

A complete set of original editions of the BMC Greek. The most comprehensive and important standard reference work on ancient Greek coins ever published. The generally superb photographically printed coin plates found in these original editions are far superior to the halftone reprint plates. While these volumes used to reside in a reference library, they remain in above-average condition, and their library markings do not interfere with use. The bindings have the call numbers in gilt on the spine, and most volumes have a Leeds Public Libraries bookplate. The library's blindstamp can be found on plates and opening pages, but the markings are unobtrusive and the paper, overall, is clean and more supple than often encountered (a few have toned leaves, as usually seen). Kroh 10: "the most utilized reference work for Greek coins... they still remain essential references and publish a great many coins not found elsewhere.



Jean Foy Vaillant (1632–1706) was a scholarly French numismatist and collector of coins who authored a large number of important numismatic works on ancient coins. The Extraordinary 1702 Folio on the Medals of Louis XIV

Binding very worn, as often seen on this massive volume, but sound, with both boards attached despite cracked joints, tears to the leather, split corners, a lacking spine label, and much rubbing to the extremities; lacking flyleaves. A small stain permeates the first several leaves, including the frontispiece and title, but fades by the time one reaches Plate 8. Occasional marginal discoloration or folded corners. Good overall, but with most leaves being very good.

The first edition of perhaps the most sumptuous numismatic work ever produced. Médailles sur les principaux événements du règne de Louis le Grand was created by the Académie Royale des Médailles et des Inscriptions and was intended not simply to be a record of the medals of Louis XIV, but a carefully constructed history of his reign. In The Fabrication of Louis XIV, Peter Burke discusses the publication of this work. The king himself was deeply involved in its execution and wished to supplant the previous work on the subject by Claude-François Ménestrier. Burke states that the decision to exclude certain medals was made at the highest levels. From the birth of Louis XIV in 1638 and his ascension to the throne on the death of Louis XIII less than five years later, this work traces the important events in the life of this illustrious monarch as well as the history of France itself. Louis was intensely interested in the arts and did much to create the reputation France still enjoys as a worldwide center of culture. He was determined to expand the royal coin cabinet and issued commemorative medals on many occasions. The historical series of medals struck under this project have been called "the most sophisticated, coherent and numerous body of medals ever produced to commemorate the life and rule of a single figure (Robert Wellington, Antiquarianism and the Visual Histories of Louis XIV: Artifacts for a Future Past, page 40). This devotion to numismatics and historiography is reflected in the physical production of this volume. The finest engravers were hired, the best paper available was used, and the bindings tend to be beautiful and ornate. One does not acquire the sobriquet Le Roi Soleil due to one's simplicity of taste. Even the font used to print the text was specially created for Louis: Romain du Roy was designed by Philippe Grandjean (1666-1714) around 1700, having been in development since 1693. This was the first work printed in this font, which attempted to use scientific principles to develop a font that was both practical and elegant. Only the royal press could use the fonts, which continued to be developed through 1745. The historical descriptions of the medals were written by Nicolas Boileau-Despréaux (1636-1711), and the engravings and other artistic flourishes required the participation of artists Antoine Coypel (1661-1722), Charles Simonneau (1645-1728), Louis Simonneau (1654-1727), Nicolas Pitau (1670-1724), Sébastien Le Clerc (1637-1714), Jean Berain (1640-1711) and many others. Jean Racine (1639-1699) played a role in the early development of the project, which was eventually published under the auspices of the Imprimerie Royale by Jean Anisson (c. 1642-1721). Other participants included Jean-Paul Bignon (1662-1743), the librarian to the king, and Abbé Paul de Tallemand (1642-1712). François Charpentier (1620-1702) was an important member of l'Académie Française and was involved in the production of many of the medals depicted in this volume. While primary authorship has often been ascribed to him, his actual involvement in the work appears unclear. The final product is a masterpiece of the bibliographic arts (the Musée de l'Imprimerie, in Lyon, held an exhibition in 2002 to celebrate the 300th anniversary of this work). Each page depicts the obverse and reverse of a medal, with beautifully printed descriptive text, all within intricate ornamental borders, occasionally with culs-de-lampe. The magnificent allegorical frontispiece was engraved by Charles Simonneau following a design by Coypel and integrating a portrait of Louis by Hyacinthe Rigaud (1659-1743). Fleurons and other decorative flourishes abound. This particular copy features a binding with the royal arms emblazoned on both sides and the king's double-L cipher integrated into the spine's intricately gilt design. Baron W.H.J. van Westreenen van Tiellandt (1783-1848), in cataloguing the magnificent library of Pierre Van Damme in 1808, wrote that those copies with the royal arms were "exécutée par les ordres du monarque méme, qui s'en est reservé tous les exemplaires pour en faire des présens." The first edition of this majestic work was presented to Louis XIV on January 9, 1702. A quarto edition was printed the same year. Two other quarto editions, with added text in German, were printed in Schaffhausen (1704) and Baden (1705). Following the king's death in 1715, an expanded folio edition was prepared for publication in 1723. While the condition

of this binding is rather poor, this is an opportunity to acquire one of the true masterpieces of numismatic study at a reasonable cost. Brunet III.1565 (23739). Cohen/de Ricci 695. 





Loosely laid in the fifth volume is a finely produced four-page reproduction of a note to the reader (a' benigni, e cortesi leggitori), announcing publication of the final two volumes. Spine of second volume worn, with a scrape to the vellum; else a clean and wellpreserved set in contemporary bindings, with only occasional minor faults. Very good or better.

An extraordinary numismatic anthology, bringing together several dozen essays exploring various aspects of Italian coinage, monetary theory, and economics. Ferdinando Bassoli discusses this work in some detail in his *Antiquarian Books on Coins and Medals [Monete e medaglie nel libro antico dal XV al XIX secolo*], noting that it includes several significant numismatic essays "that would have faded into obscurity had Argelati not republished them." Comparing this compendium with that of Zanetti, Bassoli writes, "By collecting together documents and presenting them for public consumption in book form, these two men planted the seed from which interest in economics and fine book production flowered in Italy. The anthologies they produced can be found in the collections of economists, numismatists and bibliographers alike, for the quality of production as much as for the actual content of the books (vast illustrated series of coins that are, on the whole, accurate and reliable) ... Argelati's creative con-




tribution, as author of *De monetis Italiae*, is not particularly noteworthy, although he illustrates a series of coins struck at Milan and provides very accurate general and analytical indexes. What is significant is the material he collected and put at the disposal of his readers: some eighty discourses, plus various texts and documents detailed in almost 2000 pages of text. The anthology must have been a success given that, when Argelati died in 1755 after the publication of the first four volumes, it was completed in 1759 with two more volumes produced by Canon Carlo Casanova. ... From the bibliophile's point of view, complete copies of the book are rather rare... The work of Argelati and Zanetti represents a period in the development of numismatics which cannot ever be repeated; and no one since has considered writing a numismatic anthology on such a scale." Among the wealth of coin plates are a number of illustrations depicting Renaissance medals. This was Dr. Bassoli's own set of this masterpiece of Italian numismatics. 





Iules-François de Cotte (1721-1810) was Directeur et contrôleur de la monnaie des médailles from 1767 to 1803, a remarkable span of time encompassing both the reign of Louis XVI and the revolutionary era. As such, he corresponded with Benjamin Franklin about the famous Libertas Americana medal. In an important letter sent to Franklin on 26 mars 1783, de Cotte wrote of these medals that "Les 2 d'or, 20 d'Argent et 20 de bronze, que vous aves demandé, seront demain en Etat d'etre livrées a la personne que vous chargeres de les retirer des mains du S. Roger principal Commis de la Monnoye des Medailles" (The Papers of Benjamin Franklin, Volume 39, page 391). This fixes the date of the production of the gold Libertas Americana medals and is of the highest importance to American medallic history. While perhaps secondary to the catalogue at hand, it illustrates the importance of the person whose collection was here offered. The collection offered was very large, but unfortunately it was mostly grouped into large lots, reasonably well described, but still extensive (the bulk of the Roman collection, some 6119 pieces, comprises lot 143; the previous lot offered 660 sestertii). 

This numismatic volume was published after his death by French archaeologist Michelet d'Ennery (1709–1786). It is remarkable and especially valuable for the detailed historical background it provides concerning the various issues of obsidional coins issued throughout Europe from 1521 to 1762, along with various other kinds of emergency coinage. It was largely based on the collection of Chevalier de Boullongne. Duby has long been considered the best source for establishing the authenticity of siege and necessity coins, since the subsequent work by Mailliet unwittingly lists many apocryphal pieces. The plates were produced with a pantographic ruling machine and, in addition to being of great visual appeal, the illustrations were the most accurate ever achieved. This technical innovation, widely heralded at the time, was, within a few decades, overtaken by photographic printing processes and is relatively little known today. Russian Currency Reform of 1899

An important state document, being the final report on the currency reform developed by Finance Minister Sergei Witte (Vitte) and approved by Czar Nikolai II. This reform was the culmination of previous efforts beginning in 1895 and brought about the conversion of the Russian ruble to the gold standard. The publication at hand includes the Council of State's introduction and all three chapters, covering the monetary system, the circulation of coinage, and the St. Petersburg Mint. Under this reform, the silver ruble was relegated to being the physical means of paying in the new monetary unit: the gold ruble. Until 1914, this reform brought a stability to the Russian economy that had been lacking for some time. International capital was drawn to Russia and, until the disaster of the war, Russia seemed to be on the road to joining the front ranks of the world's economic powers. This publication, printed in English presumably for use in British Governmental circles, notes that: "The original text of the Coinage Law following bears the inscription, in His Imperial Majesty's own hand: 'So Be It." 

In the three or four years preceding publication, "convictions before the criminal courts for the circulation of Forgeries of the Bank of England Note" had risen precipitously, resulting in the "increasing reluctance of Juries to visit with the extreme penalty of the law." This handsome production presents the results of "an investigation for the purpose of ascertaining whether there exist any means, within the compass of the fine and the mechanical arts, not of totally preventing the Forgery of Bank Notes (for that is obviously impossible), but of increasing the difficulty of imitation, and thus of checking the prevalence of the crime." The committee's findings, largely penned by Thomas Curson Hansard, had great impact on the course of anti-counterfeiting measures and technology in America as well as Great Britain. Many of the suggestions for technological improvements were in fact derived from American sources. 

No. 150 of only 200 copies issued of this classic work, most of which have long since perished. Richard Margolis described the work as follows: "Storelli was for many years the standard work on Nini. Its usefulness was limited only by its rarity, a mere 200 copies having been printed. It added a number of important details to the known facts of Nini's life; particularly significant is the full text of the employment agreement of October 1, 1772 between Nini and Leray de Chaumont. ... Storelli was the first to illustrate all (or nearly all) of Nini's medallions, although only at a stated two-thirds of actual size. While a total of one hundred and seven medallions are described, the great majority from the collection of the Prince de Broglie, thirty-seven of them are variants of basic types, so that seventy major portrait types are listed and illustrated. This is only six more than Villers had described but had not illustrated, many years earlier." Rarely offered: the copy in the Ford Library realized \$1700 hammer in 2004; the Margolis copy brought \$900, but was in much worse condition. Forrer IV.276.

Vertue on Thomas Simon

A large and very attractive copy of one of the most delightful of all 18th-century English numismatic books. Vertue's plates are works of art in every possible sense: they are superior in execution to nearly all others of the time period. Forrer, in his *Biographical Dictionary of Medallists*, pronounced Simon "the finest medallist who ever worked in England." Vertue's magnificent work was the first and only substantial study of an individual English medallist until well into the following century. The text displays evidence of considerable scholarly research, and has inevitably been used as a starting point for later studies of Simon's work. Edited by the antiquary Richard Gough, this second, and preferred, edition was given a new printed title page, two additional plates, and notes by both Gough and Charles Combe with transcriptions of documentary sources. Villers's Extremely Rare Foundational Work on Nini

The earliest work devoted to Nini and his terra cottas. Richard Margolis describes this in the annotated bibliography to his *Benjamin Franklin in Terra Cotta* (page 209): "The author of this exceptionally rare sixty-three page pamphlet, which originated in the form of a presentation to the Société des Sciences et Lettres de Loir-et-Cher on November 8, 1861, was the first director of the Blois Museum. His slim pamphlet put Nini on the map,' so to speak. Villers collected information about Nini's life and work, aided by recollections of elderly workmen who either knew Nini or knew him by repute. He wrote a sensitive appreciation of his portrait medallions, and supplemented this with a descriptive catalogue of sixty-four of them (plus one additional variant), noting the public and private collections which included them. He donated some forty-nine of the medallions he had collected to the Blois Museum. Although there had been a few brief, earlier references to Nini in the literature, and a limited number of auction offerings and donations to museums of his portrait medallions prior to 1861, the Villers pamphlet is the first work of substance on Nini, and remains of considerable value to the specialist." The only other copy of this work that we have ever handled was in Richard Margolis's library (see our Sale 159, lot 171). A very rare opportunity.






The following seven lots feature items from the archives of the illustrious French engraver Augustin Dupré, whose works include the famous Libertas Americana medal, the new decimal coinage following the French Revolution, the Diplomatic Medal, and the Comitia Americana medals for Nathanael Greene, John Paul Jones and Daniel Morgan.



A Tiny but Sensitive Portrait by Augustin Dupré

An exceptionally well-executed portrait of the wife of Gabriel Louis François de Neufville, 5e duc de Villeroy. While the duchess survived the Revolution, her husband met his end at the guillotine on April 28, 1794. The size and shape of this tiny artwork recalls a baseball card, while the portrait seems intended for a medal that was never struck. Unrecorded by Trogan & Sorel; likely unique.

A fabulously detailed and finished design drawing, beautifully shaded and executed by the master himself. The design bears many similarities to those illustrated by Trogan and Sorel on pages 199–200, including the seated figure of Liberty, crowned and surmounted by a radiant Liberty Cap reminiscent of those common in early American numismatics. Trogan and Sorel identify the other figures as Hercules, God of War, and a goddess representing Tyranny. Other versions of this design include the legend "X Aoust 1792," allowing for a certain connection to the attack on the Tuileries, the mob action against the seat of France's monarchy and Legislative Assembly that marked the end of the Bourbon dynasty and one of the most violent days in French history. A relatively crude sketch, an early form of the more finished drawing that appears on page 201 of the Musée Carnavalet catalogue (Augustin Dupré, 1748–1833, Graveur général des Monnaies de France, collections du Musée Carnavalet, by Rosine Trogan and Philippe Sorel, 2000) as Figure 49. According to Trogan and Sorel, "ce projet de médaille est connu sous le titre descriptif: «La Raison apportant au monde les Droits de l'Homme et mettant en fuite la Tyrannie et l'Obscurantisme.»" The point of this design concept was related to the finished design, used on coins beginning in 1793, of Minerva inscribing the Rights of Man on a tablet. Augustin Dupré's pencil notes below the drawing describe the central figure as "la Verité, présipité du globe de la Terre." Later, more finished, versions are found in the Bibliothèque Nationale and the Musée Carnavalet. An exciting and unusual rendition of one of Dupré's most beloved concepts, one familiar in France and the United States alike. A fascinating document, one that suggests that Narcisse Dupré planned to publish a book or pamphlet on his father's American medals. The first page, all text, lists eight of Dupré's works, from the 1782-dated "sceau pour les etats d'Amerique" to three medals dated 1781: Daniel Morgan, Libertas Americana, and a die for Benjamin Franklin that matches nothing we have encountered (possibly the unlisted piece in the collection of the Boston Public Library). The following three pages are mockups of plates, apparently meant to show the designs of each of these. This may have been produced to aid Loubat in his *Medallic History of the United States of America*, or have been intended as a stand-alone publication. Unique. Undated and unsigned, but in the hand of Narcisse Dupré. An invoice of sorts, totaled to 330 (francs?), listing 21 line items such as "Medaille de P. Jones," "Med. Liberté Americaine," "3 cliches Washington," "To Peace and Commerce dessin," and "bust de Franklin sur marble." A note atop the list references Loubat, who used Narcisse Duprés collection as he assembled his *Medallic History of the United States of America*, but according to Narcisse's note, "ne d'aide pas."

Dupré sold a group of American-related material of this nature to the Boston Public Library in 1888. This may be a preliminary inventory of the material sold to the BPL, including, referenced in the seventh line, "2 plaitres d'ores Lib. Amer.," an apparent reference to the very distinctive gilt plaster impressions of the Libertas Americana medal acquired by the Boston Public Library. Certain materials that ended up in Boston are missing, including dies for the Diplomatic Medal, but both drawings and cliches of the Diplomatic Medal are mentioned here. Three items—a Nathanael Greene medal, a Daniel Morgan medal, and a "Franklin au genie" medal—bear parenthetical notes that they are "n'est pas a la monnaie," suggesting these great rarities were missing from even the collection of the Paris Mint. A significant piece of ephemera relating to the first great acquisition of Dupré material by an American institution. The American Philosophical Society acquired additional material from the Dupré estate in 1954, and no further groups hit the market until the remainder was sold by Bonham's in 2014. Count de Moustier Inquires About His Diplomatic Medal Published in Loubat's Medallic History of the United States of America


Written by the only man to ever receive a Diplomatic Medal while alive, the Count de Moustier served as France's ambassador to the United States from 1787 to 1790. He and George Washington spent time together at Mount Vernon, and when de Moustier was recalled to Paris in 1790, Washington moved into de Moustier's former New York home. Washington also acquired his furnishings, some of which remain at Mount Vernon today. Jefferson intended gold Diplomatic Medals to be awarded to the ambassador from the Netherlands, de Moustier, and the Frenchman who preceded him, the Marquise de la Luzerne. De la Luzerne died in September 1791, having never received his medal. Jefferson's early assurances of the medal's creation did not anticipate the lengthy delays William Short faced in getting Dupré to create usable dies. It's apparent that the pressure on Short rose as de Moustier continued to request his. Having received no satisfaction from either Jefferson or Short, de Moustier directed his letter of October 25, 1791 directly to the artist:

I have had the more regret, Sir, at the delay which has happened to the execution of the medal destined for me by the Government of the United States, since I have learned that it was due to causes which have been annoying to you. I hope that a third trial will prove a complete success. I desire it the more ardently since I have seen by the impression in metal at Mr. Short's how gratifying its exhibition will be for a Frenchman abroad who loves to do honor to his compatriots. When it shall be finished I will be much obliged to you if you will please have it sent to me, since Mr. Short is about to leave.

The address panel reads A Monsieur / Monsieur Dupré, Graveur / Place Dauphine, No. 10. The signature "Thibault" below the address is likely the name of the man who delivered it, by hand, from de Moustier to Dupré. Place Dauphine, facing the Pont Neuf in the heart of Paris, is on the Île de la Cité in the middle of the Seine, near Notre Dame.

About three and a half months later, in February 1792, Short finally advised Jefferson that he had delivered the two gold medals, one to a representative of de la Luzerne and the other to the Count de Moustier himself. Neither is known to survive. Four examples of the medal survive in bronze, from an original mintage of exactly six pieces. They are counted among the most desirable of all early American medals and are the final medals created by Dupré for the United States. This letter was published in Joseph Florimond Loubat's 1878 *Medallic History of the United States of America*, while this original document was in the hands of Dupré's son, Narcisse. It appears, in full, on page 123, both in the original French and in translation. It was later cited in Carl Zigrosser's study "The Medallic Sketches of Augustin Dupré in American Collections," published by the American Philosophical Society (*Proceedings*, Volume 101, Number 6) in 1957.

This is the only letter from de Moustier to Dupré that was included in the Dupré archive and the only one noted by Loubat. It may be the sole correspondence between a live recipient of a gold Diplomatic Medal and the man who created it. William Short Letter to Augustin Dupré on Delayed Diplomatic Medals Published in Loubat's Medallic History of the United States of America

The Diplomatic Medal was conceived by Thomas Jefferson as one of his first acts as Secretary of State in the administration of President George Washington. Deeply steeped in the traditions of the European diplomatic corps, Jefferson sought to have the nascent United States recognized as an equal, with all of the trappings of sovereignty. The medal he created remains a historic classic, one of Augustin Dupré's best known and most avidly sought works—and one of the rarest. When Jefferson left Paris, he left the project in the hands of William Short, whose appointment as his replacement was Washington's first—and, thus, the nation's first ever—Presidential appointment. On April 30, 1790, less than a month after officially taking the job as the first Secretary of State, Jefferson wrote to Short, stating that "it has become necessary to determine on a present proper to be given to diplomatic characters on their taking leave of us; and it is concluded that a medal and chain of gold will be the most convenient." Jefferson described the legends and motifs that should be on the medal and left the rest to Short, noting "Duviver and Dupré seem to be the best workmen, perhaps the last is the best of the two."

Short apparently wasted little time inviting Dupré to perform the commission, with the idea that two specimens would be struck in gold, one for the Marquis de la Luzerne, who served as France's minister (later, ambassador) to the United States from 1779 to 1784, the other for the Count de Moustier, who served as ambassador to

the United States from 1784 to 1790. Jefferson, in typically overzealous fashion, told both Luzerne and de Moustier to expect their medals soon. Meanwhile, Short had to deal with the practicalities of procuring them, a process beset with delays, including "the dies for the medal [being] retarded in a most unexpected manner on account of the engraver [i.e., Dupré] being employed here in the new coinage" (Short to Jefferson, September 25, 1791). Dupré's preoccupation with the new French coinage was perhaps the least of the problems, as die after die for the Diplomatic Medal failed before any medals could be struck. Soft medal trials or splashers survive from those dies, struck in the summer and fall of 1791.

By the fall of 1791, more than a year after the project was first undertaken, Short was fed up with the Diplomatic Medal program. Jefferson had extended early assurances to the would-be recipients that their medals would be coming quickly, yet left Short holding the bag. One of the recipients died before he ever saw it. The other rattled Short's chain enough that he lost all patience with Dupré, as witnessed by this letter. One wonders if it was left unsigned in the hopes that history would forget about it:

As I do not suppose that you are ignorant that the medal for America, of which the die was broken in the coining press, has been for a long time promised to distinguished persons, you will no doubt not be surprised at the interest which I take that neither the delicacy of the donors nor the desire of the legatees should be compromised. Now, Sir, I see only one means of avoiding this, that is to give to the donors, for the time being, the only proof which the die has permitted and which is in your hands; this, while removing all suspicion of negligence on my part, prevents also the United States from occupying the disagreeable position if appearing to have forgotten its promises. ... I beg you therefore, Sir, to hand the medal to the bearer, so that I may present it to remedy, in some degree, the accident; and in case you think you ought to retain it, be kind enough to inform me thereof in writing, so that I may justify myself in every way to the interested parties.

Short eventually got gold medals for de Moustier and for an assignee of de la Luzerne in February 1792. Six bronze medals were also struck, and the four that survive today are among the most prized of all American medals. A fairly substantial number of tin splashers or épreuves of the sort Short hoped Dupré would deliver also survive, though the historical record is mum on whether Dupré answered this frantic letter with a proof that Short could use to demonstrate to de Moustier that he was not a lazy good-for-nothing. This letter was published in Joseph Florimond Loubat's 1878 *Medallic History of the United States of America*, while this original document was in the hands of Dupré's son, Narcisse. It appears, in full, on pages 122 and 123, both in the original French and in translation. It was later cited in Carl Zigrosser's study "The Medallic Sketches of Augustin Dupré in American Collections," published by the American Philosophical Society (*Proceedings*, Volume 101, Number 6) in 1957. Purchased from Kolbe & Fanning, in cooperation with John Kraljevich Americana; ex Cardinal Collection Library.

These volumes comprise the first 15 volumes of *The Papers of John Adams*, taking the reader from his young adulthood through the entirety of the Revolutionary War years. The Adams Papers Projects has been active since 1954, striving to edit and publish the entirety of the writings of the John Adams family, an enormous undertaking including letters, diaries, government and diplomatic papers, and much else, most of it drawn from the library and collections of the Massachusetts Historical Society. Undoubtedly some little-known material of numismatic relevance remains to be found within. Published as Series III of the Adams Papers: *General Correspondence and Other Papers of the Adams Statesmen*. Those volumes current in print begin at about \$130 from the publisher, making the acquisition of a secondhand set an appealing prospect. Ex Cardinal Collection Library.

The special edition at hand is intended to serve a different purpose. Here, the authors' objective is to place the reader in a closer relationship with the historical events that are described. To this end, the text of this edition has been prepared by the same letterpress technology in use in the late eighteenth century. The two centuries that lie between the American Revolution and the present day are neatly bridged by the inclusion of a leaf from a book published in 1878. Joseph Florimond Loubat's *Medallic History of the United States* is the spiritual ancestor of the present volume. Elegantly printed on sumptuous paper, Loubat's magnum opus sets a standard of scholarly excellence that has not been matched and to which, immodestly, we aspire. Between the timeless craftsmanship of Bird & Bull Press and the actual leaf from Loubat, the authors seek to reinforce the message that our early medals were intended to convey. 

The rare complete catalogue of this important and wide-ranging sale, of which coins and medals formed but a portion. Caruso (1873–1921) was an inveterate collector, and had the sagacity (as well as the means) to form highly interesting collections in a number of areas. Henry Chapman was called in to catalogue the numismatic segment of the sale, comprising lots 256–555 (which is rarely encountered in a separate printing). The sale also included some Renaissance medals and plaquettes not included in the coin section. This full catalogue of the great opera singer's art estate is very infrequently seen, especially with prices and names. (The later sale of coins from Caruso's estate by C. & E. Canessa, while scarce, is also encountered more frequently.)

A well-preserved starter set of the first 11 volumes, in contemporary bindings. Still an indispensable source of numismatic information and lore. Many of America's greatest contributions to numismatic scholarship first appeared in the pages of this most important publication, including Crosby's classic work on 1793 large cents and parts of his *Early Coins of America*. For American researchers, the *Journal* is interesting for the reminiscences and other fascinating tidbits of information to be found in these earlier volumes, much of which is little known today except among the few fortunate to possess a set of this remarkable storehouse of knowledge. The November 1868 issue marks the first use of photography in an American numismatic periodical (the U.S. Mint photograph), and

the April 1869 issue features the first substantial article ever written on United States large cents. It also was accompanied by a remarkable photograph arranged by J.N.T. Levick, depicting 12 obverses and 10 reverses of 1793 cents from famous collections of the day, with die links. The large cent photograph found in this copy is a sharp example of the second issue of this plate. Volume IV features what is usually called the "Hall Plate," depicting the head of Liberty on U.S. coins—this was actually taken by Benjamin Betts and produced by Hall Photo. The existence of two versions of the plate was brought to widespread attention by Frank Van Zandt (who discussed them in the Spring 1994 issue of *The Asylum*); the version of the plate with Levick's name written by hand is present in this copy.



Fourteen consecutive volumes from the Boston years, with some of the later volumes being scarce. Still an indispensable source of numismatic information and lore. Volume XII includes W.T.R. Marvin's "Currency of the Confederate States." Volume XIII features William Sumner Appleton's "Early Writers on Numismatics." XIV begins McLachlan's important work on Canadian numismatics, which would eventually appear in book form. Volume XV includes articles by W. Elliot Woodward on the Standish Barry threepence and the Washington before Boston medal, as well as an enumeration of his first 30 numbered (and four unnumbered) sales. J.C. Brevoort began a lengthy series of article on Spanish and Portuguese coinage in the Americas in Volume XVI, with Robert Morris starting a series on the coinage of the Grand Masters of Malta. Volume XVIII includes Patterson DuBois writing on "Our Mint Engravers." It also introduces Barclay Head, writing on ancient Greek coins. Volume XIX publishes an important article by George M. Parsons on Franco-American jetons, and Alexander Del Mar began writing on Chinese coins in that volume. Parsons would continue his AJN contributions with a series on the French Revolution beginning in Volume XX, with a very fine photographic plate of coins and medals illustrating the Revolution in Volume XXI. Articles of note in Volume XXII include an ongoing one by Thomas Warner on communion tokens, commentary on the government's attitude toward the collecting of pattern coins, an article by Storer on Goethe medals, the continuation of Marvin on Masonic medals, and one by R.H.C. Tufnell on the coins of India. Parsons continues his work on what we now call Betts medals in Volume XXIII, and Lyman Low contributes an article on Washington medals in Volume XXIV. Volume XXV includes John A. Nexsen's census on examples of the 1804 dollar, tracing 12 examples. Volumes XXIV and XXV appear to be legitimately scarce. "near the climax of the period that witnessed the establishment of coin collecting in the United States." Annotated throughout in pencil with many interesting comments and additions. A number of earlier sales not so recorded by Attinelli are noted to be on fine or large paper and, in the latter sections of the book, there are a number of additions. Attinelli's system of recording acquisitions is utilized in the margins, documenting a comprehensive collection. Also, a goodly number of elusive items are marked: "sold to [William] Poillon," a noted collector who is prominently mentioned in the preface. Some listings are also marked: "Sold to [John K.] Wiggin." Included as well are photocopies of a fascinating March 17, 1877 letter from Attinelli to Haines and an Attinelli flyer offering the book for sale. With its colorful vignettes of dealers and collectors of the day and a plenitude of useful facts and fascinating lore, Attinelli's work brings 19th-century American numismatics to life. His word sketches of the great and not-so-great coin collectors, dealers, numismatists and scalawags of the day are indispensable in any attempt to understand the beginnings of commercial and organizational numismatics in the second half of the 19th century in America. Attinelli's meticulous cataloguing of the numismatic auction sale catalogues of the period parallels the thoroughness of Sylvester Crosby in his chosen field of American colonial coins. Parts II and III of the book comprise an in-depth bibliography of "Catalogues and Price-Lists" and "Publications issued in the United States." Both sections are, even today, of great value. Estimates vary as to how many copies of Numisgraphics were originally printed but they are invariably miniscule. Adams comments in the foreword to the Quarterman reprint: "Whatever the size of the original edition, relatively few copies got into circulation. The remainder, if any, seems to have disappeared quickly; Numisgraphics appeared on want lists as early as 1879. In any event, the book is extremely rare today, with less than a dozen copies known to exist. Half of these are impounded in institutions and the remaining half ardently hunted by numismatic cognoscenti." This appraisal, made three decades ago, may be a bit pessimistic, but Numisgraphics remains one of the great rarities of American numismatic literature and it has only begun to be fully appreciated, in both intellectual and economic terms. A fascinating work. Those interested in fractional currency will find several chapters to be of particular interest. A series of accusations of impropriety revolved around Spencer M. Clark, Superintendent of the National Currency Bureau, and included "gross immoralities and fraudulent operations in the Treasury Department. It was more than intimated, by those who ought to have known, that among the hundreds of females employed there, some were not virtuous, while in the regular operations of the establishment fraud had a place." Specific charges included "complicity with Bank Note Companies," and "gross immorality" concerning "S.M. Clark, in connection with certain female employees of his department." Though these and other allegations created a sensation at the time, Baker's methods and motives as chief of the United States Secret Service were subsequently largely discredited. According to the Dictionary of American Biography, his "habitual carelessness in mixing truth and fiction was not overcome in his History of the United States Secret Service." This work is especially sought after by those interested in Lincolniana since Baker was instrumental in the planning and direction of the expedition that captured John Wilkes Booth and these events are covered in the book in some detail. Tipped in at the end of this copy is a Jones Brothers & Co. flyer entitled "Agents Wanted." Scarce, especially in the original binding.



Greville and Dorothy Bathe's biography of Jacob Perkins (1766–1849) is widely considered to be a masterful biography of this important engraver of coins, paper money and stamps. The authors manage to encapsulate their subject's wide-ranging interests and activities in one highly readable volume, whether they are discussing the development of his nail-making apparatus or his finely-honed engraving skills. Published in the midst of World War II, it is perhaps not surprising that only 200 copies would be printed of a book-length work on an inventor, engraver and engineer whom time had largely forgotten.

Of these 200 copies, many, perhaps most, were impounded in institutional libraries—copies such as this, which have never been part of an institutional library, are difficult to find. In recent years, numismatists have come to a better understanding of the role Perkins played in the development of U.S. currency and, earlier in life, of his work on the Massachusetts coppers. 

A very rare pioneering work on the topic, enumerating Bolen's famous productions, describing 41 distinct issues plus 15 mules. Each issue is carefully described, noting when the dies were cut, the numbers struck in various metals, and the disposition of dies. John Adams Bolen was born in New York City in 1826. He moved to Springfield,

Massachusetts in 1850, where he at one time conducted a die-sinking establishment. In later years he devoted his time to collecting old books, minerals, stamps and coins, and had an interesting and valuable collection. He was a member of the American Numismatic and Archaeological Society from 1868 until his death on March 14, 1906. Today, he is perhaps best known for his well-executed copies of American colonial coins, which have at times been mistaken as originals. His productions, however, were never meant to deceive and were widely publicized in early issues of the *American Journal of Numismatics*. An article in the February 1870 issue enumerates several colonial replicas and notes: "Mr. Bolen will furnish either of these pieces, in copper, for the price of Two Dollars... They are extremely well done, and may serve as substitutes for the originals till collectors have the good fortune to obtain the former." The 1893 in the title refers to the year in which the last of Bolen's pieces were struck; his Preface is dated October 1904. Only a few copies of the present work have been offered in modern times. 


Possibly the first copy signed by Breen, inscribed by him to Armand Champa: "Long Beach June 2, 1988. First copy signed here! For Armand Champa—friend & fellow Bibliomaniac—with respect & incredulous admiration—this is inscribed by a grateful Walter Breen." In cataloguing this volume for Part III of the Champa Library sales, Charles Davis noted that the June Long Beach show was the first to be attended by Breen after the release of the *Complete Encyclopedia*. Certainly one of the first signed if not the very first. Breen's *Complete Encyclopedia* is probably the greatest single attempt to discuss all U.S. coinage, including colonial and private coinages, in a single volume. While some have focused on the text's occasional errors and the volume's production problems, it would be impossible to name another reference work that includes so much solid information on U.S. coins. British Regulation of Coins in the Americas

An early and rare British proclamation regulating the values of the coins being used in the American colonies. This 1708 Act (to go into effect in 1709) was issued in response to reports that an earlier Proclamation, issued in 1704, was not being complied with. It clarifies both the intent of the original Proclamation, and spells out in some detail the unpleasantness awaiting those who continue to ignore the Queen's regulations. This printing includes the text of the original 1704 Proclamation, then continues: "whereas notwithstanding the said Proclamation, the same indirect Practices as are therein mentioned, are still Carried on within some of the said Colonies or Plantations, and the Money thereby drawn from one Plantation to another, in Prejudice of the Trade of her Majesties Subjects...." The 1704 Proclamation, which this subsequent Act was intended to enforce, is discussed by Crosby on pages 117 to 122 of The Early Coins of America. Crosby discusses the reaction to the original proclamation of the Massachusetts Bay colony, which struggled for ways to accommodate the Proclamation while acknowledging the difficulty of doing so given the state of the coinage circulating in America. Philip Mossman also discusses the 1704 Proclamation (pages 48 through 53 of Money of the American Colonies and Confederation), stating that "Since this regulation was initiated by the English Board of Trade the motive must be suspect. Rather than inspired by altruism toward the colonists, the authors were much more concerned that there be a stable currency to pay the English merchants." He also notes that "Only Barbados and Maryland complied with the Proclamation, while the other colonies virtually ignored it. ... This insubordination promoted the Crown to reissue the provisions of the Proclamation as an Act of Parliament in 1707 with force of law." The Parliamentary Act is what is being offered here: Mossman's sources are apparently incorrect on the year of issue. In British Imprints Relating to North America, R.C. Simmons gives the actual date of printing as 1708. A very interesting and important proclamation. British acts and proclamations appear to have been published separately at the time of issue, but paginated for incorporation into annual volumes. English Short-Title Catalogue N53267. With Little-Known Numismatic Content

Bourne 1890-26 and 1890-37. *The Philatelic West* was a general hobbies magazine published between 1896 and 1930. It began as a publication of the Nebraska Philatelic Society, and its exact title changed now and then throughout its history, usually reflecting shifts in the popularity of various hobbies. While its primary focus was on stamp collecting, numismatics also fell under its purview, as did a number of other avocations. Numismatic authors who contributed to the publication include Edgar H. Adams, Farran Zerbe, S.H. Chapman, and Tom Elder, whose photograph graces the December 1915 issue's front cover (present here). Volumes published during the period represented in this lot consisted of three issues, with the numbering plagued by occasional errors and the publishing schedule at times inconsistent. 



A most interesting volume. The preserved title page is neatly inscribed "Day Book for Schroder Schulte & Co San Francisco" in black ink faded a bit to brown. The entire volume would appear to have been used for its original purpose, though nearly every page has subsequently been pressed into service as backing for a newspaper clipping album. The clippings concern a number of different subjects, and would seem simply to be whatever caught the scrapbooker's attention. Included are a printed letter to the editor by Augustus Humbert responding to a question on the value of the silver content in the alloy of gold coins, material on the deposits of California gold at Philadelphia and New York in 1851–1852, articles on California gold mine production, robberies, "California Gold Mining Reminiscences" published in 1852 (and we thought being nostalgic about the immediate past was a modern trait!), and other related items. The keeper of the album would appear to have been of both a scientific and artistic turn of mind, with many articles of scientific interest interspersed with bits of oratory and poetry. Since Henry wrote the sale and Samuel Hudson produced the plates, we expect a miscommunication took place, though the original intention is lost to time. This copy, however, is a quarto-format hardcover without plates, and it is clear that it never had them. The first such variant we recall having handled.

However, the older Hays numbers seem to have taken deep root in the affections of cent collectors, and it now appears likely that the name Hays will long be associated with this the most extensive one-date series of American coins." In an interesting article appearing in the Fall, 1994 issue of *The Asylum*, Denis Loring presented his findings regarding the little known fact that there are two printings of this edition. He designates the first printing, most easily identified by the gilt lettering on the spine, as 26A, and the second printing as 26B and goes on to enumerate a number of textual differences observed in the copies he examined. 



This handsome production and Newcomb's 1925 work before it set a new standard. Carefully written, painstakingly researched and wonderfully illustrated, they eclipsed all previous efforts. One of the founders and president of Aluminum Company of America, Clapp wrote in an April 16, 1932 letter (lot 192 in our 1993 ANA sale) to Michael Powills, that "there is no doubt but that I was foolish in putting out the book in such an expensive form, but I took a pride in my work and wanted it to be a credit to the subject, so hunted up the best printer that I could find and told him to do his best." Clapp included the 1799 varieties only after realizing that his 1799 No. 1 was struck before 1798 Nos. 46 and 47. Davis 239. Ex Richard V. A landmark in American numismatics, the Mackenzie sale is the first U.S. auction sale catalogue issued with photographic plates. The first plate depicts Washingtonia; the second illustrates rare American silver coins, including a choice 1794 dollar, and English rarities; the third depicts silver Revolutionary peace medals; the fourth illustrates choice ancient Greek and Roman gold coins (16 Roman and 1 Greek); and the final plate depicts the obverses of Mackenzie's choice early large cents and a 1793 half cent. The plates in the Mackenzie and Allan catalogues are superior to many of those in Cogan's later sales. Jim Neiswinter has suggested that, based on stylistic similarities between the Mackenzie sale plates and

the 1869 Levick plate, George Rockwood was likely the photographer for this sale. The sale announcement letter appears to be rare. It reads in part: "The Collection generally, with the exception of the United States Cents, is more an assortment of fine pieces, than a regular collection of Coins. The U.S. cents are in my opinion, on the whole, the best set ever yet offered for sale... It is Mr. Livingston's intention to have many of the pieces photographed and inserted in the Catalogue, which will add greatly to the expense; every regular Collector will be furnished with a Catalogue, but a charge of One Dollar will be made for duplicates." A classic volume of Americana, being a history of the project that resulted in the Erie Canal coupled with reports on the ceremonies commemorating the opening of this vital linkage of the Atlantic Ocean and the Great Lakes. Cadwallader David Colden (1769–1834) was Mayor of New York from 1818 to 1821 and at the time of this book's publication was serving as a State Senator. His *Memoir* is an important contemporary account of this landmark accomplishment in American engineering, a feat of ingenuity that transformed the economy of much of the nation. In addition to Cadwallader's historic overview, the volume includes a lengthy *Appendix, Containing an Account of the Commemoration of the Completion of the Erie Canal, by the Corporation of the City of New York... and William*

L. Stone's *Narrative of the Festivities Observed in Honor of the Completion of the Grand Erie Canal...* which festivities took place between October 26 and November 4, 1825 and extended from Buffalo to New York. Beginning on page 343 of the *Appendix*, Archibald Robertson gives his *Report of the Department of Fine Arts*, in which he discusses the famous medal struck in commemoration of the completion of the project:

The first of my operations was to make an appropriate Device, intended for a Medal, to be worn by the guests of the Corporation on the joyful day; but time not permitting the execution of such a work as would be worthy of the occasion, it was resolved to have this Device engraved by a first-rate artist, and postpone the Medal to be executed at leisure: it was therefore engraved on copper by Mr. Asher B. Durand, and printed on satin by Mr. Elias Wade, jun., and thus, as a Badge, was worn by the ladies and gentlemen on the Celebration Day... ¶ The Corporation of the City having voted that a MEDAL should be struck ... the same general idea of a Device, was adopted, as on that of the Badge worn by the Corporation guests on the celebration day. On the face of the Medal is represented Neptune, who, with brotherly cordiality, returns Pan's visit to the Ocean; the motto—"UNION OF ERIE WITH THE ATLANTIC." Under this emblem are the initials of the artists R. Del., W. Sc. On the reverse is the Armorial Bearings of the State, the sole agent in the great work; on the right of which are appropriately represented Canal Aqueducts and Locks; and on the left is a view of the Harbor and City of New York; the motto "ERIE CANAL COMM. 4 JULY, 1817, COMP. 26 OCTR. 1825:" the contracted words in this motto in full are "COMMENCED," and "COM-PLETED." Underneath the above is the sculptor's name "C.C. WRIGHT"; and below are the words in small Roman capitals "PRESENTED BY THE CITY OF N. YORK." ... 9 The Medal was engraved by Mr. Charles C. Wright, (of the firm of A. B. and C. Durand, Wright and Co., corner of Broadway and Canal Street.) The lettering by Mr. Richard Trested, Engraver and Die Sinker, 68, William Street, upon dies made by Mr William Williams, Worker in Iron and Steel, corner of Liberty and Green Streets. The Medals, themselves, were most elegantly impressed by Mr. Maltby Pelletreau, (of the firm of Pelletreau, Bennett, and Cooke, 170, Broadway,) at their Gold and Silver Manufactory, No 12, Rose Street, by means of his very powerful and exquisitely adjusted screw Press. The superlative beauty of this Medal (to every one who has seen it) renders it perfectly unnecessary for us to say more...

The original design of the badge, from which the medal was derived, appears on a plate opposite 344 of the volume at hand. The volume is extensively illustrated, most particularly with lithographs provided by Anthony Imbert, a New York artist among the earliest to turn his hand to this technique; the maps are by B.T. Welch & Co., and were drawn by E. Lucas, Jr. A careful review of the listed illustrations accounts for them all (though some of them appear in different locations than that indicated); the present volume was one bound for presentation purposes and features the city arm's impressed on the covers. 

Contact sheets generally depict 36 exposures, plus or minus. Some of the 162 contact sheets are duplicates, and a few of them are partials, but, even accounting for these, there are thousands of exposures represented in this group, depicting coins from many of the finest collections of half cents in existence in the early 1980s when these would have been produced.





All of the photography is presumably by Jack Collins. A number of the contact sheets include handwritten notes on the back regarding images that were printed in the book, with corresponding marks on the image backgrounds.

- 2. Correspondence. Includes letters among and between Jack Collins, Walter Breen, Eric P. Newman, Ron Guth, Q. David Bowers, Gary Meghrig, Bill Michal, Dai Nippon (the printers), John Peters, P. Scott Rubin, First Coinvestors, the Library of Congress, Spink, Russ Logan, and others. Several letters are signed by or in the hand of Walter Breen.
- 3. Other papers. Includes lists for use in proofing, various legal agreements, photographs, lists of coins, provenance notes and printouts, information on shipping, the final binding design (covers without text block), customs and other practical matters stemming from the book being printed in Japan, and so forth.
- 4. Original printing negatives for the enlarged color illustrations at the end of the *Encyclopedia*. Twenty full-size negatives (20 by 26 inches), each comprising four pages. Includes blanks. Marked for printing.

Paper materials generally vary in condition from very good to fine, with many bearing folds or wrinkles from mailing, use and storage; photos are generally marked up for editorial use, but are otherwise usually fine. \$2000

An important archive of material relating to the publication in 1983 of *Walter Breen's Encyclopedia of United States Half Cents 1793–1857*. Although Breen began compiling his half cent book in the 1950s, it was eventually set aside while the author attended to making a living and working on other projects. The energy provided by Jack Collins reinvigorated the project. As extraordinary as Breen could be, his business sense was negligible—he struggled his entire life to make ends meet while being widely acknowledged as the foremost American expert in a field awash in money. Collins brought business acumen and social skills to the project, gaining the cooperation of most of the major half cent collectors of the day, arranging for the printing and distribution of the volume, handling its marketing and promotion, and—most importantly—getting the work out of Breen. It would likely never have been completed without him. This archive is genuinely significant. The 162 contact sheets here present include thousands of photographs, including many of the finest half cents in existence. It should be emphasized that many of the photographs were not used in the *Encyclopedia*, and that these images provide a remarkable insight into a number of highly important collections. The correspondence includes letters on the preparation and printing of the book, the borrowing of significant half cents and other coins for photography, the distribution of the title, contracts between the parties involved, a possible lawsuit, etc. A fascinating group of material. The Jack Collins Archives on the 1794 Dollar, Including His Specially Bound Photographically Illustrated Manuscript

- 1. A specially bound binder containing full-color printouts of his ongoing project [(12), 74, (4) pages], with actual photos and other materials. His personal copy, and a remarkable tribute to the man and his work.
- 2. One hundred twenty-two sheets of typewritten descriptions of different 1794 dollars, to each of which is clipped photographs of the coin in question (usually black and white, occasionally color). Annotated in pencil and various inks throughout.
- 3. Eighty-six sheets of typewritten descriptions of different 1794 dollars, to each of which is pasted photographs of the coin in question (black and white). Annotated in pencil and various inks throughout. These are probably an earlier iteration than the similar ones listed above. Also included is a printout of the condition census section of his manuscript, with photographic prints pasted in place.
- 4. Large group of pre-publication materials. Includes hundreds, quite probably thousands, of pages of computer printed drafts and revisions. More importantly, includes some draft materials marked up by hand by Collins, Michael Hodder and others. Also includes correspondence regarding the proofreading process and regarding the condition census (of which there are many drafts present). While some of this material is doubtless present in more than one copy, there appear to be multiple generations of drafts present here. There are also some photographic contact prints and original negatives present, and other materials concerning the illustrations in the Collins book.
- 5. Another large group of correspondence, photocopied articles and other materials. Includes file folders holding drafts and correspondence with Del Bland, Dick Doty, Jim Elman, R.W. Julian, Marvin Lessen, Michael Hodder, Scott Rubin, Eric P. Newman; 26 files containing photocopied articles and other information from a variety of identified sources, including mainstream numismatic books and periodicals as well as more obscure historical, governmental and financial publications; more drafts of the book itself, with handwritten notes and corrections; files on the 1776 Continental Currency dollars, 1794 patterns and related subjects.
- 6. Final group of photographs, drafts and various files of relevant materials. Most important among the materials present is a thick file folder containing hundreds of pages of original and copy correspondence on the 1794 project among and between Collins, Bowers (much of this), Breen, Hodder, Newman, Denis Loring, the Princeton University libraries, David Perkins, Robert Stark, Mark Van Winkle, Tom Mulvaney, Harvey Stack, Douglas Mudd, Alan Weinberg, David Tripp, Jules Reiver, Carl Carlson, Les Elam, Alex Zdanovich, Jonathan Kern, Rick Bagg, Dan Drykerman, Graham Rayner, Russell Vaughn, Bill Ulrich, Gary Sturtridge, Fred Sweeney, Don Partrick, Don Groves, David Lange, Dan Demeo, Freeman Craig, Douglas Saville, John Kleeberg, Paul Rynearson, Dan Hamelberg, Ron Landis, Larry Goldberg, John J. Ford, Remy Bourne, Emery May Norweb, Alan Meghrig and others. This file of correspondence is of considerable importance and interest on its own.

All told, the archives fill three or four boxes and include exhaustive documentation on the production of the Collins & Breen 1794 dollar book, as well as hundreds of letters to and from Collins, Breen, and dozens of important numismatists. Generally well-preserved. \$5000

An extraordinary archive, being Jack Collins's primary research material for his work, carried out in conjunction with Walter Breen, on the 1794 silver dollar. The manuscript was nearly complete at the time of Collins's death in 1996 (Breen died in 1993); the project would have died with him but for the efforts of George Kolbe and Alan Meghrig, who managed to recover the files and publish the manuscript in 2007 as 1794: The History and Genealogy

of the First United States Dollar. A classic European account of travels and experiences in America, with some interesting numismatic content. Crévecoeur's work is unusual in that he lived here for many years, having first traveled to America with the French forces during the French and Indian War. He remained after the conflict, settling as a farmer. Howes in U.S.iana, wrote that it was "of great influence in attracting European immigration in the post-revolutionary period. As literature unexcelled by any American work of the eighteenth century." The five maps present in this work, all of which are present and well-preserved in this set, are important. The first, and largest (measuring 64.5 by 47.75 cm) is the Carte generale des etats de Virginie, Maryland, Delaware, Pensilvanie, Nouveau-Jersey, New-York, Connecticut..., which covers the western frontier (tracing the Ohio to the Mississippi) as well as the urban east. Smaller maps include ones of Nantucket and Martha's Vineyard, with the latter being especially important. A folding map of Indian villages in the Ohio Rover Valley and a Carte generale des Etats-Unis de l'Amerique Septentrionale are also included. The numismatic illustrations found on the title pages are striking and worthy of attention; perhaps even more significant is Crévecoeur's discussion in the third volume (pages 527-529) of the 1787 Mint Ordinance, and his description of the proposed coinage system, including a discussion of the denominations from mills to the eagle, their weights and values, and so on. Present here is the rare first issue of the Levick Plate, "arguably the most famous photographic plate in American numismatics" (James Neiswinter, "Joseph N.T. Levick," *America's Large Cent: Coinage of the Americas Conference at the American Numismatic Society* [New York: ANS, 1998]). It depicts 12 obverses and 10 reverses of 1793 cents from famous collections of the day, with die links. The photograph was prepared, with printed text added at the top and bottom of its backing, to accompany the first substantial monograph ever written on United States large cents. Two versions of the published plate were produced, which was first noticed by George Kolbe and described in the Spring 1994 issue of *The Asylum* in an article by Frank Van Zandt. The first was probably produced for Levick by Sarony & Co., the same firm that produced the extremely rare prototype plates. It likely dates from late 1868, the date given below Levick's handwritten name. The second version was produced by George Rockwood, probably in very early 1869, and features Levick's name in type. The plates are very similar, with some minor adjustments of position, and most notably differ in the lighting and in the style of Levick's name. The exact circumstances behind their issuance and distribution remain unclear, though the earlier version seems to have been distributed to corresponding members of the Society and the second version to local members. 

Sylvester Sage Crosby began gathering information for his magnum opus in the late 1860s. Nominally the head of a committee of six appointed by the New England Numismatic and Archæological Society to publish a work on early American coinage, he soon found himself alone in that pursuit. Not only was the research and composition of the work done almost entirely by Crosby, ultimately he also had to publish it. "It is truly the keystone to any library of American coinage." — Eric P. A complete set of the very scarce deluxe edition of the California volumes. An impressive work, both in appearance and content. The first two volumes provide a detailed history of California as seen through the eyes of finance, with considerable numismatic information. "A sincere attempt has been made to present the history of every bank established in the state from the days of the gold rush to the close of 1926," Cross writes in his Preface. The first volume is devoted to the 19th century, as are the opening chapters of the second, giving much information on the unique complications existing in California's economy of the period. Chapters on coinage and paper money are to be found in the first volume, while the second volume takes the history through to the time of publication. Illustrations include many of the people behind the early California banks, and also depict private gold coinage (taken from the Adams volume), the first San Francisco Mint building and an early bank note. Volumes 3 and 4 are devoted to biographies of influential bankers still living at the time. An attractive set of a useful reference. The first work covering the entire range of American numismatics, Dickeson's book is a landmark of American numismatic history. This copy is especially notable for the full-page letter from C. Wyllys Betts that has been written on the opening blank. Addressed to "Charley," it encourages him in his coin collecting, but cautions him against placing undue emphasis on collecting American coins: "I wish to warn you from the great fault of American numismatists.—that of giving too much attention to our own coins. The study is, I acknowledge extremely fascinating, partly on account of the ease with which specimens may be collected, and partly because as little labor is required to make one master of the subject. But it is from foreign coins that we must look for that instruction which is inseparable from the true science. Not that I would have you abandon the collection of American coins, or even make the[m] entirely subordinate. The colonial series is one of great interest, and in many instances illustrated well our early history. But beware of the collection of date-series. With the cents it does well enough; but in the silver a few specimens of each type should be deemed amply sufficient..." A fascinating letter. By nature a popularizer and showman, Dickeson toured the country for several years in the early 1850s lecturing on North American archeology and excavating Indian mounds. His Numismatical Manual (the al was dropped after the first edition) was also clearly intended to reach a mass market. Handsome in format and visual presentation, it was distributed by a major publisher of the day and written in an authoritative manner. Dickeson even envisaged, "if it should be approved, to prepare an edition for the use of schools." Until the appearance of Breen's magnum opus in 1988, it remained the only comprehensive work on American numismatics ever published. Ex Cardinal Collection Library.



"Proskey was the first to try to bring descriptive order to the study of early cents as a whole." For unknown reasons, Proskey appears to have passed the work and his unfinished notes on to Doughty who republished the work in 1890 under his own name. Sheldon further observes that "The Proskey designations thus became Doughty designations, although it has been said that Doughty scarcely knew one date from another." Nearly 200 of the coins photographed are from the Oscar Pearl collection; over 100 are from the American Numismatic Society collection; 102 are ex Newcomb; others are ex C.M. Williams, Dr. French, Earle, Granberg, Beckwith, Mougey, Winsor, Henry Miller, Hays/Phelps, Parmelee, M.A. Brown, Mills, Bement, Mickley, and Zabriski. A pioneering work, comprising the first listing of the contents of the Mint Cabinet. The introduction features the author's evocative statement: "The collection was commenced in June, 1838. Long before that date, however, Mr. Adam Eckfeldt, formerly Chief Coiner, led as well by his own taste as by the expectation that a conservatory would some day be established, took pains to preserve master-coins of the different annual issues of the Mint, and to retain some of the finest foreign specimens, as they appeared in deposit for recoinage." A printed notice on the title verso reads in part: "By a private contribution, an edition of one hundred forty copies, in the present form, has been struck off, for distribution to such societies and individuals as would be likely to appreciate the subject. It has also been adorned by a vignette, through the generosity of Mr. Saxton and Mr. Longacre, artists." The first copy we have handled of this extremely rare work. This was the first attempt to fully catalogue U.S. transportation tokens, and was originally compiled by Kenworthy, who passed his work along to Dunn, who privately circulated this duplicated typescript on a very limited basis. This appears to be the copy sold in the 1971 Fuld Library sale, where it was stated that only three copies were known—an overly precise statement, we feel, though it is certainly extremely rare. Oddly, Dr. Maris doesn't seem to have written the section on the New Jersey coppers, despite the publication of his magnum opus two years before. The final, and most complete, edition of this landmark of American numismatic literature. An early issue, apparently published to utilize a remaining quantity of text and plates, and accompanied by additional text not found in earlier editions. This 1851 imprint appears to have often included less than the full complement of plates and, sometimes, no plates at all. Seldom are copies encountered, as here, with all of Saxton's handsome engravings, plus the two added illustrations of pioneer gold coins. Indeed, the only items not included are the two actual samples of California gold on page 235, which are found only in a small number of copies published in 1849 without the final supplements present here. The scarce December 1849 supplement comprising pages 221-240 contains the attractive plate of California and Mormon gold coins (probably the earliest metallic embossed coin illustrations produced in this country) and the tipped-in Mormon plate. The actual gold samples included in some copies were never included in this (i.e., they have not been removed, but were never present to begin with). This copy also contains the rare two-page 1851 addenda, including a depiction of the new three-cent silver piece. At the time of publication, this was the only practical guide available to American coin collectors. It was the first work to illustrate the 1804 dollar and was one of the earliest works to combine daguerreotype photography, electrotyping, embossing, and the medal ruling machine for illustrative purposes. Originally published in 1850, New Varieties "was designed as a convenient and authentic manual for individuals or institutions dealing in the precious metals, and especially those engaged in the California trade, then newly opened. It also served the purpose of a supplement to a larger work by the same authors on the same subject, issued in 1842... There is appended a reprint of the 'Pledges of History; or, A Brief Account of the Collection of Coins Belonging to the Mint of the United States,' which was issued by the Assistant Assayer in 1846, and of which scarcely a copy remains..." This is the more frequently encountered binding for the 1851 edition. Clain-Stefanelli 11882.

An attractive plated example, bound by Alan Grace, of this notable catalogue. The Wilson sale is important in several areas, most especially for U.S. large cents. At the head of that section, Elder terms it "the finest collection ever sold at auction" and notes that "Most of these choice pieces were purchased by Mr. Wilson at the Frothingham sale in May, 1883. Several are from the Parmelee collection." Two paragraphs in the preface are devoted to the private gold collection, "one of the best that has ever been offered." Eight of the plates illustrate large cents; three plates depict United States gold coins; there are four plates of silver dollars, two of halves and one each of quarters and dimes; two plates depict pattern silver dollars and ten early half dimes; three plates illustrate ancient, medieval and modern foreign coins; and four plates depict pioneer gold rarities. Elder boasts in his introduction that the plated edition contains more plates than any other previous numismatic sale, which appears to be the case. Davis 350. Often, plated copies come with only one or two specialized sections of the plates, rather than all of them as here; there are also at least three different varieties of the text; and even the prices realized list comes on regular and thick paper. Four of the superb photographic plates

depict ancient Greek and Roman coins; nine illustrate English and European coins; one depicts American colonial

coins; and the remaining eight plates illustrate American pioneer gold coins. A well-known neurologist, Lawrence wrote a number of books on the topic. His coin collection was remarkably varied but is best known for its outstanding collection of California and other pioneer gold coins. Elder explains the reason for this predilection in his introduction: "The late Dr. George Alfred Lawrence was born at Lawrence, California, a settlement named for his ancestors, on June 6th, 1869. As California was the principal seat of the coinage of private gold issued between 1849 and 1855, it was natural that the Doctor should specialize in the American Private Gold Coinages." Plated copies of the Lawrence catalogue have long been desirable and are infrequently obtainable. As noted previously, a number of private gold pieces feature the buyer's name, in all but one case "Chap[man]," who was a busy man that day. An interesting note accompanies lot 1384, the 1849 Massachusetts and California Company \$5.00 in gold: "\$7900. Chapman. Record for am American Coin at Auction." Davis 370. Beginning with Thomas Addis Emmet's 1867 articles in the *American Journal of Numismatics*, Fanning discusses the various publications devoted to the collecting and study of Confederate paper money in the 19th century, culminating with the publication in the early 20th century of Raphael P. Thian's *The Currency of the Confederate States of America*.



Franklin's letters in this volume include ones pertaining to the Comitia Americana medal struck for François de Fleury (pages 42, 55 and 62) and some of the earliest records of the origins of the Libertas Americana medal: "This puts me in mind of a medal I have had a mind to strike since the late great event you give me an account of, representing the United States by figure of an infant Hercules in his cradle, strangling the two serpents; and France, by that of Minerva, sitting by as his nurse, with her spear and helmet, and her robe speckled with a few fleurs-de-lis. The extinguishing two entire armies in one war, is what has rarely if ever happened, and it gives a presage of the future force of our growing empire" (pages 117–118, with more material on page 156). A nearly complete set of the *Papers of Benjamin Franklin* published to date (a 43rd volume was released in 2018 and is not here present). The project is a joint undertaking of Yale University and the American Philosophical Society, and was begun in 1954, with the first volume reaching publication in 1959. It attempts to be comprehensive, including everything Franklin wrote as well as (insofar as is possible) every letter he received. It is an amazing undertaking, and there is little doubt that generally unknown numismatic nuggets await discovery within. The project is near completion, with 47 volumes planned. Those volumes still in print are available from the publisher for \$138 each, making the purchase of a complete set an appealing prospect. Ex Cardinal Collection Library.

Frossard took the opportunity presented by his January 3, 1879 sale of the George Merritt collection to compile this work, illustrating it with coins from Merritt's collection as well as from that of Lorin G. Parmelee. The book is a good overview of both series and one of the earliest to deal with die varieties for dates past 1794. Of considerable historical importance. Davis 400. Frossard & Hays on 1794 Cents

Written by Frossard and based on Hays's collection. Fifty-six varieties were described, given a new numbering system and, most importantly, for the first time the coins were depicted. In the preface, Frossard notes that "It is but just to my collaborator, Mr. Hays, the man through whose patience and perseverance a complete set of the 1794 Cents was collected, that the varieties in this new classification should bear his name. For this reason, it is desired that when referring to this work the varieties should be announced and known as Hays. No. 1, 2, 3, etc." The book itself is a handsome production, decorative yet finely illustrated. Depicting every variety, it set a high standard for subsequent specialized cent monographs. Second binding variant (maroon cloth, ¾ inch decorative bands at top and bottom, with inner filigree to cover device). Until Sheldon's Early American Cents, the primary work on the subject. Only 250 copies printed, all of them poorly bound, with cracked hinges and other problems being the rule rather than the exception. I discussed this publication in my column in the January-March 2013 issue of The Asylum. This copy has been professionally deacidified by Kater-Crafts Bindery. 

Very rare. Not in the Newman, Bass, or Fuld Library sales; the Champa Library had an 1868 edition only. Only two copies of this edition have come to market in recent years: this (for which John J. Ford, Jr. paid \$150 in 1963) and the Stack Family Library copy, which is in a lovely, but not original, binding. Gear's treatise was a predecessor of Laban Heath's ubiquitous publications on the topic, from which, as Eric Newman notes, Heath "adopted many of his concepts and expressions." The illustrations are not finely produced for the reason stated in the introduction: "These engravings are executed in a coarse manner, that the difference between the counterfeit and genuine may be more easily distinguished." A June 23, 1866 testimonial letter from C.E. Twombley, Paying Teller, U.S. Treasury, is reproduced on page 81, recommending it "to the public as an invaluable book for every business man." Priced at \$1.00 versus \$1.50 for the Heath work, its major competitor, Gear downplays the main difference between the two works: "We might fill the book with specimens of genuine work, which would increase the cost of the same only, without being of any aid to the learner. Genuine bank notes are always at hand, and can be examined by all at any time." Ex John J. Ford, Jr. library (lot 497); ex Kolbe & Fanning's 2012 New York Book Auction, lot 284.

The publication history of the first edition of the Gilbert half cent book is complicated. While the text remains constant, the appearance of the plates varies widely. Publisher Tom Elder apparently had prints of the plates made in small batches as needed. In P. Scott Rubin's "The Printing History of the Gilbert Half Cent Book" (*The Asylum*, Spring 1992), the mystery of the various combinations of plates and text issued over the years is largely unraveled. He cites Elder's statement in his March 19–22, 1924 sale that "The last of the first fifty copies and all present sets of plates used up." Since some of the "first fifty copies" were issued in card covers, perhaps as few at 25 or 30 copies were issued in cloth. This establishes the first edition, first issue Gilbert as one of the premiere rarities among 20th-century American numismatic books, a designation long obscured because of the availability of a myriad of emissions, all bearing the 1916 date. The present copy is a later issue of the first edition, with the 0 in Obverse 10 of Plate II being largely degraded, though the plates themselves remain very sharp. Clain-Stefanelli 12288. Davis 428. Newman 1-P-1.5. A rare early issue of the first edition, in unusually nice condition. These fascinating volumes were chronicled by Eric P. Newman in a substantial article appearing in the 1991 American \dot{N} umismatic Association Centennial Anthology, titled "Heath's Counterfeit Detectors: An Extraordinarily Successful Comedy of Errors." In it, Newman writes, "A highlight in American numismatic literature is the myriad of editions of Laban Heath's counterfeit detectors. These books gained great popularity by the simple technique of complimenting the intelligence and ability of members of the public to recognize counterfeit paper money and by the appeal of spectacular illustrations. The series of editions from 1864 through 1889 carried a transition of text and a development of pictorial content by a masterful huckster and a skilled political maneuverer. He was the first person to promote a numismatic book into a best seller." Heath claimed a total issue of 25,000 copies of the first edition. If accurate, the proportion surviving is very small. Distinguishing this issue from the first is a single page of testimonials following the main text, the latest being dated June 23, 1864. Newman 2-BH-3(c). The variations in the 2-BH-3 Heath counterfeit detectors are minor; I described four of them in my catalogue of the Eric P. Newman Library (sold by Heritage in 2018). The Heath bank note facsimile plates used in this printing are encountered both with and without a printed plate number (which, when it is encountered, is hole-punched); the front cover lettering sometimes includes the patent date, but not always, and when it does it may or may not be correct; the Treasury letter may or may not be present; and Plate 12 may or may not have a printed label about Charles Ulrich affixed below it. It is possible that further differences remain to be discovered—indeed, this copy is slightly different from the 2-BH-3(c) in the Newman Library, which had an unpunched and unnumbered Heath facsimile plate but was otherwise identical to this example. This particular subvariety is made most distinct by the presence of the correct patent date on the front cover. The relative scarcity of these varieties has yet to be established. A monumental work on Washington, printed for W. Elliot Woodward and including Woodward's (unsigned) listing of memorial medals of Washington in the second volume (pages 278–291). Washingtoniana is less devoted to the life of Washington than it is to recording all of the events and activities which surrounded the death of the first president, a number of which have strong numismatic connections. Issued in a limited edition of 200 copies in royal octavo (of which this is No. 161), 85 copies in quarto, and 6 quarto copies on Whatman's drawing paper, Washingtoniana is a remarkable example of American printing of the period. The printer, Joel Munsell, is known to numismatists for being the printer of W. Elliot Woodward's Historical Series (as well as some of his sale catalogues) and of Henry Phillips's Historical Sketches of early American paper money. Munsell lists this work on page 136 of his Bibliotheca Munselliana, citing 90 copies on large paper. David S. Edelstein's Joel Munsell: Printer and Antiqurian (1950) lavishes particular praise on this work, describing it as one that "commends itself to the lover of fine printing." Ex William A. 
Thomas Jefferson's 1790 Report on Weights, Measures and Coins A Foundational Document of United States Coinage

Of extraordinary importance and very rare. Considered to be the most important document written by Jefferson while Secretary of State under Washington, the Report on Weights, Measures and Coins is a breathtaking achievement. It is the culmination of many years' thought for Jefferson, who had long pondered the best ways for a new government to address the chaos resulting from the alphabet soup of competing currencies and moneys of account in the colonial and confederation periods. Recognizing that even the familiar British system left much to be desired, Jefferson felt strongly that the adoption of a uniform decimal system would not only be more convenient for daily transactions, but would ease the development of a national economic system in ways that would promote trade and encourage investment. The ramifications of this 1790 report are continually felt today. This is the preferred printing of the Report, being the first edition, fourth printing. It was preceded by three folio editions, which varied only in the corrections Jefferson made to the text while it was being printed. The fourth printing, accomplished in a more convenient octavo form, was the final version, was supervised by Jefferson, and was the edition he kept in his own library. Very rare, with Rink listing only six copies, including Jefferson's own, in institutional libraries. Rarely available in the private marketplace, this is the only copy we have ever offered, having last sold it in 2012. This copy bears a contemporary inscription from George Gale to James Tilghman. George Gale (1756–1815) was a Revolutionary War veteran, a member of Maryland's Constitutional Convention and a member of the U.S. House of Representatives for Maryland. Philadelphia lawyer James Tilghman (1716-1793), originally from Maryland, held a number of public positions and served as a trustee of the University of Pennsylvania (then the College of Philadelphia). 





The Early Lyman Low Auctions

A founder and honorary member of the American Numismatic and Archaeological Society, his collection of Greek and Roman coins was especially notable and was apparently purchased by the British Museum. Rated A– overall by Adams: "1857 proof set. Strong Latin American. RR Scottish gold. Portcullis crown, ½ crown." The last of the catalogues present in this lot is the aborted sale of the fabled collection of Dr. Henry R. Linderman. The chicanery of Mint Officials becomes transparent in its text: restrikes, rare patterns and other Mint-produced concoctions abound. The collection was impounded by the United States Government and the sale did not take place. Several months later, the collection was sold under the auspices of Scott Stamp & Coin Company, minus a number of pieces confiscated by Treasury agents as being in violation of the 1873 coinage law that Linderman himself had helped to draft. When the collection was ultimately sold on February 28, 1888, Low was an employee of the Scott firm. This change of venue is attributable to Low's having ceased independent operations in the interim, entering the employ of J.W. Scott for nine years before resuming his own business. The hiatus may be attributable to financial difficulties precipitated by the unrecovered costs of producing this original Linderman catalogue.

Of legendary rarity. The initial edition of this landmark publication—the first separately printed work on large cents—appeared only the year before, but an additional four varieties had been discovered following its release. All were duly noted in this new edition, which also corrected a number of errors in the text and made an attempt to gauge rarity. An additional 1794 half cent variety had also been discovered, bringing the number of those up to six. Given these substantial improvements, one wonders why the second edition did not reach an audience larger than the first. In fact, it is far scarcer, with only ten or twelve copies currently known to have survived. By sheer coincidence, we sold a copy only two sales ago: in a later binding and only slightly better condition, it brought \$4250 hammer. The 1870 Maris, the 1881 Andrews, and the 1923 Chapman are the keys to completing a large cent library.





A very rare and bibliographically complex book, still important as a foundational reference in this area. Though 160 copies were printed of the main work, copies rarely appear on the market, perhaps because most appear to have been distributed through Masonic channels. Lyman Low claimed that "twenty copies perished by fire" and a postcard in the library of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts confirms that many copies were indeed destroyed in a fire in Marvin's office. It has never been reprinted. Marvin's *Supplement* is also rare, and nearly ever copy that has been offered at auction has been (as is this copy) incomplete. It was lacking from both the Champa and Bass library sales, and the example in the American Numismatic Society Library ends at page 254. Indeed, the most complete copy seen by us stops mid-way through the description of medal MCCLXXVII. Both the main work and the *Supplement* reprint material published by Marvin in the *American Journal of Numismatics* over a period of some 35 years. It is clear that some editing and correcting was made between the periodical form and its publication in book form. A lovely copy of what Eric P. Newman has called, "the first numismatic article on American coins published in America" (The Asylum, Summer 1992), bound in fine goatskin by Harcourt Bindery. Of the highest importance and of considerable rarity. Brief as it may be, this work is one of the foundations upon which U.S. numismatic scholarship has been constructed. Indeed, it is of greater value than merely as a curiosity or historical artifact: Newman's aforementioned article discusses how Mease's comments on the Bar Cent and the circulating value of Connecticut coppers have important implications for current scholarship on these pieces. James Mease, M.D. (1771-1846) was a polymath who published on an number of different subjects, including medicine, geology and history. His Picture of Philadelphia (1811) is a foundational work of local history and contains the first useful description of the U.S. Mint operations. In addition, he is considered to be the first writer to publish on the subject of U.S. numismatics. In a groundbreaking series of three articles (of which this is the last), Mease examined U.S. medals and coins from the perspective of the numismatist. In his groundbreaking lecture on the topic of U.S. numismatic literature, William S.F. Mayers noted that "the first actual attempts at systematic classification and record of the coins struck in or for the American colonies and United States, appear in the shape of papers to be found in the collections of State Historical Societies" ("The Literature of American Numismatics," Norton's Literary Letter, No. 3, 1859, p. 6). Mease's articles are specifically mentioned by Mayers in his article, showing that these works, long forgotten until recent years, were still in the memory of some in the late 1850s. Both Mehl editions of this promotional overview, originally written by Peter Molyneaux for the August 1928 edition of *Bunker's Monthly: The Magazine of Texas*. Mehl liked it so much, he published an offprint of the article the following year, with illustrations, in staple-bound white textured card covers. Not content with this reissue, he expanded it and republished it in 1935 (now under his copyright), in a slightly larger size, in gilt-printed blue textured card covers hand-tied with gold string. Molyneaux was chief editorial writer of the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram*, and a well known bibliophile.



Very rare. Only the Morse-Faelton-Todd, Dunham and Atwater sales are known in special bindings (excepting Mehl's personal copies of some sales). Only the Dunham sale, however, appears to have been issued in any appreciable quantity. It apparently was part of Mehl's masterful promotional campaign and most of the deluxe Dunhams appear to have been issued, pre-sale, to Mehl's coterie of big spenders. Morse and Atwater appear to have been issued post-sale, and only to those who sufficiently loosened their purse strings at the sale. Judging from the few copies of these deluxe catalogues currently known, Mehl's qualifying standards were high

indeed. Why this particular catalogue was issued in deluxe format remains something of an enigma. Though his most important sale in a decade, it pales in significance from a number of earlier sales and from the series of blockbuster Mehl sales to follow. It is bound in the same style as the deluxe Dr. French fixed price catalogue and the leatherbound editions of the *Star Rare Coin Encyclopedia* found in Mehl's own library. In the foreword, Mehl recounted meeting Dunham "One evening in June 1910, while Mrs. Mehl and I were in Chicago on our belated honeymoon, a refined gentleman called on us at our hotel, introducing himself as Mr. Dunham. 'I came to pay my respects to both of you,' he said. He handed Mrs. Mehl a box of candy, and he handed me a box, the contents of which he invited me to examine, admonishing me to do so very carefully. I recall there were several important American numismatic rarities, but just what they were I do not now recall for the reason that the 'shining light' of the little lot was no less than the 'King of American Coins,' the 1804 dollar! The first I had ever seen... from that evening in June, 1910, my dream and ambition was to some day be the fortunate dealer to catalogue the famous 'Dunham Collection." This is the only deluxe copy we recall encountering with the prices realized list bound in, though in all other respects it is identical to others. 

Approaching a field which had been left almost in chaos by the Doughty book, Newcomb assembled a vast quantity of numismatic material, ordered and reordered it, finally set up a new classificational system and a list which seemed adequate; and after testing the new list for upwards of a decade, published. The leather used, however, was of poor quality, and scuffs easily: this copy, while not perfect, (the lower spine is chipped and the top rubbed) is in above-average condition. Completed three years earlier, Newcomb's work was not published until 1944 due to the war. One thousand copies of the regular edition were printed. It marked a great improvement over the pioneering work of Frank Andrews, nearly doubling the variety listings, and stood as the standard work for half a century. The result of many years of painstaking study, relatively few new varieties were discovered in the intervening years. Dr. Sheldon noted that "Newcomb's book doubtless achieves the highest pinnacle for numismatic completeness." His contemporary and collaborator George H. Clapp wrote: "In his line,—the Large Cents,—he can well be classed with the late Edward T. Newell in his line of Greece and Rome." An unusual issue of one of the rarities of American numismatic literature. The plates were originally prepared to accompany the April 10, 1883 auction of Newlin's collection, but none were actually issued with the sale catalogue. Two distinct varieties of this work exist: one with 23, the other with 24 pages of text. In the latter variety, most of page 24 is devoted to a report of the prices realized at the April sale of the coins depicted on the two plates. One would assume that these are the first and second issues respectively, and, as far as the text is concerned, this is doubtless the case. The opposite is true, however, of plated copies. In the review of the plated edition found in the January 1884 issue of the American Journal of Numismatics, twenty-four pages of text is specifically mentioned. The emission sequence appears to be: 1) first printing of the text only, 23 pages, issued in 1883 in printed paper covers; 2) second printing of the text, 24 pages, issued in 1883 hardbound, accompanied by 2 heliotype plates; 3) first printing of the text, combined at the turn of the century or slightly later with photographic reproductions of the two plates and 2 typescript leaves of additions. The first typescript sheet consists of prices realized for the plate coins and the second sheet features a description of a new 1795 half dime variety discovered in 1900 by Charles Steigerwalt. Though its origins are shrouded in mystery, the plated early 20th-century issue offered here is indeed a great rarity, appearing on the market far less often than the 24-page 1883 issue, of which it is known that only 40 copies were issued with plates. The scarce first printing of this classic work, copies of which are more accurately considered bound page proofs issued in very small numbers immediately before the presses were fired up to print the entire run, accompanied by a matching copy of the much more commonly encountered second printing. Both copies are signed by Newman and Bressett on the title page. The backstory behind this volume is the stuff of numismatic legend. Newman and Bressett's work had led them to the conclusion that the story of sets of 1834 and 1804 coins being issued for the Imam of Muscat and the King of Siam were myths—there was no evidence of such gifts having been issued. The book was due to be printed during the 1962 ANA convention, at which the discovery of the King of Siam set (including the 1804 dollar) was announced by David Spink and James Risk. This announcement elicited a frantic application of editorial brakes, as Newman and Bressett had to accommodate this new information and revise their publication to take it into account. What turned out to be an outstanding numismatic work could have been issued with a major flaw had it been prepared in time to be on sale at the ANA. See the extensive article by Len Augsburger and Joel Orosz in the Winter 2020 edition of *The Asylum*. A popular item, copies of the first printing have always been considered quite rare, though the presence of half a dozen or so of them in the Newman Library made them somewhat more available. Actual photographic prints of his work are rarely offered in the marketplace, however, and are extremely useful for assisting in attribution and tracing provenances. A landmark publication on the history of New York, O'Callaghan's work is of numismatic interest due to Volume III's Chapter 23, "Coins and Medals," which contains three beautifully executed engraved plates, the work of J.E. Gavit. These illustrate the Libertas Americana medal, the 1783 Washington "Unity States" cent, the Rosa Americana coinage of William Wood, and various coppers relating to New York State. Information on the provenance of the pieces used in preparing the engraving is given. The chapter is singled out for particular mention by William S.F. Mayers in his 1858 speech on the literature of U.S. numismatics: "In 1850, Dr. O'Callaghan presented illustrations, in his 'Documentary History of New York' (Vol. III.), of the copper coins struck for this state [New York] circa 1790, together with an engraving of the great Libertas Americana medals, and the Washington Cent of 1783" ("The Literature of American Numismatics," published in *Norton's Literary Letter* No. 3 [1859], page 7). 





A number of hand-drawn illustrations are found throughout the volume, most of the illustrating the scientific points being discussed at that point in the lectures. One of these illustrations, of a boiler, is hand-colored. A relevant handwritten note addressed to Prof. Peale and a newspaper clipped are included. Volume rubbed, but sound. First page faded; most of the pages remain easy to read. Very good or better. \$2500

Unique, and a fascinating volume from the period directly preceding Peale's employment by the United States Mint. George Escol Sellers, in his Early Engineering Reminiscences (page 70), writes: "when [Peale] was Manager of the Philadelphia Museum, he delivered such chemical lectures as could be made interesting to the general public by brilliant experiments. He also exhibited many ingenious automata of his own invention and construction. About the same time, he delivered at the Franklin Institute a course of lectures on machinery, illustrated by models and movable card drawings." In a footnote to the passage quoted above, Eugene S. Ferguson, a distinguished historian of science who edited Sellers' reminiscences, stated: "[Franklin Peale] was employed in the museum from 1822 to 1833; and he lectured at Franklin Institute from 1831 until he departed for Europe in 1833." As authority for this statement, Ferguson cites Charles Coleman Sellers, Charles Willson Peale (Philadelphia: American Philosophical Society, 1947), Volume 2, pages 345 and 382. Finally, Charles Coleman Sellers wrote the standard history of the Peale Museum, Mr. Peale's Museum: Charles Willson Peale and the First Popular Museum of Science and Art. On page 242, Sellers notes: "[Franklin] Peale had inherited a Lecture Room assistant from Rubens [Peale], a small Peale grandson named Escol Sellers. For Escol, the Lecture Room was the heart of it all." Thus Escol knew what he was talking about when he recalled Franklin's lectures in his Reminiscences. Benjamin Franklin Peale (1795-1870) spent over twenty years in the employ of the United States Mint at Philadelphia. He was at first sent to Europe to study modern coining techniques; this experience, coupled with his mechanical skills, allowed him to design innovating coining technology for the U.S. Mint, including its first steam presses. He would serve as Melter and Refiner and later as Chief Coiner. He was eventually dismissed when questions were raised about his use of Mint equipment for personal gain. This is a highly important volume.

The second volume comprises Phillips' work on continental paper money. Phillips's groundbreaking work is underappreciated today, but is still consulted with profit. Adams 19 (rated A overall and for colonials and patterns in particular). A legendary rarity, and of enormous importance for colonial and state coinages, most especially the New Jersey coppers. Best known today for his seminal work on the New Jersey pieces, Edward Maris also is credited with the first serious works on the die varieties of 1794 U.S. large cents. The sale appears to have generated some controversy. Maris issued a circular on May 15, 1886, announcing that his collection was to be sold at the auction house of Stan. V. Henkels of Philadelphia. Maris writes in this circular that "The most important of the Colonials will comprise my entire collection of the coins of New Jersey. This will include specimens, or copies of all known New Jerseys, of undoubted genuineness, together with some counterfeits of that period. Also, those which were struck over the Connecticut, Vermont, Nova Constellatio, English, Irish and French coppers; one in brass; one in a mixed metal; one with a small piece of silver in the plow handle; and many other pieces showing fracture of the dies." In an unusual move, Maris catalogued his collection himself. This apparently irritated some coin dealers, who resented this intrusion onto their turf. The October 1886 issue of the *American Journal of Numismatics* reported that, "although the name of a New York dealer



[Smith] was placed on the title page, that gentleman did 'not own a single piece in it,' and Dr. Maris was 'driven to the necessity of placing it there by the attitude of other dealers, who protested against a collector cataloguing his own collection." It is notable that Smith's name appears only on the separately printed "Preface," and not in the catalogue itself (though some copies seen have "With the Compliments of H.P. Smith" printed on the title). Charles Davis, in his catalogues of the Champa library, has suggested that it was the Chapman brothers who protested at Maris preparing his own catalogue, noting that they ceased holding their auction sales at Henkels shortly after this sale. Smith's Preface acknowledges "material assistance from the owner, in the preparation of the Catalogue." (There are also references throughout the sale referring to Maris in the third person, though these may have been written by Maris.) Smith discusses the issue of plated catalogues, stating that "I have had 50 Catalogues made, containing six plates." It is generally felt that far fewer than this were issued, as the number of surviving copies has been estimated as fewer than ten. The plates are outstanding artotypes, of superior quality to those in most sales of the period, and illustrate U.S. federal coins (mostly early silver, large cents and half cents), pattern coins (including an important group of 1877 half dollars), and, of course, some of the most important New Jersey coppers (which take up the last two plates, and include the 21-R not included in Maris's masterwork, as well as others that Maris notes as being superior to those on his famous plate). The New Jersey coppers were purchased en masse by T. Harrison Garrett through his agent Harold Newlin for \$551 (he had been offered the collection directly by Maris for \$1,000 earlier). 



Numismatic historian Joel J. Orosz has written that "there can be no disputing the statement that the Kline sale was the most significant numismatic auction in America before the Civil War." The sale brought \$2,062.80, setting a record for a coin collection sold at auction in the U.S. Kline was a man involved in many businesses, including the coin and stamp trades. An exceptionally rare example of a particularly intriguing type of counterfeit detector. By providing facsimiles of the signatures found on circulating paper money, the publishers sought to provide users with an easy way to verify

the authenticity of the notes they encountered. Inadvertently, however, they also provided counterfeiters with a handy guide against which to check their work—which may partly explain the brief lifespan of this fascinating genre. Dillistin called autographical detectors "probably the most unique publication in the banking field" (Bank Note Reporters and Counterfeit Detectors, page 150). Thompson's Bank Note Reporter was available to subscribers on a weekly, semimonthly or monthly basis, with the more frequent subscribers receiving a complimentary copy of the annually issued The Autographical Counterfeit Detector. While the present volume is claimed as the fourth edition, only one earlier issue (dated 1849) is known. To confuse matters further, an 1852 edition is also dubbed the fourth edition, while a fifth edition exists dated 1853. Given the short shelf life of a guide to paper money, particularly one dependent on a constantly changing cast of bank presidents and cashiers, it is perhaps not surprising that few of these Autographical Counterfeit Detectors have survived. To the best of our recollection, this is the only copy of the 1851 edition we have handled. An impressive and significant archive of over 100 Assay Commission photographs. Many of these derive from the Numismatic News / Krause Publications archives, though the provenance of some of them (the 1961 Polaroids, for instance) is unclear. The photos vary in nature from year to year. Some are formal portraits, frequently of the Mint Director and one or more Commissioners. Others show the Commission at work, usually at a conference table. What are arguably the best show the Commission members interacting with Mint personnel involved with the actual testing of the coins. The 1972 material—by far the most extensive group of photographs—provides an inside view of much of the proceedings, with photos of the coin envelopes, balances, weights and lab equipment supplementing the more typical photographs of the people involved. A great group of photos for anyone collecting Assay Commission medals or interested in numismatic history.

An Act Establishing a Mint, and Regulating the Coins of the United States The Foundation of United States Coinage



A beautiful copy of the entire U.S. Senate proceedings, including Acts and votes, of the First Session of the Second Congress, October 1791 through May 1792. Includes the full text of the unamended "Act Establishing a Mint, and Regulating the Coins of the United States," and much of the discussion and debate from October 1791 leading up to the passage of the foundational Act. Also includes discussion of the later House bill, "An Act to Provide for a Copper Coinage." Of unparalleled importance and very scarce.

The history of the Mint Act goes back to Alexander Hamilton's January 28, 1791 report to the House of Representatives on establishing a Mint and a uniform currency. This report drew upon earlier efforts, but Hamilton's work was the seed from which the final Act really grew. Hamilton's report had to contend with the chaotic currency systems in place in the U.S. markets, which varied considerably across time and place. The crux of the matter was that the U.S. economy was tied to the coinages of foreign nations, and that U.S. sovereignty was not fully realized under such a system of dependence. Thomas Jefferson had much to say about Hamilton's report, as did Robert Morris, the senator to whom the final proposals were given. On March 3, 1791, Congress passed a Mint Act, albeit one that did little but authorize the President to hire the necessary personnel and purchase the required equipment. It did nothing to establish a U.S. currency or coinage in any practical way.

The above leads up to the events chronicled in the present volume. On October 25, 1791, George Washington reminded the entire Congress that "The disorder in the existing currency, and especially the scarcity of small change, a scarcity so peculiarly distressing to the poorer classes, strongly recommend the carrying into immediate effect the resolution already entered into concerning the establishment of a Mint. Measures have been taken pursuant to that resolution for procuring some of the most necessary Artists, together with the requisite Apparatus" (page 10 in this volume). On October 31, a committee was formed of Senators Morris, King, Izzard, Cabot and Henry to work on the Act. On December 21, the committee's bill had its first reading, followed by a second reading beginning on December 26. On January 5, 1792, the bill entered its third reading, with amendments concerning personnel, reports, reverse designs and other subjects discussed. The amendments being agreed upon, the entire text of the Act is printed in the Journal for January 12, 1792 (pages 90-96 of the present volume). This version of the Act retained the wording in Section X mandating the likeness of the president on U.S. coins. The bill was sent to the House for their approval, but they sent it back on March 26 with an amendment to this section, which the Senate initially refused. After the House adhered to its amendment, the Senate receded from its disagreement. The bill was enrolled on March 28 and signed on March 30 by Vice-President John Adams, following the signing of the bill by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. On April 2, 1792, the following announcement is made: "The President of the United States has this day approved and signed 'the act establishing a mint, and regulating the

coins of the United States" (page 171 of this volume).

The discussions reported in this volume are important not only for their record of what came to pass, but for their illustration of notions that never made the leap into actuality. The discussion of reverse designs on January 9, 1792 is particularly interesting: "And upon the reverse of each of the said silver coins, in the center of the exergue, there shall be an engraving of two hands united, and around the margin of the piece as many circles linked together as there shall be States in the union at the time of the coinage, each circle containing the initial letters of the name of its respective State; and between the representation of the united hands and the circles aforesaid, there shall be this inscription in an annular form: 'Dollar of the United States of America,' where the coinage shall be of a dollar, but where the coinage shall be of parts of a dollar, expressing the same accordingly" (page 73 of this volume). There are only three recorded 1792 printings of the "Act Establishing a Mint," the other two being only the text of the Act itself, without the Congressional context leading up to and surrounding it. Only the present printing gives this important contextual information, allowing the reader to appreciate the Act's full significance. Other important legislation discussed in this session included the establishment of a post office, uniform militia laws and laws regarding protection of the frontiers and the Ohio Territory. This copy is exceptionally well-preserved, in an attractive binding that, while modern, is in contemporary style. As the pages are also in immaculate condition,

Rare 1793 Printing of the Final Mint Act, Unrecorded in Evans

An important volume from the Mint's first year of full-time production, including the final version of the Act establishing the Mint. This volume collects and prints all of the Acts passed during both sessions of the Second Congress (1791-1793), despite the title's implication that it includes only those from the First Session (there is a second half-title on page 129 introducing the Second Session). It also includes the text (including translations where relevant) of Treaties entered into by the United States. The full text of the final, amended "Act Establishing a Mint, and Regulating the Coins of the United States," can be found on pages 56-63, and the "Act to Provide for a Copper Coinage" can be found on pages 120-121. A rare volume, unrecorded by Charles Evans in his massive bibliography of 17th- and 18th-century American imprints, and noted only in the 1969 Shipton and Mooney Short-Title Evans and the Bristol Supplement to Evans that appeared around the same time. Bristol records only four copies in the libraries surveyed. It also boasts an interesting provenance: Reynold Keen, whose signature appears on the title page, was charged with high treason in 1778 for allegedly aiding the British during their occupation of Philadelphia. He was pardoned by an Act of Assembly the following year and went on to become a Philadelphia alderman and the head of the Inoculating Society of Philadelphia. Other important Acts discussed in this volume are the ratification of the Bill of Rights, the establishment of a post office, the development of uniform militia laws and laws regarding protection of the Northwest Territory. The first copy we recall having handled. Prepared by Mint Director Robert M. Patterson, whose assays of the major foreign coins then circulating in the United States (gold coins of Great Britain, Portugal, France and Spain, and silver coins of France and Spain) indicated that while the gold coinage of Great Britain and Portugal had been rated at their intrinsic value, the gold coins of France and Spain were overrated and required adjustment. The silver coins of France and Spain were more variable, with French crowns and Spanish dollars being of good weight, but with French 5 francs and Spanish pistareens being somewhat inferior and requiring adjustment. Patterson notes that: "It may, however, be observed that all foreign gold coins have now nearly ceased to circulate as a currency in the United States. Deposits of these are still, indeed, frequently made in our banks; but are thence either sent to the mint for coinage, or re-issued for the purpose of exportation." Secretary of the Treasury Albert Gallatin then transmits Patterson's report (which is dated December 24, 1807) to the Speaker of the House of Representatives with recommendations for adjustments to the ratings of coins described. A fairly early Mint Report, as transmitted by President James Monroe to the United States Congress. This report was submitted by Robert Patterson, the fourth Director of the Mint, who served 1805–1824. The written report provides the totals of the various denominations struck during the course of 1820 and some interesting commentary. After noting the total number of coins struck, Patterson writes, "The above coinage of gold and silver has, in fact, been the work of no more than nine months: for, from the deficiency of deposites, the actual coinage did not commence till the beginning of April; and was, even afterwards, frequently interrupted, from the same cause." A table provides the report of James Rush, in his role as Treasurer of the Mint, giving the number of coins struck during the year arranged by denomination and metal. This is only the second copy of this scarce report that we have offered in thirty years.

A table prepared to accompany the written report provides a statement of the amount of gold produced annually from the gold region of the United States from 1824 to 1833. Rare.

Polk occupies a scant two pages, it is not without interest. A fire at the Charlotte Mint during the early morning hours of July 27, 1844 had destroyed nearly the entire building. Patterson discusses the ongoing construction: "The rebuilding of the branch mint at Charlotte, for which provision was made at the last session of Congress, has been advancing under the charge of the superintendent, and the erection of the walls is now completed. The new machinery was made in the workshop of the Philadelphia mint, and has been finished and forwarded to Charlotte, It is believed, therefore, that in the course of a few months, operations may be again commenced at this branch." While there was no coinage for 1845 at Charlotte, full reports are here given for Philadelphia, New Orleans and Dahlonega.

The 1850 Mint Report, as transmitted by President Millard Fillmore and written by Mint Director Robert Patterson. The influx of gold from California is starting to be felt in earnest, and Patterson's comments on this subject are both interesting and important. After providing an overview of operations and production at the Philadelphia and branch mints, Patterson writes, "From these tables it may be perceived that the operations of the mints during the past year have been unprecedented in our history. The largest coinages before executed were in 1847 and in 1843—the total amount at all the mints being, in the former year, \$22,657,672; in the latter year \$11,967,830. But the coinage of 1850 exceeded that of 1847 by over \$11,000,000, and was nearly three times that of 1843. At the Philadelphia mint the coinage of the past year was nearly twice that of 1847, and over four times that of 1843. The increase in the proportion of our gold to our silver deposites, and the enormous amount of the former, derived from the mines of the United States, are deserving of especial notice. Of the bullion received the silver comprised less than a twentieth part of the whole value; and even of this small proportion as much as one-eighth was derived by separation from the California gold. Of the deposites of gold received, only about one thirty fifth part was in foreign coins or bullion. The remainder, amounting to \$36,938,314, was of United States production, of which \$36,273,097 were from California. The entire receipts from that source, from the discovery of the mines to the close of 1850, were \$42,469,758." Mint Reports from this period are decidedly scarce. This is a very important Mint Report, reflecting the extraordinary effects of the Gold Rush on this nation's economy.

A detailed report by Director George N. Eckert to President Millard Fillmore, though less discursive than Snowden's 1853 report below and more reliant on tables to tell the story of the year's activities. He notes that the 1852 coinage "was comprised in 32,612,949 pieces—being the largest number ever before struck at the mint in a single year." California, of course, continued to dominate the gold deposits, which are outlined in detail. Eckert closes with interesting commentary on the 3-cent silver piece: "The coinage of three-cent pieces amounted to \$559,905, which was 56 per cent. of the total coinage of silver. The demand for this piece has not been due to its intrinsic importance in currency, but to the fact that it is the only one whose proportionate value to gold allows of its issue from the mint, under present laws. The necessity of some legislation, which, by readjusting the proportionate weights of the gold and silver coins, shall admit of the issue and permanent circulation of the latter, is becoming every day more imperative." Eckert only served as Director of the Mint for two years. Rare—possibly the first copy we have handled.

A wordy and somewhat opinionated report by Director James Ross Snowden to President Franklin Pierce. The commentary is well worth reading. Snowden notes that the year's coinage "was comprised in 69,775,537 pieces, being more than twice the number of pieces ever before struck at the mint in a single year." While the vast majority of the gold deposits came from California, it is stated that "a few deposites from Oregon of the value of \$13,535" were received, being "the first deposites from that Territory, and are characterized by having an appreciable per-centage of platinum sand." Commenting on recent legislation, Snowden reports that "The diminution of the standard weight of the half dollar, and lower denominations of silver coins, authorized by the act of March 3, 1853, has been attended with good results" and "The three-dollar gold coin, authorized by the last Congress, will be issued as soon as the dies, now in progress, are completed. From the close approximation in weight and value which the coin will bear to the quarter eagle, it has been deemed expedient to make the devices upon it different than any coin heretofore issued." There is much else of interest—a very interesting report. Rare—possibly the first copy we have handled.

This work comprises a complete record, distilled from the Congressional Record, of all Government reports and documents relating to American finance, of which coinage is treated as an integral part. In addition to the many reports relating to the Mint, also included are reports relating to the paper currency of the period. Originally entered on December 27, 1880, the details of Griffin's claim are entered in ink on the first page, ending with a long physical description of the plat, extending well onto the second page. The drawing of the plat follows on a separate inserted leaf. The third page contains further details, culminating with the seal of the General Land Office, and the April 15, 1882 ink secretarial signature of President Chester A. Arthur, followed by the signatures of the Secretary and Recorder of the General Land Office. Also certified and signed on May 26, 1883 by Bart Robins, Recorder, State of Colorado, County of Gilpin.

A scarce and important 1861 publication describing American coins, medals and tokens from 1652 to 1858, written to accompany the collection given to the Bibliothèque Impériale (Nationale) in the name of the government and citizens of the United States. Following an interesting historical overview, from colonial

issues to pioneer gold, some 381 pieces are described in detail. "Alexandre Vattemare is recognized among American numismatists as one of the fathers of the discipline in the New World, having assembled the first comprehensive collections of American coins, medals, and paper currency, and produced the first comprehensive catalog of American numismatics." — Alan Stahl, in *The Extravagant Ambassador: The True Story of Alexandre Vattemare, the French Ventriloquist Who Changed the World.* Vattemare developed the System of International Exchanges, initially aimed at the exchange of duplicate books between libraries, especially government publications, and later extended to include works of art, maps, natural history specimens, coins, medals and other similar objects. He came to America in 1839 and again in 1847, and was granted funds by Congress and by several state legislatures to further his scheme, which met with greater success here than in Europe. 

An outstanding set of these important historical volumes published by numismatist W. Elliot Woodward. Number 30 of only 70 sets issued in large paper and initialed by Woodward. These three volumes (the complete work of this title) constitute Volumes V through VII of *Woodward's Historical Series*, which sought to reprint, generally with annotations from important historians, very rare publications or archival material relating to early American history. In the present case, these reprint Cotton Mather's *Wonders of the Invisible World*, his controversial apologia for the Salem Witch Trials, in which he uncomfortably defended the use of "spectral evidence" while condemning the excesses of the trials. The first edition (1693) of Mather's work is extremely rare: Woodward himself owned a copy, which was sold in his 1869 *Bibliotheca Americana* sale for \$290. These volumes also reprint the related *More Wonders of the Invisible World* (1700), a withering attack on Cotton Mather and his role in the witch trials. A well-preserved copy of the first book-length work relating to American medals, comprised of forty-one biographies of "the illustrious commanders of our two wars, who have been signalized by the presentation of gold medals, &c. ... men who have sealed their patriotic devotion with wounds and scars, as well as of historical incidents sacred to patriotism." Very scarce, especially in the original binding. Most of the surviving copies seen are much the worse for wear, and the plates, as here, are unfortunately nearly always foxed. Thomas Wyatt was the author of two numismatic works: this 1848 volume and a rare pamphlet titled A Description of the National Medals of America, Presented to the Officers of the Wars of the Revolution and 1812 (1854). He is best remembered today, however, for his more nefarious works. In the mid-1850s, Wyatt began striking medals, tokens and related items specifically for the nascent collector market. He also began producing fairly high-quality reproductions of rare American colonial coins, which were privately marketed as original coins emanating from a hoard discovered in 1856. The "Chelsea Hoard," as it became known, seemingly consisted of a group of Massachusetts silver coins that had been sealed in a bottle and forgotten about for two hundred years. In fact, the coins were all forgeries or fantasy pieces (the latter including Massachusetts silver pennies and the famous Good Samaritan Shilling). A fascinating account of Wyatt and his work is given in Eric P. Newman's masterful The Secret of the Good Samaritan Shilling (1959). Wyatt's copies have become a popular collectible in themselves, appealing to those of us fascinated by the history of the coin collecting hobby in the United States. Davis 1200. Sigler 2910.
