- 41 very fine full-page plates, engraved by [Simon, some say Giles Jodelet] de La Boissière (a number of them signed De la Boissière, De la Boissière fecit, or De Laboissière fecit), usually depicting the obverse and reverse of eight ancient Greek or, mainly, Roman portrait coins (some roundels are blank, as printed), each within a decorative cartouche incorporating a fleur de lis, all on a finely hatched background.

The volume as a whole is in poor condition. The binding is very worn, with most of the backstrip lacking and severe wear to the board surfaces, corners and edges; both flyleaves are missing. The full complement of ancient coins plates are present; while additional plates of French medals were made as part of the *Cabinet du Roy* series, it is apparent that no others were bound in with this volume. The plates are stained throughout. The staining affects the fore-edge throughout the entire volume and is frequently but not always present along the gutter margin. The discoloration affects some plate images and is likely an old mildew stain. There is no discernable odor, so the stain appears to be inactive. The paper may be able to be improved by a conservator, but we make no guarantees of this and the volume is sold as is.

A very rare and important set of engravings, depicting coins and medals in the coin collection formed by Louis XIV. Le Roi Soleil (1638-1715) remains one of the most renowned coin collectors of all time. As a boy, Louis was instructed in the art of numismatics by the engraver Jean Varin. In his twenties he was bequeathed the outstanding collection of coins formed by his uncle, Gaston, duc d'Orléans, who died in 1660. Overnight, Louis became a coin collector, an avocation he pursued with great relish for the remainder of his life. With the counsel of his Finance Minister, Jean-Baptiste Colbert, and a coterie of the outstanding numismatists of the day, he subsequently assembled one of the finest coin cabinets in Europe. His chief purchasing agent was Jean Foy-Vaillant; André Morell served as custodian of the collection; Claude du Molinet also worked in the coin cabinet, as did others. Between 1680 and 1687, Morell studied the royal coin cabinet, intending to publish an inventory of the collection. It is likely that the remarkable series of plates present here were prepared under his supervision. In Numismatics—An Ancient Science, Elvira Clain-Stefanelli observes that "Morell, an exceptionally gifted scholar and an excellent designer, conceived of his work as a general synopsis ('recueil') of all existing ancient coins in European collections. He intended to accompany his descriptions with adequate draw-



ings. This plan, a revival of Lazius' 'corpus' idea, was doomed to failure, and Morell never succeeded in fulfilling his dream." The only fruit of Morell's labors in the royal collection appears to be the remarkable series of coin plates offered here. These plates were commissioned by Louis XIV himself, comprising the third part of his famous Cabinet du roi series (a collection of engravings of treasures from the royal collection known by that name), culminating in an oeuvre of over twenty series of plates depicting various works of art and curiosities, issued over a number of years. Generally, these engravings were issued as individual plates (broadsheets) and the coin engravings were no exception. Few sets of those loose plates appear to have survived. On some, perhaps all, the obverse and reverse ligatures of individual coins feature engraved sequential numbers. These were effaced from the plates prior to printing the book version (though several ligatures connecting images depicted at the end of one line and beginning of the next remain: 59, 61, 63, 85, 97, 223 and 235); diminutively engraved Arabic numerals have been added, centered at the top of each engraving, apparently as a guide to the binder for proper collation and/or as an aid to the user. Indisputably, the volume at hand was specifically designed and fabricated as a book.



It is printed on folios (one plate impression on one side, another opposite on the other side), which were then folded in half, gathered, and sewn in signatures. An examination of the chain lines verifies this: in the book version, the chain lines on both plates and blanks are vertical, corresponding to a folded folio sheet, while copies of the individually printed broadsheet plates feature the horizontal chain lines of unfolded sheets. We know of four other copies of this volume, three of which are composed solely of the ancient coins plates, while an example sold by Sotheby's in 2012 includes, like the present volume, additional plates depicting French medals. A copy in the Bibliothèque Nationale is found with a superbly engraved allegorical frontispiece by Charles Simonneau l'aîné after Antoine Coypel, with the royal portrait by Hyacinthe Rigaud: this, however, is a later addition, as that frontispiece was created for use in the 1702 Médailles volume published by the Académie Royale des Médailles et des Inscriptions mentioned above and is based on Rigaud's 1701 painting. Were it not for a 1704, "second" edition, these plates depicting the ancient coin collection of Louis Quatorze would today be little known. That later work was published in "Eleutheropolis," under the anonymous supervision of Laurenz Beger, a talented and prolific

numismatic author. Those plates were entirely re-engraved and largely mirror those of the original edition, although there are minor differences (including an engraved "Æ" on many of the 1682 coin illustrations). They suffer greatly in comparison with the original 1682 engravings, which are far more skillfully executed and esthetically appealing. The blossoming of numismatics as a science in France coincides with the reign of Louis XIV. Indeed, the first comprehensive work on French metropolitan coins appeared at the end of the decade following publication of the present volume of ancient coins in the royal collection. In our 2015 New York Book Auction (lot 156), we sold a copy of the ancient plates only (albeit in a much better state of preservation) for \$17,000 hammer; that volume later sold as lot 72 in our 2018 New York Book Auction for \$13,000 hammer. While the condition of the current volume presents challenges, the plates remain of considerable importance and their rarity remains. Brückmann 74 (under Medaillons, undated). 

A rare work. Onofrio Panvinio (1529/30–1568) was a polymath, scholar, and Augustinian monk from Verona, though he spent much time in Rome. Babelon notes that his work was encouraged by Emperor Ferdinand I, who had acquired the coin collection of Jacob de Strada. Strada's 1557 edition of Panvinio's *Fasti et triumphi Romanorum* is well-known, if flawed. The present work, the first edition of a posthumous compendium, "is illustrated with images taken from Jacopo de Strada's collection," according to Babelon (*Ancient Numismatics and Its History*, page 81, note 51. While Panvinio's legacy is not above reproach (Cunnally notes his proclivity for inventing counterfeit inscriptions: see *Images of the Illustrious: The Numismatic Presence in the Renaissance*, page 48), his work remains of considerable importance even today. This copy includes a plate not called for by Dekesel, indicated as page Bb and referenced on page 111 of the first title (though bound, along with another



The handsome illustrations are similar in appearance to those found in Fulvio and Huttich, the first two illustrated numismatic books. The printer, Andreas Gessner, had the original woodcuts of coins found in the first edition (generally attributed to Bernard Saloon) carefully copied, probably by Petit Bernard. Especially important for the history of numismatics was Vico's insistence that ancient coins were actually struck as currency for circulation, in contrast to the opinion of his rival Sebastiano Erizzo, who argued that these beautiful coins were produced as commemorative medals and objects of art, and were not seen or handled by the vulgar." 

A small stain permeates the first several leaves, including the frontispiece and title, but fades by the time one reaches Plate 8. Occasional marginal discoloration or folded corners. Good overall, but with most leaves being very good. \$1000 The first edition of perhaps the most sumptuous numismatic work ever produced. Médailles sur les principaux événements du règne de Louis le Grand was created by the Académie Royale des Médailles et des Inscriptions and was intended not simply to be a record of the medals of Louis XIV, but a carefully constructed history of his reign. In The Fabrication of Louis XIV, Peter Burke discusses the publication of this work. The king himself was deeply involved in its execution and wished to supplant the previous work on the subject by Claude-François Ménestrier. Burke states that the decision to exclude certain medals was made at the highest levels. From the birth of Louis XIV in 1638 and his ascension to the throne on the death of Louis XIII less than five years later, this work traces the important events in the life of this illustrious monarch as well as the history of France itself. Louis was intensely interested in the arts and did much to create the reputation France still enjoys as a worldwide center of culture. He was determined to expand the royal coin cabinet and issued commemorative medals on many occasions. The historical series of medals struck under this project have been called "the most sophisticated, coherent and numerous body of medals ever produced to commemorate the life and rule of a single figure (Robert Wellington, Antiquarianism and the Visual Histories of Louis XIV: Artifacts for a Future Past, page 40). This devotion to numismatics and historiography is reflected in the physical production of this volume. The finest engravers were hired, the best paper available was used, and the bindings tend to be beautiful and ornate. One does not acquire the sobriquet Le Roi Soleil due to one's simplicity of taste. Even the font used to print the text was specially created for Louis: Romain du Roy was designed by Philippe Grandjean (1666-1714) around



printed in this font, which attempted to use scientific principles to develop a font that was both practical and elegant. Only the royal press could use the fonts, which continued to be developed through 1745. The historical descriptions of the medals were written by Nicolas Boileau-Despréaux (1636–1711), and the engravings and other artistic flourishes required the participation of artists Antoine Coypel (1661-1722), Charles Simonneau (1645–1728), Louis Simonneau (1654–1727), Nicolas Pitau (1670–1724), Sébastien Le Clerc (1637-1714), Jean Berain (1640-1711) and many others. Jean Racine (1639-1699) played a role in the early development of the project, which was eventually published under the auspices of the Imprimerie Royale by Jean Anisson (c. 1642-1721). Other participants included Jean-Paul Bignon (1662-1743), the librarian to the king, and Abbé Paul de Tallemand (1642-1712). François Charpentier (1620-1702) was an important member of l'Académie Française and was involved in the production of many of the medals depicted in this volume. While primary authorship has often been ascribed to him, his actual involvement in the work appears unclear. The final product is a masterpiece of the bibliographic arts (the Musée de l'Imprimerie, in Lyon, held an exhibition in 2002 to celebrate the 300th anniversary of this work). Each page depicts the obverse and reverse of a medal, with beautifully printed descriptive text, all within intricate ornamental borders, occasionally with culs-delampe. The magnificent allegorical frontispiece was engraved by Charles Simonneau following a design by Coypel and integrating a portrait of Louis by Hyacinthe Rigaud (1659-1743). Fleurons and other decorative flourishes abound. This particular copy features a binding with the royal arms emblazoned on both sides and the king's double-L cipher integrated into the spine's intricately gilt design. Baron W.H.J. van Westreenen van Tiellandt (1783-1848), in cataloguing the magnificent library of Pierre Van Damme in 1808, wrote that those copies with the royal arms were "exécutée par les ordres du monarque méme, qui s'en est reservé tous les exemplaires pour en faire des présens." The first edition of this majestic work was presented to Louis XIV on January 9, 1702. A quarto edition was printed the same year. Two other quarto editions, with added text in German, were printed in Schaffhausen (1704) and Baden (1705). Following the king's death in 1715, an expanded folio edition was prepared for publication in 1723. While the condition of this binding is rather poor, this is an opportunity to acquire one of the true masterpieces of numismatic study at a reasonable cost. Brunet III.1565 (23739). This would instead be replaced with a continuous commentary in Latin on the different coins. Such an edition was issued in 1731 through the agency of his friend Nils Keder, who also supplied a foreword" (*The Queen Lovisa Ulrika Collection of Numismatic Literature*, page 45). 

A controversial work, in the *Avant-Propos* of which the author publicly castigated and ridiculed the work of Rollin & Feuardent in their catalogue of the J. Rousseau collection to such a degree that he was successfully sued for defamation in 1863. According to Engel & Serrure, the court ordered the book to be seized and destroyed, making copies very scarce: "Certaines attaques dirigées par l'auteur, dans sa préface, contre des numismatistes honorablement connus, lui valurent un procés, et une condamnation á une assez forte amende. Le tribunal ordonna la saisie et la destruction du livre, qui est devenu très rare dans le commerce" (entry 1531). It may not come as a surprise that when the time came for Charvet's own collection to be sold, it was through Henri Hoffmann.

A remarkable publication of exceptional historical interest. Augustin Dupré (1748-1833) remains one of the most important engravers of French coins in modern history, and his designs for early U.S. medals (mostly notably the Libertas Americana) have ensured his lasting fame in the western hemisphere. An engraver by trade, Dupré began to work on medals in the early 1770s and quickly became adept. Notable works include several classic medals of the Comitia Americana series: those for Nathanael Greene, John Paul Jones and Daniel Morgan, as well as the related Diplomatic Medal and the Libertas Americana medal. Had the last been his only contribution to the field of American medals, he would justly have remained famous in this country. During the French Revolution, however, he became interested in applying his ideas to the new national coinage that was under discussion. On September 11, 1790, the National Assembly appointed a seven-member committee charged with studying the laws of coinage (Saunier, Augustin Dupré, page 48). Dupré wrote his October 1790 Observations addressed to the Comité des Monnoies de l'Assemblée Nationale, a short work that was printed at least three times, two of which should be considered drafts (this is the final version). Richard Margolis has described this work as "Perhaps the best evidence of Dupré as advocate of change," noting that in it, he "criticized the organization of the French Mints and suggested extensive changes in the existing Mint Administration." The final lines of Duprés work call upon Newton as an example of the artist/scientist in service to his state: "L'example de Newton rendant sous ce rapport des services essentiels à sa patrie



peut, je pense, servir d'excuse à ceux qui sont animés du mème motif." In early 1791, the Assembly adopted some of Dupré's ideas and initiated a contest for new coin designs under the eye of painter Louis David. Dupré won the competition and became the 14th graveur général des monnaies on July 11, 1791. Dupré managed to retain his position as graveur général des monnaies until being replaced by Pierre-Joseph Tiolier in 1803. The present work is rare, being known primarily from institutional holdings. Little-known in the numismatic world, it is rarely included in the usual bibliographies (Engel & Serrure list only a preliminary draft as 2376). It is unmentioned by Lipsius at the end of the eighteenth century and by Dekesel at the beginning of the twenty-first. O.-C. Reure's Bibliothèque des écrivains foréziens ou qui se rattachent au Forez par leur résidence ou leurs fonctions jusqu'en 1835 (Montbrison, 1914) lists it (pages 282-283), as do a few other specialized French bibliographies (though they remain unlisted by Brunet). They were virtually unknown to modern numismatists until the April 2, 2014 sale of the Dupré archives by Bonhams in New York.



Her work explores the topic more from a religious than a numismatic angle, providing an enormous amount of contextual and historical information that is generally lacking from numismatic works on the subject. 
The Essex Institute's copy of the rare Special Leatherbound Edition. The best edition of the first comprehensive work on the numismatic history of the California Gold Rush. Edgar Adams (1868–1940) domi-

nated American numismatic research in the first quarter of the twentieth century. His other landmark works on patterns and storecards and his famous series of illustrated notebooks on various series, many of which reside in the library of the American Numismatic Society, eloquently attest to his virtuosity. In his obituary, Farran Zerbe noted: "In the passing of Edgar H. Adams ... numismatics loses a grand character, one who starred in its literature for many years." Only a small number of special leatherbound copies of Private Gold Coinage of California appear to have been made from "the first complete edition of one hundred copies," the great majority of which were apparently bound in crimson cloth. Several versions of the book were published, with introductions of 16, 20 or 24 pages. Most of the few existing copies of the leatherbound edition are well-worn, and this example is better than many. A unique and most interesting assemblage, including: the relevant pages, and title, from Adams & Woodin's 1913 United States Pattern, Trial, and Experimental Pieces, pasted to 8.5 by 11 inch blank sheets, holed for a three-ring binder, featuring ink check marks throughout which, according to John Ford, appear to record specimens in the collection of Waldo Newcomer. There are also extensive ink additions on the blank sheets and sometimes in the text, comprising additions and corrections. A few examples follow of what are certainly notes made by Edgar Adams: "17A. Eagle 1795. Reg. Dies. Small planchet. Copper, only one specimen known"; "struck outside of mint" written after Nos. 27 & 28, which have been lined through; "Both out. Not struck at mint" written after Nos. 29 & 30; following 1848 Quarter Eagle, 1848: "Have classified my spec. under Territorial coins of California"; "193A. Eagle, slightly dif. Die, platinum"; and 827, "struck on five-cent planchet." Present as well are 5 typewritten sheets formatted in typical Adams style, with 16 photographs of coins cut to size and mounted preceding the descriptions, listing thirty-one 1838 & 1839 half dollar pieces, a few with notes such as "Does not exist" or "I have never seen..." Also present are added typescript pages listing Nos. 451-454, 454A, 455-457, & 457A-F, and pages reordering Nos. 480-85, and 508-527. There are also three pages of typescript listing twenty-five 1867 nickels, thirteen of which are accompanied by photographs, and another page listing Nos. 684-698A, with photographs of No. 687. Wayte Raymond's handwritten listing of minor patterns, annotated in pencil, on over a dozen sheets is accompanied by a typewritten September 25, 1946 letter from Lenox R. Lohr, signed, on Museum

of Science and Industry, Chicago stationery (Lohr is listed as Presi-



dent), to Wayte Raymond, reading in part: "I am returning herewith your check list of pattern nickels with pencil notations as suggested by comparison with my own collection... Some of the very distinctive patterns were apparently omitted from your list. I have listed them on the attached sheet [also present here] ... If you come into possession of any patterns, trials, or die strikes, I wish you would send them on to me for inspection." Ex John J. 

Schulman, J. Hirsch, Fred Michael, B. Max Mehl, Ben Green, Wayte Raymond (solo and as the U.S. Coin Co.), Dupriez, Rudolf Kube, Etienne Bourgey, and Adolph Hess. The 1910 Year Book is bound in with the 1910 volume. While condition varies slightly, the set on the whole is near fine with a few exceptions that have weak bindings or other minor issues. A complete original set from 1894 through 1945, accompanied by Volumes 1-6 in reprint form. The Numismatist remains one of the mainstays of American numismatic literature, though it has never had scholarly pretensions, nor has it been primarily a commercial publication. Its founder, Dr. George Francis Heath, was, in essence, a

collector, and the publication has always endeavored to serve first the



needs of coin collectors. About the time that the American Journal of Numismatics became exclusively a scholarly journal, The Numismatist unfurled its banner. It is filled with vignettes of collectors of the day, results of important sales, and fascinating gossip on a wide variety of topics. Numismatic scholars will also find much of interest in its pages, with significant articles on a wide variety of subjects appearing through the years. It is an unparalleled, comprehensive chronicle of coin collecting in America from the turn of the century to the present. The modest amounts that sets have brought in recent years truly make it one of the great bargains of American numismatic literature. The extra material bound into some of the early volumes here present include a number of other periodicals that are legitimately scarce, as well as some desirable sale catalogues. With Volume V, publication of the *American Journal of Numismatics* was assumed by the Boston Numismatic Society. It includes articles by William Sumner Appleton and Edmund Slafter. Volume VI includes important material on the medal struck for Commodore Preble, which is depicted on the volume's medal-rule plate. Volume VII begins William Sumner Appleton's important serial work on Washington medals. Articles in Volume VIII include excerpts from Crosby's *Early Coins of America* (on Massachusetts silver), and pieces by DuBois on U.S. gold coins and Slafter on the copper coins of the Earl of Stirling. Marvin continue to appear as regular contributors, and Volume XIV begins R.W. McLachlan's important work on Canadian numismatics, which would eventually appear in book form.

The exclusive deluxe edition of this monumental work, the most detailed study of the history of the California Gold Rush ever undertaken from a numismatic perspective. No. 1 of 400 copies issued, most of which were presented to buyers of ingots in the various sales offering

material from the S.S. Central America. This copy was not so presented, and so does not have the two color photographs of the ingot that would otherwise have accompanied it in the integral envelope. These visually impressive and sumptuous special editions include actual gold dust recovered from the Central America visibly housed in a small compartment within the binding itself. The massive size of the volume, and its resulting weight, is tough on the binding, and most copies seen exhibit rubbing from the leather lining of the slipcase: this copy is an exception. The most recent deluxe copy we sold at auction brought \$1600 hammer plus the premium.



A substantive unpublished Breen manuscript, and one that provides significant insight into Breen's composition process. Breen had published a groundbreaking die study on the United States \$1 gold pieces in the October-December 1963 issues of the Numismatic Scrapbook Magazine. This work surpassed anything that had previously been written on the subject, and the articles were reprinted in monograph form as part of Hewitt's Numismatic Information Series. The present manuscript indicates clearly that Breen continued to compile data on this denomination. Although complete, it does not include the historical background with which Breen began his earlier articles/monograph, diving immediately into a discussion of die varieties, arranged chronologically, providing considerably more information. The last several pages are devoted to a study of rarity, as his earlier work ended. It is interesting to examine these pages for signs of Breen's working process. The pages vary, as does their numbering. The earliest pages simply have the number within colons, as :39: . Pages that had been revised and retyped were indicated with an asterisk, like :42*: . Occasionally, one sees a page marked like :69**: , indicating that a second retyping had taken place. Nearly every page has handwritten annotations by Breen, with many pages featuring annotations in several colors of ink. Page 23, one of the most heavily annotated, bears writing in at least six different inks, all in Breen's hand. Breen's was a cumulative composition process, where the writing was continually ongoing and revisions never stopped. This is a fascinating manuscript that is of strong interest to specialists as it goes into more detail than could be accommodated in the 1988 Complete Encyclopedia. Unique.



The first example we have seen, and quite possibly the only extant copy. No copy appears to be included in the major collections of printed Americana, including institutions such as the American Antiquarian Society and the New-York Historical Society. The only online record of the title points to an earlier sale of this very copy, which turned up last year in a general book auction. John Dorival (also spelled Dorivel) is listed in the 1830/31 and 1831/32 editions of Longworth's American Almanac, New-York Register, and City Directory as working in "fine arts" at 3311/2 Broadway. Before then, he is listed at 130 Reade Street and afterwards at 52 Ann Street, where he was employed as a lithographer, which appears to have been his primary trade. The New-York Historical Society's Dictionary of Artists in America lists him as a lithographer active between 1826 and 1838. For two years, however, Dorival turned his efforts to the curiosity trade, and included coins and medals in his offerings. As such, he was one of the very first to include numismatic objects as part of his trade. The tone of the poem suggests more of a focus on commerce than education. The second, central part of the poem is in the voice of Dorival, and boasts of the marvels to be found for sale at the Depot of Fine Arts; before and after it are a framing narrative told in the voice of a cockney, who is amazed (and perhaps appalled) by the ability of the Yankee to commercialize



just about anything: "These Yankees are curious fellows, / Their notions are done with an air, / And will, I'm afraid compel us, / In spite of our system, to stare. / They stir up the Arts with a poker, / And make even Poetry work: / 'Tis their glory with Gain to yoke her, / And send them off steady by jerk. / The eagle's wing's tied to a capon, / The bay's made a brush for flies, / And Fame herself struts with an apron, / And with bank notes shades her eyes..." A most unusual production, and one of the few artifacts remaining from the days in which the coin collecting hobby was only on the periphery of public consciousness.

As discussed by Gengerke, the firm split in 1961, with the auction business continued by Kolman as Federal Brand Enterprises and a retail operation run by Ed Kolman as Federal Coin Exchange. The latter was continued after Ed Kolman's retirement, and that iteration of the business conducted at least one auction that is not considered part of the present series.

He is perhaps best remembered for developing the legal definition of corporations and giving birth to the field of corporate law. This is a remarkably fine specimen of an early American imprint on a topic of considerable importance to students of paper money. Nonetheless, a rare and interesting publication. Two early articles on "Coin Collecting as an Investment" are featured, and numismatic events of the day are widely reported upon. A postponement in the case of Dexter versus Chapman is noted and the article states that "It is maintained by all experts that no Dollars dated 1804 were struck in that year; but it is an established fact that they have been struck on several occasions since 1827, from differently engraved dies." Another article, headlined "Postponement of the Linderman Sale," notes that the sale of pattern coins featured "a beautiful sharp proof silver dollar of 1804" and that the "many dealers and collectors, who had gathered at Bangs' rooms were greatly disappointed to hear that the sale was postponed indefinately [sic]." The article concludes: "Col. A.L. Drummond, of the Secret Service, attempted to seize the collection. Curiously enough, no one knew just where it was. Mr. Low, however, told the District Attorney that he would not dispose of the coins or take them out of the city until the case was finally settled." This elusive publication is probably best known today for events that transpired after it had ceased publication. In 1888, Dr. George Heath titled the first issue of what became the official publication of the American Numismatic Association, The American Numismatist. Thereafter the name was shortened to The Numismatist, probably to avoid conflict with the publication at hand, which had ceased publication several months earlier. An interesting and detailed article was published concerning this periodical by Joel J. Orosz in his Printer's Devil column appearing in the Winter, 1997 issue of The Asylum. Rated A- overall by Adams: "1857 proof set. Strong Latin American. RR Scottish gold. Portcullis crown, ½ crown." The last of the catalogues present in this lot is the aborted sale of the fabled collection of Dr. Henry R. Linderman. The chicanery of Mint Officials becomes transparent in its text: restrikes, rare patterns and other Mint-produced concoctions abound. The collection was impounded by the United States Government and the sale did not take place. Several months later, the collection was sold under the auspices of Scott Stamp & Coin Company, minus a number of pieces confiscated by Treasury agents as being in violation of the 1873 coinage law that Linderman himself had helped to draft. When the collection was ultimately sold on February 28, 1888, Low was an employee of the Scott firm. This change of venue is attributable to Low's having ceased independent operations in the interim, entering the employ of J.W. Scott for nine years before resuming his own business. The hiatus may be attributable to financial difficulties precipitated by the unrecovered costs of producing this original Linderman catalogue.

The first 53 sales were issued under the NASCA banner. Sale 54–56 were published as NASCA-Karp Auctions, while beginning with Sale 57 NASCA was listed as a Division of R.M. Smythe & Co. A wonderful series of catalogues; the present offering includes most of the firm's classic Ford-Breen period. As described by John W. Adams in United States Numismatic Literature, Volume II: "In November, 1950, Charles Wormser hired John Ford, and perhaps the most important chapter of numismatic cataloguing was begun. Sometimes abrasive but always insightful, Ford ranks in a class with Sylvester Crosby, Lyman Low, David Proskey, and Wayte Raymond as one of the great numismatists this country has produced. His cataloguing features meticulous accuracy and conservative grading; his descriptions are full and informative, covering a range of material that spans the gamut of our hobby. Others have rivaled Ford's penchant for detail, but none have better explored the by-ways of history and tradition for which numismatics are such a natural entry. As if one world-class numismatist were not enough, New Netherlands hired Walter Breen in 1952. Blessed with a restlessly inquiring mind and a prodigious memory, Breen added new dimensions to the firm's research. His findings on die states, diagnostic features and the then condition census add another rich layer to the utility that New Netherlands' catalogues will always possess." The Ford period spans Sales 31-62, and the Breen period Sales 37-54. Returning to Adams: "The New Netherlands catalogues represent something special in American numismatics. They demonstrate with eloquence that the business of dealing in coins can also embrace the functions of educating the collector and preserving the traditions of the hobby. In so doing, the members of the firm have set an example which, though rarely observed, will nonetheless act as a beacon to the profession in years to come."

The deluxe, regular-paper, leatherbound version of the first edition of this important work. Only 125 deluxe copies of Newcomb's final book were bound in leather, 50 on regular paper (as here) and 75 on thickpaper. In both cases, the leather used was of inferior quality, and scuffs easily. The binding on this example is not at all well-preserved, but the provenance is interesting and the annotations beg for some research as they indicate coins in a major collection, much of it derived from that of Admiral Bitler. Completed four years earlier, Newcomb's work was not published until 1944 due to the war. One thousand copies were printed. It marked a great improvement over the pioneering work of Frank Andrews, nearly doubling the variety listings, and stood as the standard work for half a century. The result of many years of painstaking study, relatively few new varieties were discovered in the intervening years. Dr. Sheldon noted that "Newcomb's book doubtless achieves the highest pinnacle for numismatic completeness." is rare, while Sales 22 and 30 are both scarce (but both present). The first sale is rare enough to not be present in the ANS Library, but it is present here. Sales 1, 2, 13, 22 and 30 are present here in tabloid format, with 1, 13 and 30 being the *Coin World* printings. The tabloid sales as well as the mail-bid sales are especially scarce with prices realized lists. Pine Tree sales are surprisingly difficult to collect for a modern series, but the firm handled some fine collections and they are worth pursuing.

Adams also notes "Excellent Jackson tokens," mint state 1796 & 1797 half dollars, etc. Two of the plates depict copper. The personnel behind the Company are listed as F.E. Ellis, Prop., and B.G. Johnson, Manager, with Dan Long serving as auctioneer. Despite Johnson's efforts, the sale was apparently not a success. Important and infrequently encountered priced.

scarce volume offered only infrequently. The article was also published as an offprint, bound separately and limited to 50 copies, which is extremely rare today. These two volumes are all that was published of this particular Vermont Historical Society publication. Ex William A. Among the many notable collections of paper money handled by the firm, the Herb and Martha Schingoethe collection of obsolete currency was perhaps the most important (the present lot includes the first 12 of those sales). The earlier catalogues bearing both the NASCA and Smythe names are listed in this catalogue under NASCA. The present lot begins when the NASCA name was dropped.



Publication of the *Numismatic Review* was short-lived, though it remains a source of useful information on a wide variety of numismatic topics. Edited by Thomas Ollive Mabbott, the Board of Advisors reads like a numismatic "Who's Who." Over three hundred brief monographs covering the entire range of numismatics are found in the pages of this interesting publication.

Stack's Fixed Price Lists

One of the most complete sets of these fixed price lists we have ever offered. Rather modestly produced at first, the scarce early fixed price lists were an important commercial vehicle for Stack's and are of considerable interest. No. 9 offers 271 "U.S. Large Cents from 1793 to 1857 with Important Die Varieties"; No. 14 features 831 "U.S. Large Cents from 1793 to 1857 with Important Die Varieties from the A.C. Gies Collection." The latter was catalogued by teenaged numismatic tyro John J. Ford, Jr. and exhibits a penchant for detail that would later propel him to the front ranks of commercial American numismatics. Remy Bourne lists two versions of No. 36, but his method of citing pagination leaves the distinction unclear. He does not list a No. 39 or a No. 52, which are numbers we've yet to encounter either. While 67A was issued, there does not appear to have been an unlettered 67. The Stack's firm cooled on the fixed price medium during the 1970s and 1980s, but then issued a wonderful series of very impressive quarto-sized catalogues in the 1990s. A series that is well worth collecting.

A select gathering of the cream of the crop of this illustrious firm's sale catalogues, assembled by one of the most knowledgeable collectors of American auction catalogues to grace our hobby. While subjective, Scott Rubin attempted here to boil down the vast Stack's series to those core sales most important for U.S. numismatics. The significance of Stack's catalogues as a numismatic resource is difficult to overstate. Anyone engaging in serious research in the field of American numismatics, ranging from colonials to United States large cents, from proof gold to rare paper currency, will find them to be an indispensable storehouse of numismatic information.

They will long remain indispensable to scholars, collectors, and dealers interested in the truly fascinating world of American numismatics that lies beyond dates and mintmarks. Despite the limitations he faced due to his distance from the larger cities, Steigerwalt handled some very impressive coins over his career—a fact that has only become widely appreciated in recent years. His catalogues are always scarce and often rare. This run includes Adams 65, which was not included in the remarkably complete set in the Champa Library.

1808 Mint Report on Regulation of Foreign Coins

United States Government. LETTER FROM THE SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY, TRANSMITTING A REPORT PREPARED IN OBEDIENCE TO "AN ACT REGULATING THE CURRENCY OF THE FOREIGN COINS IN THE UNITED STATES." The first copy we recall having handled. Prepared by Mint Director Robert M. Patterson, whose assays of the major foreign coins then circulating in the United States (gold coins of Great Britain, Portugal, France and Spain, and silver coins of France and Spain) indicated that while the gold coinage of Great Britain and Portugal had been rated at their intrinsic value, the gold coins of France and Spain were overrated and required adjustment. The silver coins of France and Spain were more variable, with French crowns and Spanish dollars being of good weight, but with French 5 francs and Spanish pistareens being somewhat inferior and requiring adjustment. Patterson notes that: "It may, however, be observed that all foreign gold coins have now nearly ceased to circulate as a currency in the United States. Deposits of these are still, indeed, frequently made in our banks; but are thence either sent to the mint for coinage, or re-issued for the purpose of exportation." Secretary of the Treasury Albert Gallatin then transmits Patterson's report (which is dated December 24, 1807) to the Speaker of the House of Representatives with recommendations for adjustments to the ratings of coins described. Rare and most interesting.

The 1837 Mint Report

This particular report is especially interesting for its discussion of the efforts to make the new southern mints operational: of New Orleans, Patterson writes, "The machinery of the New Orleans branch mint was executed, and the steam-engine set in action, in May last; and there would have been no difficulty in putting the mint in full operation, but for the apprehensions from the climate. Two of the officers and all the workmen were from the Middle States, and unacclimated; and I was advised by the resident officers that they would incur great risk in going to New Orleans in the warm season. The occurrence of a fatal epidemic, soon after, proved that these apprehensions were too well founded; and the officers and men from this place were thereby prevented from reaching New Orleans before the beginning of December. They are now, however, all at their stations, and making every exertion to commence the operations of the mint at an early day." Charlotte and Dahlonega encountered difficulties of their own, which are also discussed. The Mint Reports of the 1830s are rarely encountered: we have not handled a copy of the 1837 report since at least the 1980s.



Five volumes, total. First volume front joint is cracking, with the spine covering starting to come a little loose; binding remains sound. Other volumes are sturdily bound and exhibit only moderate wear from use. \$1500

A fascinating group of rarely encountered archival volumes from the Denver Mint. Described in more detail above under the individual entries, the sheer amount of information present in the first four volumes is beyond our ability to summarize. In short, they give the reader a sense of the profound quantities of gold that were processed over the years by the Mint, and one gets a sense of the ebb and flow of deposits and withdrawals (not to mention the security and safeguards surrounding what amounted to billions of Depression-era dollars' worth of gold bullion). Rarely available and most interesting.

Rarely seen. The checks were printed by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing and feature the portrait of Samuel Dexter (who served as Secretary of War and Secretary of the Treasury under Adams and Jefferson).



Today, it is important as the only known source of detailed contemporary illustrations of the third Philadelphia Mint building, derived from photographs taken shortly after construction.
