by Matthew T. Miller, who continued the publication until 1857. Most interesting is the "Bank Note List" on the last page of each issue, listing by state the various American banks of issue, along with those of Canada. There are columns for "Name," "Location," and "Discount in Philadelphia." The last column includes designations such as fraud, closed and failed. An asterisk by a bank denotes that "there are either counterfeit or altered notes, of various denominations, in circulation throughout the United States." This issue also contains short interior articles on bank failures and the importation of specie. By their very nature, bank note reporters and counterfeit detectors had a limited shelf life, and very few copies have survived.





Not only was the research and composition of the work done almost entirely by Crosby, ultimately he also had to publish it. "It is truly the keystone to any library of American coinage." — Eric P. Newman. This copy includes some of the materials that were only sent to original subscribers to the text, which was printed in installments and sent to subscribers in eleven separate installments; the un-







Even the finest engravers often had to turn their skills to more practical matters, however, and Durand is wellknown in numismatic circles today for his work in bank note engraving. Two of the plates present in this volume depict three bank note vignettes apiece. Durand is also famous in philately for having engraved the iconic portrait of Benjamin Franklin used on the 1847 5¢ issue (Scott 1). The breathtaking illustrations produced for this important biography of this American artist (written by his son) have made it a celebrated volume in a number of areas of collecting. We sold a copy of the regular edition in a recent sale for \$660 including the premium; this may be the first time we have offered a largepaper copy. The binding is signed (with a diminutive ink stamp) as the work of R.W. Smith.



Unplated rarities are perhaps best represented by the first sale here present: Adams A, a March 5, 1903 mail-bid sale held in "Pittsburg" (the spelling was changed in 1911), where he was living before his move to New York. This is a very rare catalogue, and the copy in the Adams Library sale (lot 123) realized \$6500 hammer on what turned out to be an exceptionally low \$500 estimate. In the preface, Frossard notes that "It is but just to my collaborator, Mr. Hays, the man through whose patience and perseverance a complete set of the 1794 Cents was collected, that the varieties in this new classification should bear his name. For this reason, it is desired that when referring to this work the varieties should be announced and known as Hays. No. 1, 2, 3, etc." The book itself is a handsome production, decorative yet finely illustrated. Depicting every variety, it set a high standard for subsequent specialized cent monographs. First binding variant (crimson cloth, one inch decorative bands at top and bottom, without inner filigree to cover device). Until Sheldon's Early American Cents, the primary work on the subject. Only 250 copies printed, all of them poorly bound, with cracked hinges and other problems being the rule rather than the exception. 

This interesting volume was published by Hodges in lieu of the usual *Bank Note Safe-Guard* for 1859, and is very rarely seen, with the examples from the Newman and Ford Libraries being the only other copies of which we are aware to have appeared in a numismatic auction. Not listed in Sigler or the American Numismatic Society *Dictionary Catalogue*. Dillistin page 144: "This publication followed the same format as that of Thompson's list. Apparently they both first appeared in 1859. Just who was the originator of this type of publication is not known. While it appears that Thompson issued at least thirty-one editions of his descriptive list, only one edition of Hodge's list was found." 

Earliest Known Illustration of a U.S. Coin and First \$ in Print

This early American accounting and bookkeeping manual contains what is generally believed to be the first appearance in print of the dollar sign (\$). It also includes, as a frontispiece, an engraving depicting a 1795 U.S. eagle, which Eric Newman has called "the earliest known illustration of a United States coin." Also included on the engraving are the Spanish pistole, French "guinea," British guinea, and Portuguese Johannes and half moidore. The book consists of a series of practical lessons for clerks. The dollar sign, which appears on page 56 for the first time and then throughout the volume, is a typographical approximation based upon the handwritten dollar sign used by some during the period. It resembles our own, but also differs from it. Much as a typographical ampersand is much more stylized than most of our handwritten ampersands, this initial attempt at a dollar sign in type is less a strict representation of the handwritten sign than an attempt to establish a similar sign for more formal treatment in type. A scarce volume, of exceptionally high importance. For a fascinating, if at times controversial, overview of the history of the dollar sign, see Eric P. Newman's "The Dollar \$ign: Its Written and Printed Origin" in America's Silver Dollars (New York: ANS, 1995). Evans 32366: "It is claimed that this work was the first to use the dollar mark, \$." Only a few of these sets, bound in groups by Kosoff at the time, were issued. Though lacking the panache of his later emissions, these early catalogues reveal two factors contributing to Kosoff's success: hard work and great ambition. A third, his fabled interpersonal skills, is perhaps best understood in a response often related by John Ford. It goes something like this: John, you don't necessarily need to know everything about a coin, you just need to know the person to whom you are selling it. Notably present here are the long series of Julius Guttag sales and the Higgy sale, considered by Kosoff to be the beginning of the modern coin market. Also included is a 4-page handwritten letter from Homer K. Downing to "Pvt. J.J. Ford, Jr.," stationed at Fort Monmouth, in the original mailing envelope, postmarked February 21, 1943, concerning Kosoff's February 27, 1943 sale, noting that Downing "Went down to 50th St. today and checked up on all the lots we are interested in..." After discussing the merits of several large cents, Downing goes on to provide his appraisal of a number of numismatic books of interest to Ford, including a near complete set of the American Journal of Numismatics, and a number of plated catalogues. These were the days when plated copies of Elder's Woodin and Gschwend sales were sold as a single lot, bringing all of \$2.75 according to the prices realized list. Downing seeks Ford's advice on a number of lots in the sale and also notes that he "Can buy a brand new copy of Maris Jersey Cents from H.C. H. [Hines]. What is it worth. Let me know soon while he is in the mood. He also has a Gem Silver Proof Set of 1864... What should I give him for it?" A postcard from Abe Kosoff dated August 27, 1943, addressed to "Pvt. Ford," is also present, advising him that his "copies of the Higgy catalog were mailed out on August 19th and should have reached Rockville Centre by this time." Ex John J. Mason's Final Magazines

comes "Collector's" and "Price Current" is moved to the lower half of

the cover, revised to read "Coin Price Current." The drop-title remains "Mason's Coin Collectors' Magazine" throughout. Mason's phoenix-like series of periodicals spanned nearly a quarter century, comprising by his reckoning a total of fourteen volumes. These final two volumes rarely appear for sale (the last one isn't even listed by Bourne). Though he lived another decade, his last coin auction sale was held in Boston in June 1890. The move to Philadelphia late in the same year apparently presaged his departure from commercial numismatics. In the final March 1891 issue of the magazine he advertises for a "Partner Wanted," who would "take an indoor position in our store, near the U.S. Mint... the duties of outside coin collecting, in both hemispheres, and absence during the summer months of the present proprietor renders it necessary that an assistant (only as a full partner) is necessary." The impression of an idle dilettante making grand tours of the Continent sadly appears to be at odds with reality. In Mason's obituary appearing in the January, 1902 issue of the American Journal of Numismatics, his colleague Lyman Low wrote in closing: "He was a man of energy and upright in all his dealings, and though the latter years of his life were not crowned with the success which human judgment thought he had deserved, he left a large circle of friends who will ever cherish his memory." John Adams's paean to the man also bears repeating: "Ebenezer Mason did a great deal to promote numismatics and to push back the borders of its ignorance. His enthusiasm was, commercially speaking, poorly compensated. However, one often senses in his writings that he was speaking to posterity. Perhaps, he realized that many of his contributions would survive and the immortality so envisioned served to soften the hardships of financial failure."



The first plate depicts gold coins: ancient Roman and Byzantine, a Brasher doubloon, and United States gold coins. The second plate illustrates rare United States silver coins (1794 dollar, 1796, 1797 and 1838-O half dollars, rare Seated Liberty dollars), and the third plate depicts colonials, half cents, large cents, and other copper rarities (a Baker 288 Masonic medal in brass, a Non Vi, exceptional large cents and the 1794 dollar in copper). A saleroom copy of this rare and important catalogue, with the full complement of plates, and annotated with priced and names recorded. An outstanding sale, rated A+ by Adams: "Absolutely definitive for patterns, colonials (several unique), and regular issue gold, silver and copper." Parmelee's remarkable collection has frequently been regarded as the finest collection of American coins ever formed. One hundred copies were issued with plates (though most haven't survived), attractively tinted to approximate the metal color of the coins depicted. The presentation of the Federal issues is unusual. Arranged chronologically rather than by denomination, this innovation was not well received at the time, and has seldom been used since. A famous and highly successful Boston bean baker, Parmelee began collecting coins by sorting through the large cents from his daily receipts. He sold duplicates but continually upgraded his personal collection. In his first major coup, he purchased the superb collection formed by George F. Seavey, which was slated to be sold at auction. He acquired the Brevoort collection in 1876, the magnificent Bushnell collection in 1882, and purchased many rarities from Sylvester Crosby. The first two plates illustrate copper patterns and colonials; plates 3 and 4 depict silver patterns and colonials; plate 5 illustrates copper colonials and Washingtonia; plate 6 is mainly devoted to early cents and half cents; plates 7 and 8 largely depict superb early United States silver coins; plates 9 and 10 are devoted to choice cents and half cents; plates 11 and 12 mainly illustrate United States and gold patterns, including a Brasher doubloon; and the final plate is devoted to large denomination nineteenth-century United States silver coins. Copies with the buyers' names recorded (even in abbreviated form, as here) are rare and very useful for provenance research. Buyers included Clay, Ropes, Hall, Newlin, Warner, Jenks, Mougey, Wilson, Mills, Crosby, and many others, in addition to virtually all of the major U.S. dealers of the day. Ex John J. Completed four years earlier, Newcomb's work was not published until 1944 due to the war. One thousand copies were printed. It marked a great improvement over the pioneering work of Frank Andrews, nearly doubling the variety listings, and stood as the standard work for half a century. The result of many years of painstaking study, relatively few new varieties were discovered in the intervening years. The scarce first printing of this classic work, copies of which are more accurately considered bound page proofs issued in very small numbers immediately before the presses were fired up to print the entire run. Indeed, this copy is identified by the authors as exactly that: "Bound page proofs in need of correction," reads the inscription dated Sept. 12, 1962 and signed by both Newman and Bressett. The backstory behind this volume is the stuff of numismatic legend. Newman and Bressett's work had led them to the conclusion that the story of sets of 1834 and 1804 coins being issued for the Imam of Muscat and the King of Siam were myths—there was no evidence of such gifts having been issued. The book was due to be printed during the 1962 ANA convention, at which the discovery of the King of Siam set (including the 1804 dollar) was announced by David Spink and James Risk. This announcement elicited a frantic application of editorial brakes, as Newman and Bressett had to accommodate this new information and revise their publication to take it into account. What turned out to be an outstanding numismatic work could have been issued with a major flaw had it been prepared in time

to be on sale at the ANA. See the extensive article by Len Augsburger and Joel Orosz in the Winter 2020 edition of *The Asylum*. With the bookplate of C. Howard Colket, who joined the society in 1893 and served as its librarian from 1912–1919. Colket noted that this volume was bound on April 7, 1909 for the cost of \$1.50. Founded in January 1858, three months before the formation of the American Numismatic Society, the Numismatic Society of Philadelphia was created when eight local numismatists "who had long felt the want of such an association, organized a society for the purpose of prosecuting their favorite study in a more systematic and satisfactory manner. The mania for coin collecting was then raging fiercely, and desires had arisen with very many persons to become better acquainted with the science" — *Proceedings*, 1867.

At the time of publication, James F. and Nancy Ruddy were located in Hollywood "directly across from the famous Grauman's Chinese Theatre." After the

brief interregnum documented by the *Reviews*, they once again joined forces with Q. David Bowers, and it was here, in the glory days of the 1970s, that the firm started their march to the front ranks of commercial American numismatics. Given their modest appearance, few examples of *Ruddy's Review* were saved, and complete sets remain quite rare.

The Day the Mint Opened

A scarce sale, of enormous importance for colonial and state coinages, most especially the New Jersey coppers. Best known today for his seminal work on the New Jersey pieces, Maris also is credited with the first serious works on the die varieties of 1794 U.S. large cents. The sale appears to have generated some controversy. Maris issued a circular on May 15, 1886, announcing that his collection was to be sold at the auction house of Stan. V. Henkels of Philadelphia. Maris writes in this circular that "The most important of the Colonials will comprise my entire collection of the coins of New Jersey. This will include specimens, or copies of all known New Jerseys, of undoubted genuineness, together with some counterfeits of that period. Also, those which were struck over the Connecticut, Vermont, Nova Constellatio, English, Irish and French coppers; one in brass; one in a mixed metal; one with a small piece of silver in the plow handle; and many other pieces showing fracture of the dies." In an unusual move, Maris catalogued his collection himself. This apparently irritated some coin dealers, who resented this intrusion onto their turf. Catalogued by the London firm of Baldwin's, great rarities from the Woodin, Earle, Colonel Green and other great American collections were often placed in group lots, e.g., a 1913 Liberty Head nickel and pattern United States gold coins. The onerous financial requirements imposed by the Egyptian Government combined with reported dealer collusion appears to have stifled widespread competition and many bargains were to be had by those brave enough to venture to Cairo. 

The 1850 Mint Report, as transmitted by President Millard Fillmore and written by Mint Director Robert Patterson. The influx of gold from California is starting to be felt in earnest, and Patterson's comments on this subject are both interesting and important. After providing an overview of operations and production at the Philadelphia and branch mints, Patterson writes, "From these tables it may be perceived that the operations of the mints during the past year have been unprecedented in our history. The largest coinages before executed were in 1847 and in 1843 the total amount at all the mints being, in the former year, \$22,657,672; in the latter year \$11,967,830. But the coinage of 1850 exceeded that of 1847 by over \$11,000,000, and was nearly three times that of 1843. At the Philadelphia mint the coinage of the past year was nearly twice that of 1847, and over four times that of 1843. The increase in the proportion of our gold to our silver deposites, and the enormous amount of the former, derived from the mines of the United States, are deserving of especial notice. Of the bullion received the silver comprised less than a twentieth part of the whole value; and even of this small proportion as much as one-eighth was derived by separation from the California gold. Of the deposites of gold received, only about one thirty fifth part was in

foreign coins or bullion. The remainder, amounting to \$36,938,314, was of United States production, of which \$36,273,097 were from California. The entire receipts from that source, from the discovery of the mines to the close of 1850, were \$42,469,758." Mint Reports from this period are decidedly scarce. This is a very important Mint Report, reflecting the extraordinary effects of the Gold Rush on this nation's economy.

"Alexandre Vattemare is recognized among American numismatists as one of the fathers of the discipline in the New World, having assembled the first comprehensive collections of American coins, medals, and paper currency, and produced the first comprehensive catalog of American numismatics." — Alan Stahl, in *The Extravagant Ambassador: The True Story of Alexandre Vattemare, the French Ventriloquist Who Changed the World.* Vattemare developed the System of International Exchanges, initially aimed at the exchange of duplicate books between libraries, especially government publications, and later extended to include works of art, maps, natural history specimens, coins, medals and other similar objects. He came to America in 1839 and again in 1847, and was granted funds by Congress and by several state legislatures to further his scheme, which met with greater success here than in Europe.

This elusive 1861 work describing American coins, medals and tokens from 1652 to 1858 was written to complement the collection given to the Bibliothèque Impériale (Nationale) in the name of the government and citizens of the United States. Following an interesting historical overview, from colonial issues to pioneer gold, some 381 pieces are described in detail. Scarce and important. Ex Richard E. Margolis Library.







While Colletti reports that around 1100 copies were thus bound, few of them were signed by editor Ken Bressett, as was this one.
